21 NCAC 65.0301 Minimum Level of Education and Competency for Licensed Recreation Therapists

- a. Should we state recreation(al) due to some programs including the (al) and some not? None of the NC programs are just Recreation(al) that I am aware of.
- b. Only accredited programs are included? Yes.
 - c. Can clarification be provided on what counts for "Health & Human Services Coursework"? We all debate this.... Too vast to list, we accept from 1000's of universities. I suppose we could broaden the definition. Never had a NC student that didn't have more than enough. The definition and examples on the application is: The courses that should be used to meet support content requirements are those that are useful to practice as a recreational therapist. For example, kinesiology or biomechanics, counseling or helping skills, motor learning, educational or cognitive psychology, psychology of adjustment, pharmacology, first aid and safety and courses in various aspects of health care (e.g. rehabilitation, mental health, legal aspects of health care, health care organization and delivery, etc.) are particularly helpful to the practice of recreational therapy in clinical settings and are recommended as support content courses. Courses such as Sociology, Rehabilitation, Medical Terminology, Gerontology, General Psychology, Special Education are nonexclusive recommendations.

c.3.D. - can we change the passing grade to a "C" instead of "D" or is this just standardization? Some schools, I believe UNCW is one that allows Pass/Fail for Internship so we must accept "D" as it is passing. If that has changed, the Board has always wanted "C".

d. "The Board shall notify the applicant in writing if the applicant is ineligible for licensure" -- should we provide more clarification here, for example, will it be noted why they are ineligible/what criteria was not met for licensure? Yes, they receive denial letter listing the reason they are denied and how they can correct. Application remain open for 1 year for correction.

Endorsements - in general, I do not understand this. I am happy to schedule a phone meeting to discuss this, as it may be easier than an email explanation. I just want to know what this means for our profession and our practice.

Endorsement is reciprocity for those licensed in other states. Must be substantially equivalent or we could be holding NC residents to a higher standard so must be at minimum the same. I'll be happy to call her and discuss.

It would be appropriate to begin adopting the language approved by ATRA and CTRA wherein therapeutic recreation is the field, recreational therapy is the practice, and recreational therapists are the practitioners. This would then be used throughout the entire document; there are several places wherein the language is inconsistent with these three terms.

We cannot change terminology in the law unless through legislative amendment and now is not the time to consider going back to the General Assembly.

Per our conversation regarding our curriculum change, this should include a clause that states that these additional health and human services courses may also be in recreational therapy as long as they go above and beyond the six required for practice and three required for support coursework.

Recreational Therapy is a Health and Human services so redundant to make that statement. NCBRTL has always accept RT courses as H&HS courses. Impossible to list all possibilities for all universities titles of H&HS courses. Ex. Are given. The courses that should be used to meet support content requirements are those that are useful to practice as a recreational therapist. For example, kinesiology or biomechanics, counseling or helping skills, motor learning, educational or cognitive psychology, psychology of adjustment, pharmacology, first aid and safety and courses in various aspects of health care (e.g. rehabilitation, mental health, legal aspects of health care, health care organization and delivery, etc.) are particularly helpful to the practice of recreational therapy in clinical settings and are recommended as support content courses. Courses such as Sociology, Rehabilitation, Medical Terminology, Gerontology, General Psychology, Special Education are nonexclusive recommendations.

Do you want this expanded to reflect the entire set of knowledge areas for the job analysis? Yes

I would specify semester vs. quarter hours; there are still some universities out there on quarters. You do state semester hours under the section on supportive coursework. That was taken out several years ago NC Community College system uses semester. I can't remember the last qtr hour transcript we have received. Unaware of nay other two year RT programs in the US.

This will need to be changed to meet the increasing requirements from NCTRC. Perhaps but not necessarily so and will wait until it occurs because if NCBRTL puts in Rules then it has to be a current requirement..

Just for point of discussion, but not necessarily amendment of the rules at this point, has the Board considered accepting students from accredited PROGRAMS (vs. universities)? This would increase the level of competence for students practicing in state. I do see the reference to CARTE/ CAAHEP below. A NCBRTL will not pass something that would not accept a NC school.

There should also be a sentence that states that all students completing field placements outside of the state should be under supervisors with the appropriate credential for that state. State reciprocity is not listed as internship qualification, NCTRC Certification is.

Did this change? Aren't applications now being accepted/ reviewed on a rolling basis? Yes, so it will be a part of this Rule Update.

May want to specify that it is the Job Analysis Knowledge Areas. Individuals will sometimes confuse these with the Job Tasks.

Last I knew, ATRA is no longer following IACET guidelines. NCTRC, however, is completing pre-approval processes in other manners. I am unsure if you want to update this section to reflect the changes over the last three years. Always a problem of accepting non accredited Continuing Ed, no one monitors the content nor the presenter but the issue continues but will take out IACET Accreditation portion

I am not stating that the rule should be changed, but that NCBRTL consistently remind NCRTA and surrounding states of the requirements for this letter. NCRTA, SRTS and TR div knows this, out of state is always educational curve. Practitioners should be responsible for asking for it, personal responsibility. NCBRTL always repeats requirements.

I believe that payment should not be considered a compliance violation. There needs to be a way to fine individuals for late fees, and then after a second warning/ timeline have them been in a compliance violation. It is different to not have your continuing education completed rather than to forget to pay your fee. This should be rewritten.

There is no fine for being late written in the law therefore we have no legal authority to issue one. There is no other avenue available for late or expired license except re-application. Expiration after missed due date means just that, License expires. So reapplying is only avenue. Reinstatment is available for 60 days past expiration. Again to change this would be Chapter 90C amendment through General Assembly. Too risky to lose the law completely at this time. NCBRTL only had Eight LRTs had to be Reinistated in 2017 and only two so far in 2018 so it is not a very large percentage of LRT who have to do this. Vast majority are compliant especially since Compliance and Ethics Training was established. Unfortunately, our LRTs are not so good about reading the stated requirements (presented with their license) and the 3 email notifications they receive.
