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3 **15A NCAC 10B .0127 POSSESSION OF WILDLIFE KILLED ACCIDENTALLY OR FOUND DEAD**

4 (a) Deer killed accidentally on a road by reason of collision with a motor vehicle may be possessed and transported  
5 if authorization is obtained from the law enforcement officer who investigates the accident. Possession and transport  
6 of the deer carcass for personal and lawful use, including delivery of the carcass to a second person for his or her  
7 private use or use by a charitable organization shall be authorized.

8 (b) Commission employees may authorize possession and transport of deer and turkey killed accidently or found dead.

9 (c) The following shall not be possessed or transported if killed accidentally or found dead unless written authorization  
10 is obtained from the Commission:

11 (1) black bears; and

12 (2) elk.

13 ~~(c) Black bears killed accidentally or found dead shall not be possessed or transported unless a possession permit is~~  
14 ~~obtained from the Commission.~~

15 (d) Species listed as endangered, threatened, or of special concern under 15A NCAC 10I .0103, .0104, and .0105  
16 killed accidentally or found dead may be possessed or transported if an endangered species permit is obtained from  
17 the Commission.

18 (e) Raptors and migratory birds killed accidentally or found dead may be possessed and transported under federal  
19 permits obtained from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

20 (f) All other Other wildlife resources may be possessed and transported legally if killed accidentally or found dead.

21 (g) The sale of any wildlife resources or wildlife parts from any an animal killed accidentally or found dead is  
22 prohibited, except that licensed trappers and hunters may sell the carcasses, parts, or pelt of any armadillo, beaver,  
23 coyote, groundhog, mink, muskrat, nutria, opossum, otter, raccoon, skunk, weasel weasel, or bobcat to a licensed fur  
24 dealer if the dead furbearing animal was found during the open season for that species. Licensed trappers and hunters  
25 may also sell the carcasses, parts, or pelt of any a fox to a licensed fur dealer if the dead fox was found during an open  
26 fox season and the county where the fox was found allows for the sale of fox carcasses, parts, and pelts. All The  
27 tagging requirements set forth in 15A NCAC 10B .0400 apply.

4 (a) Open All Lawful Weapons Seasons (All Lawful Weapons) for hunting deer:

5 (1) Deer With Visible Antlers. Deer with antlers or spikes protruding through the skin, as distinguished  
6 from knobs or buttons covered by skin or velvet, may be taken on all game lands except Buffalo  
7 Cove, Nicholson Creek, Rockfish Creek, Sandhills, and South Mountains Game Lands (Refer to  
8 15A NCAC 10D .0103 for Deer With Visible Antlers seasons on these Game Lands), during the  
9 following seasons: seasons, including on game lands unless otherwise specified in the Rules of  
10 Subchapter 10D .0200.

11 (A) Saturday on or nearest October 15 through January 1 in all of Beaufort, Bladen, Brunswick,  
12 Carteret, Columbus\*, Columbus, Cumberland, Craven, Dare, Duplin, Harnett, Hoke,  
13 Hyde, Jones, Lenoir, Moore, New Hanover, Onslow, Pamlico, Pender, Richmond,  
14 Robeson, Sampson, Scotland, Tyrrell, and Washington counties. It is unlawful \*Unlawful  
15 to hunt or kill deer in Lake Waccamaw or within 50 yards of its shoreline. shoreline in  
16 Columbus County.

17 (B) Saturday on or nearest October 15 through January 1 in all of Bertie, Camden, Chowan,  
18 Currituck, Edgecombe, Franklin, Gates, Greene, Halifax, Hertford, Johnston, Martin,  
19 Nash, Northampton, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Pitt, Vance, Wake, Warren, Wayne, and  
20 Wilson counties.

21 (C) Saturday before Thanksgiving Day through January 1 in all of Alexander, Alleghany, Ashe,  
22 Catawba, Cleveland, Davie, Forsyth, Gaston, Iredell, Lincoln, Polk, Rutherford, Stokes,  
23 Surry, Watauga, Wilkes, and Yadkin counties.

24 (D) Monday of Thanksgiving week through the third Saturday after Thanksgiving Day in all  
25 of Avery, Buncombe, Burke, Caldwell, Cherokee, Clay, Graham, Haywood, Henderson,  
26 Jackson, Macon, Madison, McDowell, Mitchell, Swain, Transylvania, and Yancey  
27 counties.

28 (E) Two Saturdays before Thanksgiving Day through January 1 in all of Alamance, Anson,  
29 Cabarrus, Caswell, Chatham, Davidson, Durham, Granville, Guilford, Lee, Mecklenburg,  
30 Montgomery, Orange, Person, Randolph, Rockingham, Rowan, Stanly, and Union  
31 counties.

32 (F) Saturday on or nearest September 10 through January 1 in those the parts of Camden,  
33 Gates, and Pasquotank counties known as the Dismal Swamp National Wildlife Refuge; in  
34 those the parts of Hyde, Tyrrell, and Washington counties known as the Pocosin Lakes  
35 National Wildlife Refuge; in that the part of Hyde county known as Lake Mattamuskeet  
36 National Wildlife Refuge; in those the parts of Dare and Hyde counties known as Alligator  
37 River National Wildlife Refuge; in those the parts of Anson and Richmond counties known

3 (2) Antlered or Antlerless Deer, Deer of Either Sex. Except on Game Lands, antlered or antlerless deer  
4 of either sex may be taken during the open seasons and in the counties and portions of counties listed  
5 in Parts (A), (B), (C), (D), (E), (F), and (A) through (H) (G) of this Subparagraph (Refer to 15A  
6 NCAC 10D .0103 for either sex deer seasons on Game Lands), Subparagraph. Antlered or antlerless  
7 deer Deer of either sex may be taken the fourth Saturday in September in all counties by persons  
8 under the age of 18, during the open season identified in Part (H) of this Subparagraph.

9 (A) The open either sex antlered or antlerless deer hunting dates established by the U.S. Fish  
10 and Wildlife Service during the period from the Saturday on or nearest September 10  
11 through January 1 in those the parts of Camden, Gates, and Pasquotank counties known as  
12 the Dismal Swamp National Wildlife Refuge; in those the parts of Hyde, Tyrrell, and  
13 Washington counties known as the Pocosin Lakes National Wildlife Refuge; in those the  
14 parts of Anson and Richmond counties known as the Pee Dee National Wildlife Refuge;  
15 and in those the parts of Currituck County known as the Currituck National Wildlife  
16 Refuge and the Mackay Island National Wildlife Refuge.

17 (B) The open either sex antlered or antlerless deer hunting dates established by the appropriate  
18 military commands at each of the military installations listed in this Paragraph, during the  
19 period from Saturday on or nearest October 15 through January 1 in that the part of

21 Craven County known and marked as Cherry Point Marine Base, in that the part of Onslow  
22 County known and marked as the Camp Lejeune Marine Base, on Fort Bragg Military  
23 Reservation, and on Camp Mackall Military Reservation.

5 manufactured ~~in or before 1898, before 1899,~~ that cannot use fixed ammunition; any replica of this  
6 type of firearm if ~~such the~~ replica is not designed or redesigned for using rimfire or conventional  
7 centerfire fixed ammunition; and any muzzle-loading rifle, muzzle-loading shotgun, or muzzle-  
8 loading or cylinder-loading handgun that is designed to use blackpowder, blackpowder substitute,  
9 or any other propellant loaded through the muzzle, cylinder, or breech and that cannot use fixed  
10 ammunition.

11 (d) Open Urban Season (~~Urban Season~~) for hunting deer:

- 12 (1) Authorization. Subject to the restrictions set out in Subparagraph (3) of this Paragraph and the bag  
13 limits set out in Paragraph (e) of this Rule, antlered or antlerless deer ~~of either sex~~ may be taken  
14 with ~~bow and arrow~~ archery equipment in participating cities in the State, as defined in G.S. 160A-  
15 1(2), from the second Saturday following January 1 through the sixth Sunday thereafter. Deer shall  
16 not be taken on ~~any game land or part thereof that occurs~~ lands within a city boundary.

- 17 (2) Participation. Cities that intend to participate in the ~~urban season~~ Urban Season shall send a letter  
18 to that effect no later than April 1 of the year prior to the start of the ~~urban season~~ Urban Season to  
19 the Executive Director or his designee at 1722 Mail Service Center, Raleigh, N.C. 27699-1700.

29 (e) Bag limits. The possession and season limit is six deer, two ~~of which that~~ may be deer with visible antlers and  
30 four ~~of which that~~ may be antlerless deer. Antlerless deer include males with knobs or buttons covered by skin or  
31 velvet as distinguished from spikes protruding through the skin. ~~In addition to the bag limits described above, a~~ A  
32 hunter may obtain multiple ~~bonus antlerless deer harvest report cards~~ Bonus Antlerless Deer Harvest Report Cards  
33 from the Wildlife Resources Commission or any Wildlife Service Agent to allow the harvest of two additional  
34 antlerless deer per card for deer harvested during the season described in Paragraph (d) of this Rule within the  
35 boundaries of participating municipalities, except on State-owned game lands. Antlerless deer harvested and reported  
36 on the bonus antlerless harvest report card shall not count as part of the possession and season limit.

1 (f) Deer Management Assistance Program. The bag limits described above in Paragraph (e) of this Rule do not apply  
2 to deer harvested in areas covered in the Deer Management Assistance Program (DMAP) as described in G.S. 113-  
3 291.2(e) for those individuals using Commission-issued DMAP tags and reporting harvest as described on the DMAP  
4 license. Season bag limits shall be set by the number of DMAP tags issued and in the hunters' possession. All deer  
5 harvested under this program, regardless of the date of harvest, shall be tagged with these DMAP tags and reported as  
6 instructed on the DMAP license. The hunter does not have to validate the Big Game Harvest Report Card provided  
7 with the hunting license for deer tagged with the DMAP tags. Any deer harvested on lands enrolled in the DMAP and  
8 not tagged with DMAP tags may only be harvested during the regularly established deer seasons subject to all the  
9 restrictions of those seasons, including bag limits, and reported using the big game harvest report card or the bonus  
10 antlerless harvest report card.

3 **15A NCAC 10B .0227 WILD QUAIL ~~MANGEMENT~~ MANAGEMENT AREAS**

4 (a) A "Wild Quail Management Area" shall be land maintained to enhance enjoyment of sportsmen and support wild  
5 bobwhite quail conservation under signed agreement between the landowner(s) landowners and the Wildlife  
6 Resources Commission.

7 (b) The following qualifications shall apply to all Wild Quail Management Areas:

- 8 (1) At least 500 acres of contiguous land; and  
9 (2) A minimum of 225 acres or 15 percent of the land, whichever is greater, shall be maintained in year-  
10 round bobwhite quail habitat.

11 (c) Wild bobwhite quail habitat shall be any early successional habitat dominated by herbaceous vegetation or shrub  
12 cover consisting of a mixture of young saplings, shrubs, forbs, and woody plants typically less than ten feet tall with  
13 scattered open patches of grasses, wildflowers, and vines. Forest stands shall have a basal area no greater than 60  
14 square feet per acre. Land managed and maintained primarily for human uses such as including but not limited to large  
15 lawns, golf courses, sod-forming pastures, production agriculture fields, monoculture hayfields, solar energy, or  
16 production timber stands shall not qualify as early successional habitat.

17 (d) Landowners interested in establishing a Wild Quail Management Area shall contact the Commission as described  
18 on the Commission's website at [www.ncwildlife.org](http://www.ncwildlife.org).

19 (e) The signed Commission and landowners shall sign an agreement that contains: between the landowner(s) and the  
20 Commission shall include:

- 21 (1) a list of all the owners of land included in the Wild Quail Management Area;  
22 (2) county parcel identification information for each parcel to be included in the Wild Quail  
23 Management Area;  
24 (3) a scaled map of the Wild Quail Management Area with the areas to be maintained in year-round  
25 bobwhite quail habitat identified;  
26 (4) management practices to be used to maintain bobwhite quail habitat and populations; and  
27 (5) any reporting requirements in addition to the minimum requirements in Subparagraph (g)(6) of this  
28 Rule that are specific to the individual Wild Quail Management Area. Areas, if applicable.

29 (f) Property inspection:

- 30 (1) All a representative of the Commission shall inspect the potential properties shall be inspected by a  
31 representative of the Commission prior to acceptance into the program to determine that the  
32 proposed land and habitat will qualify to become a Wild Quail Management Area; and  
33 (2) a representative of the Commission shall inspect Wild Quail Management Areas shall be inspected  
34 by a representative of the Commission at least once every five years to determine that the  
35 requirements of the signed agreement and this rule are being met.

36 (g) The following shall apply to all Wild Quail Management Areas:

- 37 (1) No domestically raised upland game birds shall be released on Wild Quail Management Areas.

- 1 (2) The hunting of wild bobwhite quail shall only be permitted during the established seasons in 15A  
2 NCAC 10B .0208.
- 3 (3) Supplemental feeding, if conducted, shall be for the primary purpose of ensuring that wild bobwhite  
4 quail populations remain stable during droughts or other periods of stressful environmental  
5 conditions. Supplemental feed shall:
- 6 (A) be broadcast into quail habitat along a minimum linear distance of **at least** one mile per 100  
7 acres of habitat at a rate of three bushels per mile;
- 8 (B) be broadcast on a bi-weekly schedule during **at least a minimum of** five months **each per**  
9 **year year:**
- 10 (C) be broadcast using a non-stationary spreader;
- 11 (D) be only natural grains or seed; and
- 12 (E) not be placed to attract birds **for the purpose of hunting; to hunt.**
- 13 (4) Except for wild bobwhite quail on Wild Quail Management Areas, no wild birds shall be taken near  
14 or with the aid of supplemental feed.
