If earlier, how is that determination made? As written, I read this as the closure or waiver lasting until the end of the threat or declaration.

Please review (b)(2) and (d). As I read this, authorized employees or WCAs generally issue permits, but only the Executive Director or his or her designee can issue permits for special concern species and alligators. Is that correct?

In (d), line 21, why is "special concern" capitalized?

In (g)(5), line 18, please capitalize "State" if you are only referring to North Carolina. Please do not capitalize "state" if you are referring to any state.

For the list in (i), please do not capitalize the first word for each item in the list.

A permit issued pursuant to this Rule shall name the species 31 allowed to be taken and may include limitations as to age, sex, type of depredation, location of 32 animal or damage, and local laws. The permit shall be issued to a landholder or an authorized 33 representative of a unit of local government for depredations on public property. The permit shall 34 be used only by individuals named on the permit.

 36 present a danger to human safety. Cities, as defined in G.S. 160A-1(2), seeking a depredation permit

9	(c) Wildlife Damage Control Agents. Individuals meeting the following eligibility requirements may apply to become
10	a Wildlife Damage Control Agent (WDCA):

13	(B) review safe, humane wildlife handling techniques.
14	(2) No wildlife misdemeanor conviction, as specified in G.S. 113 294 that resulted in a license
15	suspension or revocation, within the last five hears prior to application to become a WDCA.
16	Those individuals who demonstrate knowledge of wildlife laws and safe, humane wildlife handling techniques by a
17	passing score of 80 percent or better on a written examination provided by a representative of the Commission, in
18	cooperation with the training course provider, shall be approved. Those individuals failing to obtain a passing score
19	shall be given one chance for re testing without re taking the course. Those individuals approved as agents by the
20	Commission may then issue depredation permits for depredation as defined in Subparagraph (a)(1) of this Rule to
21	landholders and be listed as a second party to provide the control service. WDCAs may not issue depredation permits
22	for coyotes in the counties of Beaufort, Dare, Hyde, Tyrrell, Washington; big game animals; bats; or any species listed
23	as endangered, threatened, or special concern under 15A NCAC 10I.0103, .0104, and .0105 of this Chapter. WDCAs
24	shall annually report to the Commission the number and disposition of animals by county. Records shall be available
25	for inspection by a wildlife enforcement officer at any time during the posted business hours of the Commission at
26	newildlife.org. The Executive Director shall revoke WDCA status when there is evidence of violations of wildlife
27	laws, failure to report, or inhumane treatment of animals by the WDCA. A WDCA may not charge for the permit, but

(1) Taking Without a Permit. Wildlife taken without a permit while committing depredations to property may, during the open season on the species, be taken by the landholder by any lawful method. During the closed season, such depredating wildlife may be taken without a permit only by

6 (2) Taking With a Permit. Wildlife taken under a depredation permit may be taken only by the method 7 or methods authorized by the permit. When trapping is authorized, in order to limit the taking to the 8 intended purpose, the permit may specify a reasonable distance from the property sought to be 9 protected, within which the traps shall be set. The Executive Director, Commission employee, or 10 agent WCA may also state in a permit authorizing trapping whether or not bait or lure may be used 11 and the type of bait or lure that is authorized based upon factors such as type of depredation, 12 locations of animal or damage, and local laws. In addition to any trapping restrictions that may be 13 contained in the permit, the method of trapping shall be in accordance with the requirements and 14 restrictions imposed by G.S. 113-291.6 and other local laws passed by the General Assembly. No 15 depredation permit shall authorize the use of poisons or pesticides in taking wildlife except in 16 accordance with the provisions of the North Carolina Pesticide Law of 1971, G.S. 143, Article 52, 17 the Structural Pest Control Act of 1955, G.S. 106, Article 4C, and G.S. 113, Article 22A. No 18 depredation permit shall authorize the taking of wildlife by any method by any landholder upon the 19 lands of another except when the individual is listed as a second party on a depredation permit.

(3) Intentional Wounding. It is unlawful for any landholder, with or without a depredation permit, to
 intentionally wound a wild animal in a manner so as not to cause its immediate death as suddenly
 and humanely as the circumstances permit.

23 (f) (g) Disposition of Wildlife Taken:

- 24 (1)Generally. Except as provided by Subparagraphs (2) through (5) of this Paragraph, any wildlife 25 killed without a permit while committing depredations shall be buried or disposed of in a safe and 26 sanitary manner on the property where taken. Wildlife killed under a depredation permit may be 27 transported to an alternate disposal site if desired. Anyone in possession of carcasses of animals 28 being transported under a depredation permit shall have the depredation permit in his or her 29 possession. Except as provided by Subparagraphs (f)(2) through (5) of this Rule, (2) through (5) of 30 this Paragraph, all wildlife killed under a depredation permit shall be buried or otherwise disposed 31 of as stated on the permit.
- 32 (2) Deer and feral swine. The edible portions of feral swine and deer may be retained by the landholder 33 for consumption but shall not be transported from the property where the depredations took place 34 without a valid depredation permit. The landholder may give a second party the edible portions of 35 feral swine or deer taken under a depredation permit. The receiver of the edible portions shall hold 36 a copy of the depredation permit. The nonedible portions of any deer carcass, including head, hide,

feet, and antlers, shall be disposed of as specified in Subparagraph (1) of this Paragraph or turned over to a wildlife enforcement officer for disposition.

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(3) Fox. Any fox killed under a depredation permit may be disposed of as described in Subparagraph
 (1) of this Paragraph or, upon compliance with the fur tagging requirements of 15A NCAC 10B
 Section .0400, the carcass or pelt thereof may be sold to a licensed fur dealer.

- 6 (4) Furbearing Animals. The carcass or pelt of any furbearing animal killed during the open season for 7 taking such furbearing animal for control of depredations to property, whether with or without a 8 permit, may be sold to a licensed fur dealer provided that the person offering such carcass or pelt 9 for sale has a valid hunting or trapping license; provided further that bobcats and otters may only be 10 sold upon compliance with any required fur tagging requirement set forth in 15A NCAC 10B 11 Section .0400.
- 12 (5) Animals Taken Alive. Wild animals in the order Carnivora, armadillos, groundhogs, nutria, and 13 beaver shall be humanely euthanized either at the site of capture or at a facility designed to humanely 14 handle the euthanasia, or such wild animals must be released on the property where captured. Feral 15 swine shall be euthanized while still in the trap in accordance with G.S. 113-291.12. For all other 16 animals taken alive, the animal shall be euthanized or released on property with permission of the 17 landowner. When the relocation site is public property, written permission shall be obtained from 18 the local, state, or federal official authorized to manage the property before any animal may be 19 released. Animals transported or held for euthanasia shall be euthanized within 12 hours of capture. 20 possession. Anyone in possession of live animals being transported for relocation or euthanasia 21 under a depredation permit shall have the depredation permit in his or her possession.

Any landholder who kills an alligator; coyote in the counties of Beaufort, Dare, 23 Hyde, Tyrrell, or Washington; deer; Canada goose; bear; elk; or wild turkey under a valid depredation permit shall 24 report the kill on the form provided with the permit, including the number and species of animal(s) killed, and submit 25 the form upon the expiration date of the depredation permit to the Commission. Any landowner who kills a coyote in 26 the counties of Beaufort, Dare, Hyde, Tyrrell, and Washington shall report the kill, including the number of coyotes 27 killed, on the form provided with the depredation permit. The killing and method of disposition of every alligator; 28 coyote in the counties of Beaufort, Dare, Hyde, Tyrrell, and Washington; bear; or elk taken without a permit shall be reported to the Wildlife Resources Commission within 24 hours following the time of such killing. 29 30 (i) Exemption for Animal Control Officers. Animal Control Officers, as defined by G.S. 130A-184(1) when in the

(I) Release of Animals and Fish. It is unlawful to release pen-raised animals or birds, wild animals or birds,
 domesticated animals, except hunting dogs and raptors where otherwise permitted for hunting or training purposes, or
 feral animals, or hatchery-raised fish on game lands without prior written authorization. It is unlawful to move wild
 fish from one stream to another on game lands without prior written authorization. Written authorization shall be given
 when release of such animals is determined by a Wildlife Resources Commission biologist not to be harmful to native
 wildlife in the area and such releases are in the public interest or advance the programs and goals of the Wildlife
 Resources Commission.

(m) Non-Highway Licensed Vehicles. It is unlawful to operate motorized land vehicles not licensed for highway use on Game Lands except for designated areas on National Forests. Disabled persons as defined in Paragraph (k) of this Rule and people who have obtained a Disabled Access Program permit are exempt from the previous sentence but shall comply with the terms of their permit. Furthermore, disabled persons, as defined under the federal Americans with Disabilities Act (42 U.S.C. 126) may use wheelchairs or other mobility devices designed for indoor pedestrian use on any area where foot travel is allowed.

14 (n) Disabled Access Program. Permits issued under this program shall be based upon medical evidence submitted by 15 the person verifying that a handicap exists that limits physical mobility to the extent that normal utilization of the 16 game lands is not possible without vehicular assistance. Persons meeting this requirement may operate electric wheel 17 chairs, all terrain vehicles, and other passenger vehicles on any Commission-maintained road open for vehicular travel 18 and those trails posted for vehicular travel and ungated or open-gated roads otherwise closed to vehicular traffic on 19 game lands owned by the Wildlife Resources Commission and on game lands whose owners have agreed to such use. 20 Those game lands, or parts thereof, where this Paragraph applies are designated in the game land rules section of the 21 regulations digest and map book. This Paragraph does not permit vehicular access on fields, openings, roads, paths, 22 or trails planted for wildlife food or cover. One companion, who is identified by a companion card issued to each 23 qualified disabled person, may accompany a disabled person to provide assistance, provided the companion is at all 24 times in visual or verbal contact with the disabled person. The companion may participate in all lawful activities while 25 assisting a disabled person, provided license requirements are met. Any vehicle used by a qualified disabled person 26 for access to game lands under this provision shall display the vehicular access permit issued by the Wildlife Resources 27 Commission in the passenger area of the vehicle where it can easily be seen by Commission staff outside the vehicle. 28 It is unlawful for anyone other than disabled persons as defined in Paragraph (k) of this Rule and those holding a 29 Disabled Access Permit to hunt, during waterfowl season, within 100 yards of a waterfowl blind designated by the 30 Wildlife Resources Commission as a Disabled Sportsman's hunting blind.

31 (o) Public nudity. Public nudity, including nude sunbathing, is prohibited on any Game Land, including land or water.

32 For the purposes of this Section, "public nudity" means a person's intentional failure to cover with a fully opaque

33 covering the person's genitals, pubic area, anal area, or female breasts below a point from the top of the areola while

in a public place.

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35 (p) Shooting Ranges. On public shooting ranges managed by the Commission, no person shall use designated shooting

36 ranges for any purpose other than for firearm or bow and arrow marksmanship, development of shooting skills, or for

37 other safe uses of firearms and archery equipment. All other uses, including camping, building fires, operating

1 concessions or other activities not directly involved with recreational or competitive shooting are prohibited, except 2 for activities that have been approved by the Commission and for which a permit has been issued may be conducted, 3 provided that the permit authorizing such activity is available for inspection by wildlife enforcement officers at the 4 time the activity is taking place. No person, when using any shooting range, shall deposit any debris or refuse on the 5 grounds of the range. This includes any items used as targets, except that clay targets broken on the range, by the 6 shooter, may be left on the grounds where they fall. No person shall shoot any items made of glass on the grounds of 7 the range. No person may leave any vehicle or other obstruction in such a location or position that it will prevent, 8 impede, or inconvenience the use by other persons of any shooting range. No person shall leave parked any vehicle 9 or other object at any place on the shooting range other than such a place or zone as is designated as an authorized 10 parking zone and posted or marked as such. No person shall handle any firearms or bow and arrow on a shooting 11 range in a careless or reckless manner. No person shall intentionally shoot into any target holder, post, or other 12 permanent fixture or structure while using a shooting range. No person shall shoot a firearm in a manner that would 13 cause any rifled or smoothbore projectiles to travel off of the range, except that shotgun shot, size No. 4 or smaller 14 may be allowed to travel from the range if it presents no risk of harm or injury to any person(s). Persons using a 15 shooting range shall obey posted range safety rules and those persons who violate range safety rules or create a public 16 safety hazard shall leave the shooting range if directed to by law enforcement officers or to leave by Commission 17 employees. No person shall handle any firearms on a shooting range while under the influence of an impairing 18 substance. The consumption of alcohol or alcoholic beverages on a shooting range is prohibited. Open days and hours 19 of operation shall be designated on signs and at least one such sign shall be posted at the entrance to each shooting 20 range. No person, when using any shooting range, shall do any act that is prohibited or neglect to do any act that is 21 required by signs or markings placed on such area under authority of this Rule for the purpose of regulating the use 22 of the area. 23 (q) Limited-access Roads. During the months of June, July, and August, roads posted as "Limited-access Roads" are 24 open to motorized vehicles from 5:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. only. These roads shall be posted with the opening and 25 closing times. 26 (r) No person shall attempt to obscure the sex or age of any bird or animal taken by severing the head or any other 27 part thereof, or possess any bird or animal that has been so mutilated. 28 (s) Baiting. Except as provided in section (g) of this Rule, no person shall place, or cause to be placed on any game 29 land, salt, grain, fruit, or other foods without prior written authorization from an agent of the Commission. Written 30 authorization may be provided for Commission authorized projects or Commission contractors to meet specific 31 objectives. 3 15A NCAC 10J .0103 HUNTING ON WILDLIFE CONSERVATION AREAS

4 (a) Safety Requirements. No person while hunting on any area designated and posted as a wildlife conservation area
 5 shall be under the influence of alcohol or any narcotic drug.

6 (b) Tree Stands. It is unlawful to erect or to occupy, for the purpose of hunting, any tree stand or platform attached 7 by nails, screws, bolts or wire to a tree on any area designated and posted as a wildlife conservation area. This

8 prohibition shall not apply to lag-screw steps or portable stands that are removed after use with no metal left remaining

9 in or attached to the tree.

10 (c) Time and Manner of Taking. Except where closed to hunting or limited to specific dates by these regulations, 11 hunting on areas designated and posted as wildlife conservation areas is permitted during the open season for the game 12 or furbearing species being hunted. Waterfowl hunters shall not enter the areas earlier than 4:00 a.m. on the permitted 13 hunting dates, and hunting is prohibited after 1:00 p.m. on such hunting dates; decoys may not be set out prior to 4:00 14 a.m. and must be removed by 3:00 p.m. each date. No person shall operate any vessel or vehicle powered by an 15 internal combustion engine on the waters of any area designated and posted as a wildlife conservation area. No person 16 shall attempt to obscure the sex or age of any bird or animal taken by severing the head or any other part thereof, or 17 possess any bird or animal which has been so mutilated. No person shall place, or cause to be placed on any area 18 designated and posted as a wildlife conservation area, salt, grain, fruit, or other foods without prior written 19 authorization of the Commission or its agent and no person shall take or attempt to take any game birds or game 20 animals attracted to such foods. No person shall use an electronic calling device for the purpose of attracting wild 21 birds or wild animals. No live wild animals or wild birds shall be removed from any designated wildlife conservation 22 area except with the written permission of the landowner.

23 (d) Hunting Dates:

24	(1)	Any game may be taken during the open seasons on the following wildlife conservation areas and
25		hunting is limited to Mondays, Wednesdays, Saturdays and Thanksgiving, Christmas and New
26		Year's Days. In addition, deer may be taken with bow and arrow on the opening day of the bow and
27		arrow season for deer. Raccoon and opossum hunting may continue until 7:00 a.m. on Tuesdays,
