9		use by the <mark>general</mark> public during the dates specified on the sign, and entry upon such an area for any
10		purpose is prohibited without <mark>first obtaining</mark> written approval <mark>of such entry or use</mark> from <mark>an authorized</mark>
11		agent of the Wildlife Resources Commission by calling 919-707-0150 and requesting a permit.

15	(c) Littering. N	o person shall deposit any litter, trash, garbage, or other refuse at any place on any game land except
16	in receptacles pr	ovided for disposal of <mark>such</mark> refuse at designated camping and target-shooting areas. No garbage dumps
17	or sanitary land	ills shall be established on <mark>any</mark> a game land by <mark>any a</mark> person, firm, corporation, county, or municipality,
18	except as permi	tted by the landowner.
19	(d) Use of weap	oons. No person shall discharge:
20	(1)	any <u>a</u> weapon within 150 yards of <mark>any</mark> <u>a</u> game land building or designated game land camping area,
21		except where posted otherwise;
22	(2)	any a weapon within 150 yards of any a residence located on or adjacent to game lands, except on
23		Butner-Falls of Neuse and Jordan game lands; and
24	(3)	any a firearm within 150 yards of any a residence located on or adjacent to Butner-Falls of Neuse
25		and Jordan Game Lands.
26	No person shall	hunt with or have in possession $\frac{1}{2}$ a shotgun shell containing lead or toxic shot while hunting on
27	<mark>any</mark> <u>a</u> posted wa	aterfowl impoundment on any a game land, except shotgun shells containing lead buckshot may be
28	used while deer	hunting. Every individual Individuals carrying a concealed handgun shall adhere to the requirements
29	set forth in G.S.	14-415.11, even if the state issuing the concealed handgun permit is not North Carolina. On Butner-
30	Falls of Neuse, .	Jordan, Kerr Scott, and Vance game lands, no person shall possess loaded firearms, ammunition, bows
31	and arrows, cros	ssbows, or other weapons except as provided in the Code of Federal Regulations, Title 36, Chapter III,

Before October 1 of each year, the North Carolina Field Trial Association 4 or other organization desiring use of the Sandhills facilities between the Wednesday on or nearest October 18 October 5 22 and November 18 the second Friday before Thanksgiving and between December 3 the first Monday following 6 Thanksgiving and March 31 shall submit its proposed schedule of such use to the Wildlife Resources Commission for 7 its consideration and approval. The use of the Sandhills Field Trial facilities at any time by individuals for training 8 dogs is prohibited; elsewhere on the Sandhills Game Lands dogs may be trained only on Mondays, Wednesdays, and 9 Saturdays from October 1 through April 1. Dogs may not be trained or permitted to run unleashed from April 1 through 10 August 15 on any game land located west of I-95, except when participating in field trials sanctioned by the Wildlife 11 Resources Commission. Dogs may not be trained or permitted to run unleashed from March 15 through June 15 on 12 any game land located east of I-95, except when participating in field trials sanctioned by the Wildlife Resources 13 Commission. Additionally, on game lands located west of I-95 where special hunts are scheduled for sportsmen 14 participating in the Disabled Sportsman Program, dogs may not be trained or allowed to run unleashed during legal 15 big game hunting hours on the dates of the special hunts. A field trial shall be authorized when such field trial does not conflict with other planned activities on the Game Land game land or field trial facilities, and the applying 16 17 organization can demonstrate their experience and expertise in conducting genuine field trial activities. Entry to 18 physical facilities, other than by field trial organizations under permit, shall be granted when they do not conflict with 19 other planned activities previously approved by the Commission and they do not conflict with the mission of the 20 agency.

21 (g) Trapping. Subject to the restrictions contained in 15A NCAC 10B .0110, .0302, and .0303, and .0306 trapping of 22 furbearing animals, armadillos, coyotes, and groundhogs is permitted on game lands during the applicable open 23 trapping seasons established by rule. Foxes can be trapped on game lands from November 1 October 1 through the 24 end of February in any county with an open fox trapping season that falls between November 1 October 1 and the end 25 of February. Foxes may not be taken by trapping on game lands in counties with a closed fox trapping season or during 26 any fox trapping season that occurs outside the dates of November 1 October 1 through the end of February. 27 Additionally, fox trapping is allowed on game lands in Clay, Graham, Henderson, Macon, and Tyrrell counties with 28 a daily bag limit of two and a season bag limit of 10 from the first to the fourth Saturday in January. Trapping is 29 prohibited:

30 (1) on the J Robert Gordon Field Trial Area of Sandhills Game Land;

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- (2) in posted "safety zones" located on any game land;
- 32 (3) by the use of bait on the National Forest Lands bounded by the Blue Ridge Parkway on the south,
 33 US 276 on the north and east, and NC 215 on the west; and
- 34 (4) on the DuPont State Forest Game Lands; and
- 35 (5) from April 1 through October September 31.

36 At each trap, trappers may use a single bait site of grain, fruit, or other foods when trapping if the food is not a

37 processed food product as defined in G.S.113-294(r), is less than 3 cubic inches and is covered to prevent it from

being seen from above. Feathers, including those with attached skin or entire bird wings, hair with or without skin or
 hide, and bones that include no attached meat, organs, or viscera do not need to be covered.

3 (h) Vehicular Traffic. No person shall drive a motorized vehicle on any a game land except on those roads constructed,

- 4 maintained, and opened for vehicular travel and those <u>on</u> trails posted for vehicular travel, unless such person:
- 5 (1) is driving in the vehicle gallery of a scheduled bird dog field trial held on the Sandhills Game Land;
 6 or
- 7 (2) is a disabled sportsman as defined in Paragraph (k) (j) of this Rule or holds a Disabled Access
 8 Program Permit as described in Paragraph (m) of this Rule and is abiding by the rules described in
 9 Paragraph (m).
- 10 (i) Camping.
- (1) No person shall camp on any a game land except on an area designated posted by the landowner for
 camping.
- 13(2)On game lands owned by the State of North Carolina, where the North Carolina Wildlife Resources14Commission is the primary custodian, the maximum period of consecutive overnight camping at15any designated camping area is 14 days within any 30-day period, period from May 1 through16August 31, unless otherwise specified in rules of this Subchapter. After 14 consecutive days of17camping, all personal belongings shall be removed from the game land.
- 18
 (3)
 A hunting, fishing, trapping or Game Lands License is required for individuals age 16 or older to

 19
 camp on game lands in areas posted for camping except when camping within 100 yards of the

 20
 Roanoke River on the state-owned portion of the Roanoke River Wetlands Game Land, within 100

 21
 yards of the Neuse River on that portion of the game land west of NC-43, and in posted areas along

 22
 the Mountains-to-Sea Trail on Butner-Falls of Neuse Game Land.
- 23 (j) Swimming. Swimming is prohibited in the lakes located on the Sandhills Game Land.

24 (k) (j) Disabled Sportsman Program. In order to To qualify for permit hunts for disabled sportsmen offered by the 25 Commission and use of designated blinds during those hunts, an individual shall possess a Disabled Veteran 26 Sportsman license, a Totally Disabled Sportsman license, or a disabled sportsman hunt certification issued by the 27 Commission. In order to To qualify for the certification, the applicant shall provide medical certification of one or 28 more of the following disabilities:

- 29 (1) missing 50 percent or more of one or more limbs, whether by amputation or natural causes;
- 30 (2) paralysis of one or more limbs;
- 31 (3) dysfunction of one or more limbs rendering the person unable to perform the task of grasping and
 32 lifting with the hands and arms or unable to walk without mechanical assistance, other than a cane;
- 33 (4) disease, injury, or defect confining the person to a wheelchair, walker, or crutches; or
- 34 (5) deafness.
- On game lands where the privileges described in Paragraph (m) of this Rule apply, participants in the program may operate electric wheel chairs, all terrain vehicles, or other passenger vehicles:
- 37 (1) on ungated or open-gated roads normally closed to vehicular traffic; and

 on any Commission-maintained roads open for vehicular travel and those trails posted for

 2
 vehicular travel.
- Each program participant may be accompanied by one companion provided such the companion has in his possession the companion card issued by the Commission. Hunters who qualify under the Disabled Sportsman Program and their companions may access special hunting blinds for people with disabilities during regularly scheduled, non-permit hunting days on a first come basis, except for those blinds located on the Restricted Area of Caswell Game Land.
- 7 (h) (k) Release of Animals and Fish. It is unlawful to release pen-raised animals or birds, wild animals or birds,
 8 domesticated animals, except hunting dogs and raptors where otherwise permitted for hunting or training purposes, or
- 9 feral animals, or hatchery-raised fish on game lands without prior written authorization. It is unlawful to move wild
- 10 fish from one stream to another on game lands without prior written authorization. Written authorization shall be given
- 11 when release of such animals is determined by a Wildlife Resources Commission biologist not to be harmful to native
- 12 wildlife in the area and such releases are is in the public interest or advance the programs and goals of the Wildlife
- 13 Resources Commission.

(m) (l) Non-Highway Licensed Vehicles. It is unlawful to operate motorized land vehicles not licensed for highway
 use on Game Lands game lands except for designated areas on National Forests. Disabled persons as defined in

16 Paragraph (k) (j) of this Rule and people who have obtained a Disabled Access Program permit are exempt from the

- 17 previous sentence from this restriction but shall comply with the terms of their permit. Furthermore, disabled persons, 18 as defined under the federal Americans with Disabilities Act (42 U.S.C. 126) may use wheelchairs or other all-terrain
- 19 wheelchairs wheel chairs mobility devices designed for indoor pedestrian use on any area areas where foot travel is
- allowed. Off road vehicles including ATVs, UTVs, and ebikes are not permitted.

21 (m) Disabled Access Program. Permits issued under this program shall be based upon medical evidence submitted 22 by the person verifying that a handicap exists that limits physical mobility to the extent that normal utilization of the 23 game lands is not possible without vehicular assistance. Persons meeting this requirement may operate electric wheel 24 chairs, all terrain vehicles, and other passenger vehicles on any Commission-maintained road open for vehicular travel 25 and those trails posted for vehicular travel and ungated or open-gated roads otherwise closed to vehicular traffic on 26 game lands owned by the Wildlife Resources Commission and on game lands whose owners have agreed to such use. 27 Those game lands, or parts thereof, where this Paragraph applies are designated online, at www.ncwildlife.org. This 28 Paragraph does not permit vehicular access on fields, openings, roads, paths, or trails planted for wildlife food or 29 cover. One companion, who is identified by a companion card issued to each qualified disabled person, may 30 accompany a disabled person to provide assistance, provided the companion is at all times in visual or verbal contact 31 with the disabled person. The companion may participate in all lawful activities while assisting a disabled person, 32 provided license requirements are met. Any vehicle used by a qualified disabled person for access to game lands under 33 this provision shall display the vehicular access permit issued by the Wildlife Resources Commission in the passenger 34 area of the vehicle where it can easily be seen by Commission staff outside the vehicle. It is unlawful for anyone other 35 than disabled persons as defined in Paragraph (k) of this Rule and those holding a Disabled Access Permit to hunt, 36 during waterfowl season, within 100 yards of a waterfowl blind designated by the Wildlife Resources Commission as

a Disabled Sportsman's hunting blind.

(o) (n) Public nudity. Public nudity, including nude sunbathing, is prohibited on any game land, including land or
 water. For the purposes of this Section, "public nudity" means a person's intentional failure to cover with a fully
 opaque covering the person's genitals, pubic area, anal area, or female breasts below a point from the top of the areola
 while in a public place.

5 (\mathbf{p}) (o) Shooting Ranges. On public shooting ranges managed by the Commission, no person shall use designated 6 shooting ranges for any purpose other than for firearm or bow and arrow marksmanship, development of shooting 7 skills, or for other safe uses of firearms and archery equipment. All other Other uses, including camping, building 8 fires, operating concessions or other activities not directly involved with recreational or competitive shooting are 9 prohibited, except for activities that have been approved by the Commission and for which a permit has been issued 10 may be conducted, provided that the permit authorizing such activity is available for inspection by wildlife 11 enforcement officers at the time the activity is taking place. No person, when using any shooting range, shall deposit 12 any debris or refuse on the grounds of the range. This includes any items used as targets, except that clay targets 13 broken on the range, by the shooter, may be left on the grounds where they fall. No person shall shoot any items made 14 of glass on the grounds of the range. No person may leave any vehicle or other obstruction in such a location or 15 position that it will prevent, impede, or inconvenience the use by other persons of any shooting range. No person shall 16 leave parked any vehicle or other object at any place on the shooting range other than such a place or zone as is 17 designated as an authorized parking zone and posted or marked as such. No person shall handle any firearms or bow 18 and arrow on a shooting range in a careless or reckless manner. No person shall intentionally shoot into any target 19 holder, post, or other permanent fixture or structure while using a shooting range. No person shall shoot a firearm in 20 a manner that would cause any rifled or smoothbore projectiles to travel off of the range, except that shotgun shot, 21 size No. 4 or smaller may be allowed to travel from the range if it presents no risk of harm or injury to any person(s). 22 Persons using a shooting range shall obey posted range safety rules and those persons who violate range safety rules 23 or create a public safety hazard shall leave the shooting range if directed to by law enforcement officers or to leave by 24 Commission employees. No person shall handle any firearms on a shooting range while under the influence of an 25 impairing substance. The consumption of alcohol or alcoholic beverages on a shooting range is prohibited. Open days 26 and hours of operation shall be designated on signs and at least one such sign shall be posted at the entrance to each 27 shooting range. No person, when using any shooting range, shall do any act that is prohibited or neglect to do any act 28 that is required by signs or markings placed on such area under authority of this Rule for the purpose of regulating the 29 use of the area.

30 (q) (p) Limited-access Roads. During the months of June, July, and August, roads posted as "Limited-access Roads"

31 are open to motorized vehicles from 5:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. only. These roads shall be posted with the opening and 32 closing times.

- (r) (g) No person shall attempt to obscure the sex or age of any a bird or animal taken by severing the head or any
 other part thereof, or possess any bird or animal that has been so mutilated.
- 35 (s) (r) Baiting. Except as provided in Paragraph (g) of this Rule, no person shall place, or cause to be placed on any
- 36 game land, salt, grain, fruit, or other foods without prior written authorization from an agent of the Commission.
- 37 Written authorization may be provided for Commission authorized projects or Commission contractors to meet

specific objectives. Except as authorized by rule, no person shall take or attempt to take any wild birds or wild animals
 attracted to such foods.
