Completion of this coursework through the NC Community College system meets the requirements to obtain the NCFCCC. Individuals who want to earn a NC credential certificate and qualify for a specific position must complete the required credential coursework at a NC community college. Currently an individual can complete credential coursework for the following: the NC Early Childhood Credential, the NC Family Child Care Credential, the NC School-age Credential certificate, and the NC Early Childhood Administrators Credential. The NCFCCC is an industry familiar term. Early educators, to include family child care home operators, and early childhood Credential, but more appropriate for a family child care home setting.

G.S. 110-91(8) outlines the minimum staff qualification for a family child care home provider. Rules in Section .3200 outline standards for a two to five star license. Rule .3217 outlines the enhanced education standards for family child care home operators.

Julie,

Apologies for the delayed response. I was caught in the DIT technical issue removing my access to my computer yesterday, and lost some work. You have addressed almost everything I had a concern about, but there are still a couple of small changes I recommend. Given the timing of the meeting, I would need these resolved by tomorrow morning at the latest to recommend approval. Otherwise, I would recommend we hold over until the July meeting, which is no problem on our end.

In rule 10A NCAC 09 .3010, the bracketed change on line 12 is strucktrhough and underlined. Remove the underline.

In rule 10A NCAC 09 .3202(b) it needs to be clear that the substance of the form is the requirements of the rules and statute. The easiest way I can think to do this is to add a sentence to line 8 that says something like "The substance of the form shall cover requirements established by statute and the rules of this subchapter." For context, changes to the form don't come before the RRC, so the rule needs to lock in the substantive requirements. Otherwise future agency action could circumvent the APA.

In rule 10A NCAC 09.3224, if the standards for items (m) and (n) are not already incorporated somewhere else, they need to be incorporated here in accordance with G.S. 150B-21.6. It is entirely possible I have missed where these standards are incorporated elsewhere, as I did with the Foundations for Early Learning and Development in 10A NCAC 09.0102(16). Note that you need to incorporate the standards themselves adopted by the other agency, you cannot just rely on link to your own website.

19	(5) A child care facility implements all family and community engagement practices as set forth in Rules
20	.3219 and .3220 of this Section, rather than only the practices required for licensure level or pathway.
21	(6) A child care administrator or operator of a family child care home participates in a coaching or mentoring
22	process as set forth in Rules .3205 and .3206 of this Section when not required for licensure level or pathway.
23	(h) A Health & Wellness Opportunities Recognition may be requested when at least one of the following requirements
24	is met:
25	(1) A child care facility provides support to staff members and families regarding challenging behaviors using
26	community, regional or state resources.
27	(2) A child care center has a licensed or registered nurse on staff for at least half of the operating hours of the
28	program.
29	(3) A child care facility offers oral health education and opportunities such as dental screenings and outreach
30	with community, regional and state resources.
31	(4) A child care facility offers supplemental programs or contracts with external vendors to provide
32	opportunities for growth in specialty areas, including but not limited to tumbling, art, bookmobile, sports,
33	dance, music or yoga.
34	(5) A child care facility completes REACH Healthy Child Care recognition. Information for this program is

3	(8) A child care facility engages with a Child Care Health Consultant by participating in one cycle of
4	assessments using the NC Health and Safety Assessment Tool annually.
5	(9) A child care facility implements five of six of the following educational opportunities regarding green
6	environment practices:
7	(A) Provides outdoor learning environments that have areas of shade provided by trees that use heat
8	tolerant /drought resistant plant material.
9	(B) Provides an indoor play space allowing gross motor play, running, jumping and physically active
10	games in an air conditioned/heated environment.
11	(C) Paints walkways and pavement in heat reflecting colors in an effort to decrease surface
12	temperatures and associated burn hazards.
13	(D) Ensure use of non-toxic cleaning products throughout the facility
14	(E) Creates and maintains a pollinator and/or a vegetable garden as a method to educate and
15	emphasize ecofriendly change and lifestyle.
16	(F) Implement teaching practices that support reducing and recycling such as ensuring use of
17	recyclable products when reusable products are unavailable, providing reusable food service
18	products for meals and/or snacks, and installing a system of recycling in the facility where trash
19	and recyclables are in separate containers and disposed of properly.
20	(i) A Language Concentration Recognition may be requested when at least one of the following requirements is met:
21	(1) Children enrolled in a child care facility are participating in use of languages other than English on a

25	(j) A Culinary Emphasis Recognition may be requested when at least one of the following requirements is met:

35	(2) An operator of a family child care home voluntarily reduces enrollment when not required for licensure
36	level or pathway.
