Re: Rule Filing Submitted March 5, 2024

Dear Ms. Mine:

Rules promulgated by the State Bar are required to be published in the North Carolina Administrative Code.¹ The State Bar has a unique rulemaking process whereby rules adopted by the State Bar Council must by certified to the Chief Justice of the North Carolina Supreme Court and entered upon the Supreme Court's minutes.² G.S. 150B-21.21(a) further requires: "The State Bar must submit a rule within 30 days after it is entered in the minutes of the Supreme Court."

On March 5, 2024, the North Carolina State Bar filed seven rule amendments and two rule adoptions for entry into the North Carolina Administrative Code. At my request, the State Bar updated its filing the following day to show the rules were entered upon the minutes of the Supreme Court on June 15, 2022.

This filing was submitted nearly two years after the rules were entered upon the Supreme Court's minutes, far exceeding the 30-day timeframe set in statute. The State Bar's filing provides no reason for the delay, nor does it point to any statutory authority allowing me to enter these rules into the Code outside the 30-day mandate. Absent such authority, I will not be able to process this filing.
