The way that I'm reading this, it is saying that the assistant has the option, but doesn't have to, do these things. So, for example in (b)(1), the assistant may (but doesn't have to) report unethical behavior; and in (b)(3), the assistant may (but doesn't have to) follow safety procedures. Is that the intent? I realize that this change was made in response to technical change request for the temporary rules related to (a), but does it make sense for the indirect patient services in (b)? Do you need to break direct patient services and indirect patient services up? Could you just say "Audiology assistants may do the following:" in (a), then in (b) say "if audiology assistants engage in any activities in (a), they shall do the following:…"? I'm wondering if (b)(1), (3), and (4) are intended to be a shall standard. I note that I don't see a difference in direct and indirect patient services referenced throughout these rules.
