EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 138 EMERGENCY RELIEF FOR DAMAGE CAUSED BY HURRICANE BONNIE

WHEREAS, I have proclaimed that a state of emergency and threatened disaster exists in North Carolina due to Hurricane Bonnie; and

WHEREAS, the United States Department of Transportation, in conjunction with the North Carolina Department of Transportation, has declared a regional emergency justifying an exemption from 49 C.F.R. 390-399 (Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations); and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of N.C.G.S. 166A-4(3) and 166A-6(c)(3), the Governor, with the concurrence of the Council of State, may regulate and control the flow of vehicular traffic and the operation of transportation services; and

WHEREAS, with the concurrence of the Council of State, I have found that if vehicles bearing food, equipment, and supplies to relieve our hurricane-stricken counties must adhere to the weight restrictions of N.C.G.S. 20-88, 20-96 and 20-118, citizens in those counties likely will suffer losses and, therefore, there is an imminent threat of widespread damage within the meaning of N.C.G.S. 166A-4(3);

THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor by the Constitution and laws of this State, and with the concurrence of the Council of State, 1T IS ORDERED:

Section 1. The Division of Motor Vehicles shall waive size and weight restrictions and penalties therefor arising under N.C. G.S. 20-88, 20-96, and 20-118 for vehicles transporting food, equipment, and supplies, including necessary utility vehicles along our highways to North Carolina's hurricanestricken counties.

Section 2. Notwithstanding the waivers set forth above, restrictions and penalties shall not be waived under the following conditions:

- (A) When the vehicle weight exceeds the maximum gross vehicle weight criteria established by the manufacturer (GVWR) or 90,000 pounds gross vehicle weight, whichever is less.
- (B) When tandem axle weights exceed 42,000 pounds and single axle weights exceed 22,000 pounds.
- (C) When vehicle/vehicle combination exceeds 12 feet in width and a total overall combination vehicle length of 65 feet from bumper to bumper.

Section 3.

(A) Upon entering North Carolina, the vehicles will stop at the first available vehicle weight station and produce identification sufficient to

- establish that its load will be used for the Hurricane Bonnie relief and recovery effort. All other safety restrictions apply. If returning vehicles are loaded with backhhaul unrelated to Hurricane Bonnie, all normal weight and permit restrictions apply.
- (B) The \$50.00 fee listed in N.C.G.S. 105-449.49 for a temporary trip permit is waived for the vehicles described above. The penalties described in N.C.G.S. 20-382 concerning insurance registration are waived also. Finally, no quarterly fuel tax is required because the exception in N.C.G.S. 105-449.45(a)(1) applies.
- (C) The vehicles will be allowed only in primary and interstate routes designated by the North Carolina Department of Transportation.

Section 4. Vehicles described in Section 1 which are nonparticipants in North Carolina's International Registration Plan will be permitted to pass through North Carolina in accordance with the spirit of the exemptionS identified by this Executive Order.

Section 5. The North Carolina Department of Transportation shall enforce the conditions set forth in Sections 1, 2, and 3 in a manner which would best accomplish the implementation of this rule without endangering motorists in North Carolina.

<u>Section</u> <u>6</u>. This Order shall not be in effect on bridges posted pursuant to N.C.G.S. 136-72.

This Executive Order shall be effective immediately and shall remain in effect for 30 days.

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 139 PSYCHOLOGISTS AND SOCIAL WORKERS LICENSED OR CERTIFIED OUT OF STATE PERMITTED TO PROVIDE CRISIS COUNSELING FOR VICTIMS OF HURRICANE BONNIE

WHEREAS, Hurricane Bonnie has had a devastating impact on the State of North Carolina; and,

WHEREAS, the American Red Cross is able to provide qualified psychologists and social workers licensed or certified outside the State of North Carolina to assist victims of Hurricane Bonnie, and disaster relief workers, with crisis counseling; and,

WHEREAS, the provision of these psychologists and social workers would be of great value to those in need of such services; and,

WHEREAS, the North Carolina General Statutes and the North Carolina Administrative Code impose certain licensure requirements on out of state psychologists and certification requirements on social workers; and,

WHEREAS, to gain the full benefit of the services to be provided, there is a need to temporarily suspend these requirements.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor by the Constitution and laws of this State, IT IS ORDERED:

Section 1. Psychologists licensed outside of the State of North Carolina provided by the American Red Cross for the provision of crisis counseling to North Carolina victims of Hurricane Bonnie, including disaster relief workers, shall be permitted to engage in the practice of psychology in this State, for the limited purposes expressed herein and on a voluntary basis only, for the duration of this Executive Order.

Section 2. Psychologists subject to this Executive Order shall be exempt from the licensure requirements of the North Carolina Psychology Practice Act (N.C.G.S. Chapter 90, Article

18A) and any related Administrative Rules within the North Carolina Administrative Code.

Section 3. Social workers licensed outside the State of North Carolina provided by the American Red Cross for the provision of crisis counseling to North Carolina victims of Hurricane Bonnie, including disaster relief workers, shall be permitted to provide crisis intervention, problem management, case management, and general counseling, for the limited purposes expressed herein and on a voluntary basis only, for the duration of this Executive Order.

Section 4. Social workers subject to this Executive Order shall be exempt from the certification requirements of the North Carolina Social Worker Certification Act (N.C.G.S. Chapter 90B) and any related Administrative Rules within the North Carolina Administrative Code.

This Executive Order shall be effective immediately and shall remain in effect for thirty days.

CHAPTER 10 - WILDLIFE RESOURCES AND WATER SAFETY

Statement of the Subject Matter: No Wake Zones

Reason for Proposed Action: The local county Board of Commissioners initiated the no-wake zones pursuant to G.S. 75A-15 to protect public safety in the area by restricting vessel speed. The Wildlife Resources Commission may adopt this rule as a temporary rule pursuant to S.L. 1997-0403 following this abbreviated notice.

Comment Procedures: The record will be open for receipt of written comments from October 1, 1998 to December 1, 1998. Such written comments must be delivered or mailed to the NC Wildlife Resources Commission, 512 N. Salisbury Street, Raleigh, NC 27604-1188.

This Section contains the text of proposed rules. At least 60 days prior to the publication of text, the agency published a Notice of Rule-making Proceedings. The agency must accept comments on the proposed rule for at least 30 days from the publication date, or until the public hearing, or a later date if specified in the notice by the agency. The required comment period is 60 days for a rule that has a substantial economic impact of at least five million dollars (\$5,000,000). Statutory reference: G.S. 150B-21.2.

TITLE 10 - DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

Notice is hereby given in accordance with G.S. 150B-21.2 that the Commission for Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities and Substance Abuse Services intends to adopt rules cited as 10 NCAC 14V .4301 - .4306. Notice of Rulemaking Proceedings was published in the Register on April 1, 1998.

Reason for Proposed Action: Therapeutic Communities provide a unique approach to substance abuse treatment that does not fit into any of the existing licensed categories. Therefore, it is necessary to promulgate rules for the licensing of these facilities in order to ensure the health and safety of clients served.

Comment Procedures: Written comments should be submitted to Charlotte F. Hall, Rule-making Coordinator, Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities and Substance Abuse Services, 325 N. Salisbury Street, Albemarle Building, Suite 1156, Raleigh, NC 27603-5906.

CHAPTER 14 - MENTAL HEALTH: GENERAL

SUBCHAPTER 14V - RULES FOR MENTAL HEALTH, DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES, AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE FACILITIES AND SERVICES

SECTION .4300 - THERAPEUTIC COMMUNITY

.4301 SCOPE

(a) A Therapeutic Community is a highly structured, supervised, 24-hour residential facility designed to treat the behavioral and emotional issues of individuals to promote self-sufficiency and a crime and drug-free lifestyle.

- (b) The Therapeutic Community shall emphasize self-help, abstinence from drugs and alcohol. personal growth, peer support, and may serve as an alternative to incarceration.
- (c) Services shall be designed to create the environment of an extended family in which individuals develop self-esteem, construct a productive lifestyle through peer support and actual experience, leading to a successful re-entry into the larger community.
- (d) The facility shall provide or ensure access to a variety of intensive therapy and program milieu approaches designed to confront and modify the client's anti-social and dysfunctional behavior:
 - (1) the goal shall be to assist the client in learning socially acceptable skills for coping with responsibilities and relationships, and to maintain a lifestyle which is substance abuse free; and
 - (2) <u>consideration shall be given to meeting client needs in social, medical, psychological, vocational and educational areas.</u>
- (e) If children are residing in a Therapeutic Community, the facility shall also meet the rules for Therapeutic Homes for Individuals with Substance Abuse Disorders and Their Children set forth in Section .4100 of this Subchapter except for 10 NCAC 14V. 4102(c), 4102(e), .4103(2), and .4104(b).

Authority G.S. 143B-147.

.4302 DEFINITIONS

In addition to the terms defined in G.S. 122C-3 and Rule .0103 of this Subchapter, the following terms shall apply:

- (1) "ADD/ADHD" means the same as described in DSM-IV Diagnoses and Codes.
- (2) "Qualified therapeutic community professional" means:
 - (a) a person who has graduated from a licensed or nationally accrediated therapeutic community and has five years of supervised experience in a therapeutic community, or
 - (b) <u>has a bachelor's degree and two years of experience in a licensed 24-Hour residential facility or service for substance abuse, or</u>
 - (c) is a certified substance abuse counselor with two years experience in a licensed 24-Hour residential facility or service for substance abuse, or
 - (d) <u>has 10 years of supervised experience in licensed 24-Hour residential facility or service for substance abuse.</u>

Authority G.S. 143B-147.

.4303 STAFF

- (a) A minimum of one staff member shall be present at all times when an adult or child is on the premises, except when an adult client has been deemed capable of remaining in the facility without supervision for a specified time by a qualified therapeutic community professional.
- (b) Staff-client ratios in the facilities shall be 1:30 and a minimum of one qualified therapeutic community professional shall be available for each 100 clients in a facility.
- (c) Each direct care staff member shall receive training in the following areas within 90 days of employment:
 - (1) the history, philosophy and operations of the therapeutic community;
 - (2) manipulative, anti-social and self-defeating behaviors;
 - (3) behavior modification techniques; and
 - (4) in programs which serve as alternatives to incarceration, training shall be received on:
 - (A) personality traits of offenders and criminogenic behavior; and
 - (B) the criminal justice system.
- (d) Each direct care staff member shall receive continuing education which shall include understanding the nature of addiction, the withdrawal syndrome, symptoms of secondary complications to substance abuse or drug addiction, HIV/AIDS, sexually-transmitted diseases, and drug screening.
- (e) In a facility with children and pregnant women, each direct care staff member shall receive training in:
 - (1) <u>developmentally-appropriate</u> <u>child</u> <u>behavior</u> <u>management;</u>
 - (2) signs and symptoms of pre-term labor;
 - (3) signs and symptoms of post-partum depression;
 - (4) therapeutic parenting skills;
 - (5) <u>dynamics and needs of children and adults</u> <u>diagnosed as ADD/ADHD;</u>
 - (6) domestic violence, sexual abuse and sexual assault;
 - (7) pregnancy, delivery and well-child care; and
 - (8) infant feeding, including breast feeding.

Authority G.S. 143B-147.

.4304 OPERATIONS

- (a) Admission to a Therapeutic Community facility shall be a joint decision of the qualified therapeutic community professional, direct care staff and the individual.
- (b) Each facility shall operate in partnership with the staff and the self-government structure of the program.
- (c) The services of a qualified therapeutic community professional shall be available on an as-needed basis.
- (d) Each individual admitted to a facility shall receive services appropriate to his or her needs and age.
- (e) The purpose of this program shall be to provide clients with on-the-job work skills, training and work ethic development, and to provide revenue to support the program:
 - (1) a component of some therapeutic communities is business training schools, licensed when appropriate, which may include moving and storage, landscaping, construction, telemarketing, secretarial

- and clerical, retail sales, and temporary job placement. Revenue produced through the operation of business training schools shall be placed in the general operating fund.
- (2) residents shall not receive any income; and
- (3) programs may accept clients at no charge and shall provide an opportunity for clients to pay for their own treatment.
- (f) Each facility shall provide or have access to the following services:
 - (1) <u>a structured environment which emphasizes</u> <u>behavior change and cognitive skills;</u>
 - (2) <u>assessment of the appropriateness for participation</u> in a therapeutic community or referral elsewhere;
 - (3) recovery skills;
 - (4) relationship skills;
 - (5) communication skills;
 - (6) coordination of support services;
 - (7) <u>interactive training for employment;</u>
 - (8) recreational and enrichment skills;
 - (9) <u>life skills which promote self-sufficiency;</u>
 - (10) parenting skills;
 - (11) drug and crime free education; and
 - (12) after care and transitional living services skills.

SECTION .0100 - APPEALS PROCEDURE FOR LEVEL OF CARE CHANGE IN LONG TERM CARE FACILITIES

.0101 PURPOSE: SCOPE AND NOTICE OF CHANGE IN LEVEL OF CARE

- (a) The purpose of the rules in this Section is to specify the policies and procedures to provide for recipient/applicant or his/her representative requests for an informal appeal of decisions changing a Medicaid recipient/applicant's level of care, denial, termination, suspension, or reduction of prior approval requests for Medicaid covered medical services or for other Medicaid covered medical services. These policies and procedures do not apply to provider requests for Reconsideration Review of DMA provider post payment review decisions set out in 10 NCAC 26G.
 - (b) The rules in this Section apply to decisions made by the

Division of Medical Assistance "(DMA)", a Medical Review Independent Professional Review Team "(MR/IPR)", a Prior Approval Unit "(PAU)", other Agencies, or other entities acting as agents of this State agency. Rule 10 NCAC 14C .1151 applies to decisions made by area programs contracting with the Carolina Alternatives program.

- (c) The decision making body as set out in Paragraph (b) of this Rule shall, within two working days, notify the recipient/applicant in writing of the decision and the following:
 - (1) the effective date of the decision denying, terminating, reducing, or suspending a service;
 - (2) the reasons for the agency decision:
 - (3) the specific regulations that support, or the change in Federal or State law that requires the decision;
 - (4) the date Medicaid payment will cease, if applicable; at least 11 days after the date of the notification letter:
 - (5) the opportunity for informal and formal appeal of this decision and procedures for requesting such an appeal; and
 - (6) the fact that, if appealed, payment for the currently certified level of care or approved service will continue for an eligible Medicaid recipient pending appeal.

SECTION .0100 - DELEGATION OF AUTHORITY TO ENFORCE THE COMMISSION FOR HEALTH SERVICES SANITATION RULES

.0101 SCOPE OF DELEGATED AUTHORITY

No person shall act as an authorized agent of the state in enforcing the provisions of G.S. 130A and the rules of the Commission for Health Services who is not a current employee of a local health department, registered with the North Carolina State Board of Sanitarian Examiners as a Registered Sanitarian or Sanitarian Intern and authorized pursuant to these Rules. Except as provided in Rule .0105 of this Section, an authorization shall be valid only in the county or district served by the local health department which employs the agent. There shall be seven areas of authorization to enforce the provisions of G.S. 130A and the rules of the Commission for Health Services found in Chapter 18A as follows:

- (1) Food, Lodging, and Institution Sanitation including the following:
 - (a) .1000 Sanitation of Summer Camps,
 - (b) .1300 Sanitation of Hospitals; Nursing and Rest Homes; Sanitariums, Sanitoriums; Educational and other Institutions,
 - (c) .1500 Sanitation of Local Confinement

Facilities,

- (d) .1600 Sanitation of Residential Care Facilities,
- (e) .1800 Sanitation of Lodging Establishments,
- (f) .2100 Rules Governing the Sanitation & Safety of Migrant Housing,
- (g) .2200 Sanitation of Bed and Breakfast Homes.
- (h) .2400 Sanitation of Public, Private, and Religious Schools,
- (i) .2600 Sanitation of Restaurants and Other Foodhandling Establishments.
- (i) .2700 Sanitation of Meat Markets, and
- (k) .3000 Bed and Breakfast Inns.
- (2) On-Site Wastewater, including the following:
 - (a) .1900 Sewage Treatment and Disposal Systems,
 - (b) .1603 and .1606, 1611(a) and (b) and .1613
 Sanitation of Residential Care Facilities
 (Family Foster Homes), and
 - (c) .2100 Rules Governing the Sanitation and Safety of Migrant Housing.
- (3) .2800 Sanitation of Child Care Centers.
- (4) <u>.3100 Lead Poisoning Prevention in Children Program.</u>
- (5) .2500 Public Swimming Pools.
- (6) .3200 Tattooing.
- (7) .1603, .1606, .1611(a) and (b), .1613 Sanitation of Residential Care Facilities (Family Foster Homes) and .2100 Rules Governing the Sanitation and Safety of Migrant Housing.

.0102 ELIGIBILITY FOR DELEGATION OF AUTHORITY

- (a) The applicant shall successfully complete a centralized training course approved by the Division.
- (b) The applicant shall successfully complete all required orientation activities and field practice and review established by the Division.
- (c) When the supervisor determines that the applicant has progressed sufficiently to work independently, the supervisor may request the applicant be evaluated for authorization. Documentation of the satisfactory completion of all required orientation activities and field practice, including any inspection or evaluation forms completed by the applicant and comments of the supervisor shall be forwarded to the regional specialist.
- (d) 1f, upon reviewing the file, the regional specialist finds that the applicant needs additional study or field practice, the evaluation for authorization may be postponed until that study or practice has been completed.
- (e) Upon satisfactory completion of the requirements in Paragraphs (a)-(d) of this Rule, the regional specialist shall coordinate the administration of a written test which the applicant must pass by a score of 70 percent or more. The test may be repeated if necessary.

- (f) An applicant requesting authorization for 15A NCAC 18A .3100 Lead Poisoning Prevention in Children Program shall be required to take and successfully complete the North Carolina State of Practice course entitled "Lead Investigation and Abatement" and shall pass the written test provided by that course. An applicant requesting authorization for only 15A NCAC 18A Lead Poisoning Prevention in Children Program shall not be required to take the exam required in Paragraph (e) of this Rule.
- (g) After the applicant has successfully completed the written test, the regional specialist shall conduct a field evaluation of the applicant's knowledge, skills, and ability to enforce the provisions of G.S. 130A and the rules of the Commission. Following the field evaluation, the regional specialist shall make a recommendation to the Director of the Division of Environmental Health regarding issuance or denial of authorization.

.0103 DELEGATION OF AUTHORITY

Upon determination that the criteria in Rules .0101 and .0102 of this Section have been met and none of the reasons for denial listed in Rule .0107 of this Section exist, and upon a review of the recommendation of the regional specialist, the Director, Division of Environmental Health, shall issue or deny authorization. An Identification Card shall be issued by the Division to each person authorized to enforce provisions of G.S. 130A and the rules of the Commission. The card shall be carried by the agent at all times when on duty. The card is the property of the Division and shall be returned to the Division upon separation of employment, suspension, or revocation of authorization or failure to maintain registration with the N.C. Board of Sanitarian Examiners.

.0104 LAPSED DELEGATIONS

<u>The local supervisor shall request authorization for an individual whose authorization in one or more areas of authorization has lapsed.</u>

- (1) An individual whose authorization in an area of authorization has lapsed for a period of up to three years shall be required to complete training, which may also include portions of the centralized training course, as determined by the regional specialist after a field evaluation of the applicant's knowledge, skills, and ability to enforce the rules.
- (2) An individual whose authorization in an area of authorization has lapsed for a period of three years to five years shall be required to meet all of the requirements which apply to new applicants, except that the individual shall be required to attend only the portions of the centralized training course which are directly applicable to the area of authorization requested.
- (3) An individual whose authorization in an area of authorization has lapsed for a period longer than

<u>five years shall be required to meet all requirements</u> which apply to new applicants.

.0105 AGENTS SERVING AS CONTRACTORS

The Division may allow an agent who is authorized in a specific local health department to contract with another local health department to provide services to the other local health department. When a local health department contracts for such services, the contracting department shall provide a statement to the Division on progress made to employ an individual who may be considered for authorization.

- (1) A contract shall be created between the contracting local health department and the agent (contractor) to include at least the following provisions:
 - (a) Names and addresses of each party.
 - (b) Scope of work to be performed.
 - (c) A requirement that the original public records remain in the local health department in which the work is performed. The public records shall be left at the local health department or with an individual employed by the local health department who shall be responsible for returning said records to the local health department within two business days of the service provided.
 - (d) Designation of the party responsible for maintaining public records created by the agent.
 - (e) A requirement that the contracting agent be available for consultation to the public being served during usual business hours.
 - (f) A requirement that the contracting agent be available for any hearing or other legal proceeding which may ensue from activities conducted by the agent.
- (2) The contracting agent shall maintain a list of each activity and the date performed for review in accordance with Item (3) of this Rule.
- (3) Each public record created by the contracting agent shall be reviewed, dated, and initialed by an authorized agent of the contracting local health department. In addition, at least 10 percent of the activities performed by the agent shall be reviewed in the field by an authorized agent employed by the contracting local health department. If the local health department contracting has no authorized agent, the Division shall conduct a review of each public record created by the contracting agent. In addition, at least 10 percent of the activities performed by the agent shall be reviewed on-site in the field by the Division. The review shall be conducted each month and shall cover the previous month's activities conducted by the agent.

.0106 EVALUATION

The regional specialist may, at any time, evaluate the performance of an authorized agent.

.0107 DENIAL, SUSPENSION AND REVOCATION

- (a) The Director, Division of Environmental Health, may deny, suspend, or revoke the authorization to act as an agent of the State for any of the following:
 - (1) <u>failure to satisfy the requirements for authorization in Rules .0101, .0102 .0103, .0105 and .0106 of this Section:</u>
 - (2) <u>fraud, deceit, dishonesty, or perjury in obtaining</u> <u>authorization or in performing authorized duties;</u>
 - (3) drug or alcohol induced intoxication on duty;
 - (4) <u>incompetency or unprofessionalism in performing</u> authorized duties;
 - (5) neglect of duty; or
 - (6) <u>failure to properly interpret and enforce laws, rules,</u> and policies.
- (b) Alternatively, the Director, Division of Environmental Health may place an individual on conditional status for a period not to exceed six months if the individual's failure to properly enforce laws, rules and policies may be corrected with additional education and oversight. The Director may suspend or revoke the authorization anytime during the conditional period if satisfactory progress is not made and the Director shall suspend or revoke the authorization after the conditional period if the individual does not demonstrate the necessary knowledge, skills and ability to warrant an unconditional authorization.

.0108 RE-AUTHORIZATION

If an individual's authorization has been suspended, the authorization shall be reinstated upon determination by the Division that the reasons for suspension no longer exist. If an agent's authorization has been revoked for failure to comply with the requirements found in Rule .0107(a)(2) of this Section, the agent may not apply for reinstatement until five years after the revocation becomes effective. If an individual's authorization has been revoked for reasons other than those found in Rule .0107(a)(2) of this Section, the agent may reapply for authorization after six months from the date the revocation becomes effective by satisfying the requirements of Rules .0101, .0102 and .0103 of this Section. The Division may refuse to re-authorize an individual if the Division determines that the actions which were the basis for the revocation or suspension are likely to reoccur.

As a result of the NC Newborn Screening Program, infants may be diagnosed with a rare hemoglobin with symptomatic abnormal clinical manifestations and thalassemia disease, requiring medical services, but would not be covered by the NC Sickle Cell Syndrome Program. This rule change will now allow coverage for these rare occurrences.

15A NCAC 21H.0111 - This rule is proposed for amendment in order to extend NC Sickle Cell Syndrome Program coverage to children with sickle cell disease. This amendment is requested because of a change in the eligibility rules by the Children's Special Health Services (CSHS) Program which may cause some children with sickle cell disease to lose medical coverage. In order to assure that low income children with sickle cell disease are not denied medical coverage, the NC Sickle Cell Syndrome Program is requesting adoption of this amendment. Additionally, the NC Sickle Cell Syndrome Program is amending its eligibility requirements to include those children diagnosed with other rare hemoglobins with symptomatic abnormal clinical manifestations and thalassemia disease.

15A NCAC 21H.0113 - This rule is proposed for amendment in order to provide appropriate procedures for requesting services from the NC Sickle Cell Syndrome Program. Previously providers could only request services for adults through the Program and request reimbursement services for children through the Children's Special Health Services. This amendment will allow them to request reimbursement for both children and adults through the Program.

SECTION .0100 - SICKLE CELL SYNDROME: GENETIC COUNSELING: CHILDREN AND YOUTH SECTION

.0110 ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

- (a) Eligibility requirements for medical services shall be based on income and diagnosis. In order to be considered for medical services, the individual must be diagnosed as having one of the following disorders:
 - (1) sickle cell anemia,
 - (2) sickle cell/hemoglobin D disease,
 - (3) sickle cell/hemoglobin C disease,
 - (4) sickle cell beta thalassemia, or
 - (5) sickle cell hemoglobin that coexist with other abnormal hemoglobins with symptomatic abnormal clinical manifestations, manifestations, or
 - (6) other rare hemoglobins with symptomatic abnormal clinical manifestations, and
 - (7) thalassemia disease.
- (b) Financial eligibility for sickle cell syndrome program medical services shall be determined in accordance with rules found in 15A NCAC 24A.

.0111 MEDICAL SERVICES PROVIDED

(a) The North Carolina Sickle Cell Syndrome Program shall provide services only when they are not available through other sources or agencies. Prior to requesting services, it shall be determined that the patient is not eligible for services through the division of services for the blind; Medicaid and Medicare programs; school health program; vocational

rehabilitation; workmen's compensation or civilian health and medical programs of the uniformed services (CHAMPUS).

- (b) If an individual meets the eligibility requirements, he shall be provided the following medical services:
 - (1) For individuals below the age of 21, all outpatient and all inpatient care shall be paid for by the Crippled Children's Program, including all hospital and physician fees. For individuals 21 years of age and older, all outpatient and all inpatient care shall be paid for by the sickle cell syndrome program.
- (1)(2) inpatient care; Outpatient services include:
- (2)(A) routine visits to the physician;
- (3)(B) prescription drugs such as antibiotics; as specified by the Program;
- (4)(C) general analgesics;
- (5)(D) appliances;
- (6)(E) preventive and limited maintenance <u>dentistry</u> dentistry for adult patient only;
- (7)(F) obstetrical care (excluding delivery of baby); and
- (8)(G) eye care (when the division of services for the blind will not provide eoverage); coverage);
 - (9) psychiatric; and
 - (10) psychological counseling.

.0113 PROCEDURE FOR REQUESTING SERVICES

The request shall be made by completing the appropriate program authorization request form. The form shall include:
 - (1) biographical data of patient;
 - (2) diagnoses (primary and secondary);

 - (4) request and describe service:
 - (5) describe and justify treatment or service, list other providers and state drug information if applicable;
 - (6) check number services provided for ambulatory visits and answer all questions pertaining to patient's treatment and financial support; and
 - (7) signature of physician or dentist, address and date of request.
- (b) A financial eligibility form shall be submitted in accordance with rules found in 15A NCAC 24A.

Reason for Proposed Action:

15A NCAC 7H .1805 - The Coastal Resources Commission has agreed that North Carolina property owners should be able to protect their oceanfront property by bulldozing sand, in instances where sea turtle nests would not be damaged. In order to allow property owners to protect their homes during the current hurricane season, this Rule change must be implemented immediately. This amendment will allow beach bulldozing during the period of May 1 through November 15, provided the applicant receives prior approval from the Division of Coastal Management, in coordination with the NC Wildlife Resources Commission, the US Fish & Wildlife Service, and the US Army Corps of Engineers.

15A NCAC 7J.0204 - In order to relieve economic pressures for victims of Hurricane Bonnie, the Coastal Resources Commission voted to waive permit fees for the replacement of damaged structures within previously authorized or grandfathered dimensions, provided the permit application is submitted prior to September 1, 1999. In order to benefit property owners, this Rule must take effect immediately.

SUBCHAPTER 7H - STATE GUIDELINES FOR AREAS OF ENVIRONMENTAL CONCERN

SECTION .1800 - GENERAL PERMIT TO ALLOW BEACH BULLDOZING LANDWARD OF THE MEAN HIGH WATER MARK IN THE OCEAN HAZARD AEC

.1805 SPECIFIC CONDITIONS

- (a) The area in which this activity is being performed must maintain a slope of adequate grade so as to not endanger the public or the public's use of the beach and should follow the pre-emergency slopes as closely as possible. The movement of material by a bulldozer, front-end loader, backhoe, scraper or any type of earth moving or construction equipment shall not exceed 1 foot in depth measured from the pre-activity surface elevation.
- (b) The activity must not exceed the lateral bounds of the applicant's property unless he has the written permission of the adjoining landowner(s).
- (c) Movement of material from seaward of the mean high water line is not authorized.
- (d) The activity must not significantly increase erosion on neighboring properties and must not have a significant adverse effect on important natural or cultural resources.
- (e) Adding to dunes shall be accomplished in such a manner that the damage to existing vegetation is minimized. The fill areas will be immediately replanted or temporarily stabilized until planting can be successfully completed.
- (f) In order to minimize adverse impacts to nesting sea turtles, no work shall occur within the period of May 1 through November 15 of any year. year, without the prior approval of the Division of Coastal Management, in coordination with the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service and the United States Army Corps of Engineers.
- (g) If one contiguous acre or more of oceanfront property is to be excavated or filled, an erosion and sedimentation control plan must be filed with the Division of Land Resources, Land Quality Section, or appropriate local government having jurisdiction. This plan must be approved prior to commencing the land disturbing activity.

SUBCHAPTER 7J - PROCEDURES FOR HANDLING MAJOR DEVELOPMENT PERMITS, VARIANCE REQUESTS, APPEALS FROM MINOR DEVELOPMENT PERMIT DECISIONS. AND DECLARATORY RULINGS

SECTION .0200 - APPLICATION PROCESS

.0204 PROCESSING THE APPLICATION

(a) On receipt of a CAMA major development and/or dredge and fill permit application by the Department, a letter shall be sent to the applicant within a reasonable time

acknowledging receipt.

- (b) Application processing will begin when an application is accepted as complete. Before an application will be accepted as complete, the following requirements must be met;
 - (1) a current application form must be submitted;
 - (2) all questions on the application form must be completed or the letters "N/A" must be placed in each section that does not apply;
 - (3) an accurate work plan as described in 15A NCAC 7J .0203 herein must be attached to all CAMA major development and/or dredge and fill permit applications;
 - (4) a copy of a deed or other instrument under which the applicant claims title must accompany a CAMA major development and/or dredge and fill permit application;
 - (5) notice to adjacent riparian landowners must be given as follows:
 - (A) Certified return mail receipts (or copies thereof) indicating that adjacent riparian landowners (as identified in the permit application) have been sent a copy of the application for the proposed development must be included in a CAMA major development and/or dredge and fill permit application. Said landowners have 30 days from the date of notification in which to comment. Such comments will be considered by the Department in reaching a final decision on the application.
 - (B) For CAMA minor development permits, the applicant must give actual notice of his intention to develop his property and apply for a CAMA minor development permit to all adjacent riparian landowners. Actual notice can be given by sending a certified letter, informing the adjoining property owner in person or by telephone, or by using any other method which satisfies the Local Permit Officers that a good faith effort has been made to provide the required notice:
 - (6) the application fee must be paid as set out in this Subparagraph:
 - (A) Major development permit a check or money order payable to the Department for two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00).
 - (B) Minor development permit a check or money order payable to the permit-letting agency in the amount of fifty dollars (\$50.00). Monies so collected may be used only in the administration of the permit program.
 - (C) Replacement of hurricane-damaged structures

 no application fee shall be charged for
 permit applications submitted prior to
 September 1, 1999 for the replacement,
 within previously authorized or grandfathered
 dimensions, of structures that were damaged
 or destroyed by wind or water associated with

Hurricane Bonnie.

- (7) any other information the Department or local permit officer deems necessary for a thorough and complete review of the application must be provided. Any application not in compliance with these requirements will be returned to the applicant along with a cover letter explaining the deficiencies of the application and will not be considered accepted until it is resubmitted and determined to be complete and sufficient. If a local permit officer receives an application for a permit that the local permit officer lacks authority to grant, the permit officer shall return the application with information as to how the application may be properly considered; and
- (8) For development proposals subject to review under the North Carolina Environmental Policy Act (NCEPA), NCGS 113A-100 et. seq., the permit application will be complete only on submission of the appropriate environmental assessment document.
- (c) Upon acceptance of a major development and/or dredge and fill permit as complete, the Department shall, within a reasonable time, send a letter to the applicant setting forth the data on which acceptance was made.
- (d) If the application is found to be incomplete or inaccurate after processing has begun or if additional information from the applicant is necessary to adequately assess the project, the processing will be terminated pending receipt of the necessary changes or necessary information from the applicant. During the pendency of any termination of processing, the permit processing period will not run. If the changes or additional information significantly alters the project proposal, the application will be considered new and the permit processing period will begin to run from that date.
- (e) Any violation occurring at a proposed project site for which an application is being reviewed will be processed according to the procedures in 7J .0408 0410. If the violation substantially altered the proposed project site, and restoration is deemed necessary, the applicant will be notified that processing of the application will be suspended pending compliance with the notice of required restoration. Satisfactory restoration of any unauthorized development that has substantially altered a project site is deemed necessary to allow a complete review of the application and an accurate assessment of the project's potential impacts. The applicant will be notified that permit processing has resumed, and that a new processing deadline has been established once the required restoration has been deemed satisfactory by the Division of Coastal Management or Local Permit Officer.
- (f) If during the public comment period a question is raised as to public rights of access across the subject property, the Division of Coastal Management will examine the access issue prior to making a permit decision. Any individual or governmental entity initiating action to judicially recognize a public right of access must obtain a court order to suspend processing of the permit application. Should the parties to legal action resolve the issue, permit processing will continue.

Reason for Proposed Action: To set/amend the rule regarding Migratory Game Birds in order to delineate the area of an experimental September teal season. Delineation of the area of the September teal season is necessary to properly manage and conserve wildlife resources. This proposed rule change is based on the Federal Frameworks for 1998-99 Early Hunting on Certain Migratory Game Birds published by the Department of the Interior.

Comment Procedures: The North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission has the authority to adopt temporary rules pursuant to S.L. 1997-0403. This temporary rule is adopted following a public notice as published in Volume 13, Issue 4 of the North Carolina Register. This temporary rule filing will also serve as a Notice of Rule-Making proceedings for a conforming amendment to the permanent rule.

CHAPTER 10 - WILDLIFE RESOURCES AND WATER SAFETY

SUBCHAPTER 10B - HUNTING AND TRAPPING

SECTION .0100 - GENERAL REGULATIONS

.0105 MIGRATORY GAME BIRDS

- (a) Cooperative State Rules
 - (1) The taking of sea ducks (scoter, eider and old squaw) during any special federally-announced season for these species shall be limited to the waters of the Atlantic Ocean, and to those coastal waters south of US 64 which are separated by a distance of at least 800 yards of open water from any shore, island or marsh.
 - (2) The extra daily bag and possession limits allowed by the federal regulations on scaup apply in all coastal waters east of U.S. Highway 17, except Currituck

- Sound north of US 158.
- Tundra swans may be taken during the open season (3) by permit only subject to limitations imposed by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service. A limited number of nontransferable swan permits will be issued by the Wildlife Resources Commission to applicants who will be selected at random by computer, and only one swan may be taken under each permit which must be cancelled at the time of the kill by cutting out the month and day of the kill. Accompanying the permit is a tag which must be affixed to the swan at the time and place of the kill. The tag must be affixed in accordance with instructions provided with the permit. In addition, a preaddressed post-paid card is supplied to each permittee on which to report the number of days hunted and the details of the kill if made. It is unlawful to hunt swans without having the permit and the tag in possession or to possess a swan without the cancelled permit in possession and the tag properly affixed to the swan. It is unlawful to possess a swan permit or tag while hunting that was assigned to another person or to alter the permit or tag in any way other than cutting out the proper month and day of kill.
- (4) Canada geese may be taken during the open season by permit holders only subject to limitations imposed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Permits will be issued by the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission. It is unlawful to hunt or possess Canada geese without having the permit in possession. It is unlawful to possess a Canada goose permit while hunting that was assigned to another person or to alter the permit in any way.
- (b) Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 113-291.1(a) and (b), the following restrictions apply to the taking of migratory game birds:
 - (1) No migratory game bird may be taken:
 - (A) With a rifle;
 - (B) With a shotgun of any description capable of holding more than three shells, unless it is plugged with a one-piece filler, incapable of removal without disassembling the gun, so as to limit its total capacity to not more than three shells.
 - (2) No migratory game bird may be taken:
 - (A) From or by the use of a sinkbox or any other type of low floating device affording the hunter a means of concealment beneath the surface of the water;
 - (B) With the aid of bait, or on, over or within 300 yards of any place where any grain, salt or other feed is exposed so as to constitute an attraction to migratory game birds or has been so exposed during any of the 10 consecutive days preceding the taking, except that this Part shall not apply to standing crops, flooded

croplands, grain crops properly shocked on the field where grown, or grains found scattered solely as the result of normal agricultural planting or harvesting;

- (C) With the aid of live decoys, or on, over or within 300 yards of any place where tame or captive migratory game birds are present. unless such birds are and have been for a period of 10 consecutive days prior to such taking confined within an enclosure which substantially reduces the audibility of their calls and totally conceals them from the sight of wild migratory game birds.
- (3) Waterfowl hunting and harassment and other unauthorized activities shall be prohibited on posted waterfowl management areas established by the Wildlife Resources Commission for Canada Geese and ducks restoration.
- (4) In that area of Roanoke Sound adjacent to and immediately Northeast of Roanoke Island as marked by buoys designating the waterfowl rest area, it shall be unlawful to harass or take any waterfowl.
- (5) The area east of US 17 shall be designated as an experimental September teal season zone as referenced by the Federal frameworks calling for state rules designating experimental areas.

The Wildlife Resources Commission may adopt this as a temporary rule pursuant to S.L. 1997-0403 following the abbreviated notice as indicated in the notice of rule-making proceedings or following the public hearing and public comment period as indicated in this notice.

Comment Procedures: The North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission has the authority to adopt temporary rules pursuant to S.L. 1997-0403. Interested persons may present their views either orally or in writing at the October 30, 1998 public hearing. SUBCHAPTER 10F - MOTORBOATS AND WATER SAFETY

SECTION .0300 - LOCAL WATER SAFETY REGULATIONS

.0330 CARTERET COUNTY

- (a) Regulated Areas. This Rule applies to the following waters in Carteret County:
 - (1) the waters of Money Island Slough beginning at the east end of Money Island near the Anchorage Marina Basin and ending at the west end of Money Island where Brooks Avenue deadends at the slough:
 - (2) the waters of Taylor Creek located within the territorial limits of the Town of Beaufort;
 - (3) the waters of Pelletier Creek beginning at the entrance to Pelletier Creek at the Intracoastal Waterway and ending at U.S. Highway 70;
 - (4) the waters of Bogue Sound in Morehead City between Sugar Loaf Island and the seawall on the south side of Evans, Shepard and Shackleford Streets and bounded on the east by the State Ports Authority and on the west by the eastern right-of-way margin of South 13th Street extended:

- (5) the waters of Gallant's Channel from the US 70 crossing over the Grayden Paul bridge to Taylor's Creek:
- (6) the waters of Cedar Island Bay and Harbor from U.S. 70 to Cedar Island Bay Channel Light 8;
- (7) the waters of Radio Island Creek; the waters of the small cove on the west side of Radio Island immediately south of the B & M Railroad and US 70 Bridges across the Intracoastal Waterway in which Radio Island Marina and Morehead Sports Marina are located as delineated by appropriate markers:
- (8) the waters of the Newport River beginning at the north side of the Beaufort Drawbridge and ending at marker #6:
- (9) the waters of Spooners Creek within the territorial limits of the Town of Morehead City as delineated by appropriate markers; beginning 100 feet south of the bulkhead area in the entrance to Spooners Creek and extending approximately 500 feet up Spooners Creek to a point on the north side of the first fork to the east as indicated by the appropriate markers;
- (10) the waters of Taylor's Creek from the eastern end of the current no wake zone eastward to Channel Marker #1A: #1A;
- (11) the waters of the Newport River at Bogue Sound including all waters surrounding the Port of Morehead City to Brandt Island as delineated by

appropriate markers.

- (b) Speed Limit. It is unlawful to operate a motorboat or vessel at a speed greater than no-wake speed while on the waters of the regulated areas designated in Paragraph (a) of this Rule.
- (c) Placement and Maintenance of Markers. The Board of Commissioners of Carteret County, with respect to the regulated areas designated in Subparagraphs (1), (3), (5), (6), (7), (8), (9) and (10) of Paragraph (a) of this Rule, and the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Beaufort, with respect to the regulated area designated in Subparagraph (2) of Paragraph (a) of this Rule, and the Board of Commissioners of Morehead City, with respect to Subparagraph (4) and (9) of Paragraph (a) of this Rule, and the North Carolina Sate Ports Authority, with respect to the regulated area designed in Subparagraph (11) of Paragraph (a) of this Rule are designated as suitable agencies for placement and maintenance of the markers implementing this Rule, subject to the approval of the United States Coast Guard and the United States Army Corps of Engineers.

September 17, 1998 MINUTES

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The meeting was called to order at 10:02 a.m. with Chairman Powell presiding. He asked for any discussion, comments, or corrections concerning the minutes of the August 20, 1998 meeting. There being none, the minutes were approved.

LOG OF FILINGS

Chairman Powell presided over the review of the log and all rules were unanimously approved with the following exceptions:

12 NCAC 11 .0501: JUSTICE/NC Alarm Systems Licensing Board – The Commission objected to this rule due to lack of necessity. There are no requirements or authorizations in .0501 and it is thus unnecessary.

12 NCAC 11 .0502: JUSTICE/NC Alarm Systems Licensing Board – The Commission objected to this rule due to lack of necessity. The term "accredited sponsor" is not used in these rules so the definition in .0502 is unnecessary.

12 NCAC 11 .0504: JUSTICE/NC Alarm Systems Licensing Board – The Commission objected to this rule due to lack of statutory authority and ambiguity. There is no authority cited for the board to set occupational qualifications for instructors, thus there is no authority to inquire into the qualifications in .0504(a)(4) or determine their competency in (b)(2). It is also not clear what would constitute competency. In .0504(c), it is not clear what standards the full board will use in determining if a course will be sanctioned.

12 NCAC 11 .0505: JUSTICE/NC Alarm Systems Licensing Board – The Commission objected to this rule due to ambiguity. In .0505, it is not clear what standards the board will use in determining if out of state courses will be sanctioned.

14A NCAC 7.0313: DEPARTMENT OF CRIME CONTROL AND PUBLIC SAFETY - The Commission objected to this rule due to ambiguity. It is not clear what standards the Governor's Crime Commission is to use in determining matching fund ratios.

15A NCAC 7H .1705: DENR/Coastal Resources Commission - The Commission objected to this rule due to ambiguity. In (c)(1)(C), it is not clear what standards will be used in allowing dredging for fill material to protect highways or other structures of public interest. It is also not clear what is meant by "structures of public interest." This objection applies to existing language in the rule.

15A NCAC 13B .1624: DENR/Commission for Health Services - The Commission objected to this rule due to ambiguity. In (b)(1)(A), it is not clear what will make a model "acceptable to the Division." In (b)(1)(A)(iv), it is not clear what will make a "two-phase modeling approach" be acceptable to the Division. In (b)(4), it is not clear what standards the Division will use in approving materials for separation materials. In (b)(7), it is not clear what constitutes "adequately specified." In (b)(7)(A), it is not clear what constitutes "adequately free of organic material." It is also not clear when a "select fill" will be approved by the Division. In (b)(7)(B)(i), it is not clear what standards the Division will use in approving grading plans and specifications. In (b)(7)(C) (i), it is not clear what standards the Division will use in approving engineering plans. In (b)(7)(C)(iii), it is not clear what standards the Division will use in approving plans. In (b)(8)(B)(i), it is not clear what standards the Division will use in approving an alternative "in situ test." In (b)(8)(B)(v), it is not clear what constitutes adequate protection from environmental degradation. In (b)(8)(C)(ii), it is not clear what standards the Division will use in approving tests. In (b)(9)(B)(ii), it is not clear what standards the Division will use in approving placing materials on top of the GCL. In (iii), it is not clear what standards the Division will use in approving removing, repairing, and replacing material. In (b)(9)(C)(i), it is not clear what standards the Division will use in approving geosynthetic clay installation. In (ii), it is not clear what standards will be used in approving the placement of materials. In (v), it is not clear what standards will be used in approving retesting. In (v)(III), it is not clear what standards the Division will use in approving engineering plans. In (b)(10)(C), it is not clear what standards will be used in approving retesting. In (b)(11)(B)(i), it is not clear what standards will be used in approving the installation of leachate collection piping. In (b)(11)(C), it is not clear what standards will be used in approving retesting. In (b)(12)(B)(i), it is not clear what standards the Division will use in approving placement of drainage layer material. In (b)(12)(C), it is not clear what standards will be used in approving retesting. In (b)(13)(B), it is not clear what standards will be used in approving the installation of filter layers. In (b)(13)(C), it is not clear what standards will be used in approving retesting. This objection applies to existing language in the rule.

19A NCAC 2D .0816: TRANSPORTATION/Division of Highways - The Commission objected to this rule due to lack of statutory authority. There is no authority for the Department to disqualify a contractor from bidding because of the recruitment of department employees for employment as the rule does in (a)(6).

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Commissioner Funderburk made a motion that the election of officers be postponed until November and reviewed again at that time if new Commissioners have not been appointed. Commissioner Rader seconded the motion, although he did note that elections could be held if the new commissioners were in place. The vote was unanimous. The meeting next month is a change from the third Thursday to the fourth Thursday. A proposed budget is being prepared for 1999-2000. Our lease should remain the same for at least next year.

COMMISSION PROCEDURES AND OTHER MATTERS

The next meeting will be on October 22, 1998.

The meeting adjourned at 10:38 a.m.

The above entitled matter was heard before Beecher R. Gray, administrative law judge, on June 22, 1998 in Southport, North Carolina. The parties filed written proposed decisions and arguments on July 31, 1998.

MOTIONS

Upon the call of the case, Respondent's motion to dismiss for lack of subject matter jurisdiction, filed on June 19, 1998, was denied. Petitioners made a motion to overturn agency rule 15A NCAC 7H.0304(3) on the grounds that it is void as applied to Petitioners because its application violates the statutory and regulatory requirement of uniformity and consistency in implementation of the Coastal Area Management Act (CAMA). Petitioners also made a motion to exclude the testimony of Respondent's expert witness on the grounds that he played no role in the development of the 1981 Inlet Hazard Area of Environmental Concern (AEC) for Tubbs Inlet; that he played no role in the denial of Petitioners' CAMA application; and that his Tubbs Inlet study data have not been reported to the Respondent.

Petitioners' motions were held open pending receipt of the evidence in the case. For reasons set forth below, Petitioners' motions are DENIED.

EXPERT WITNESSES

Dr. James Marlowe, who holds a Masters Degree in Marine Geology, a Ph.D. in Geology, and has 28 years work experience in marine geology, was tendered and accepted as an expert in marine geology. Dr. William Cleary, who holds Masters and Ph.D. Degrees in Geology, and has concentrated his professional work for the last 17 years in the study of near shore barrier island estaurine research, with particular emphasis on inlet morphology, was tendered and accepted as an expert in coastal geology.

ISSUE

Whether Respondent's denial of Petitioners' application for a CAMA permit to construct a 15 story condominium on Ocean Isle Beach on the grounds that the proposed construction lies within an Inlet Hazard Area of Environmental Concern is supported by the evidence.

FINDINGS OF FACT

Stipulated Facts

- 1. All parties correctly have been designated, and there is no question of misjoinder or nonjoinder.
- 2. The sole issue for determination is whether the DCM acted properly in denying Petitioners' application for a CAMA permit for the development of a 15-story, 75-unit, high-rise, condominium project, located at 63 Ocean Isle Blvd. West, Ocean Isle Beach, Brunswick County (the "Project"). The application was denied because the project was determined to be within an Inlet Hazard Area of Environmental Concern and inconsistent with the applicable guidelines and standards.
- 3. ln 1974, North Carolina adopted the Coastal Area Management Act (the "CAMA"), which is codified at N.C. Gen. Stat. §§ 113A-101, et seq.
- 4. The Act provides for designation of areas of environmental concern ("AECs") and the adoption of guidelines and standards for the protection of areas of statewide concern within the coastal area. By statute, there are nine general categories of AECs.
- 5. The Act created the Coastal Resources Commission (the "CRC"), which was vested with responsibility for the designation of AECs.
- 6. In its efforts to carry out its statutory duties, the CRC established a broad category of AECs referred to as "Ocean Hazard Areas." 15A NCAC 7H .0300.
- 7. Within the broad category of Ocean Hazard Areas, the CRC established four specific types of AECs, including "Inlet Hazard Areas." 15A NCAC 7H .304(3).
- 8. In order to designate Inlet Hazard Areas, the CRC entered into a contract with the Division of Marine Fisheries, effective beginning July 1, 1977, for the Division to develop a methodology or methodologies for designation of Inlet Hazard Area AECs.
- 9. The work required under the above agreement was completed by two division personnel, Loie J. Priddy and Rick Carraway.
- 10. Mr. Priddy and Mr. Carraway completed a report to the CRC in 1978, and amended their efforts in 1981. That report was entitled "INLET HAZARD AREAS, The Final Report and Recommendations to the Coastal Resources Commission, 1978, as amended in 1981, by Loie J. Priddy and Rick Carraway (the "Priddy Report").
- By rule, in 1981, the CRC incorporated by reference the suggested Inlet Hazard Area designations contained within the Priddy Report, without exception. Those designations are delineated on photographic maps maintained by the DCM.
- 12. The primary methodology employed for preparation of the Priddy Report involved the creation of a mathematical model designed to predict the future movement of inlets over a short-term future period of time, expressly stated to be ten years, but where there was insufficient data, certain natural features were considered.
- 13. The model chosen by Priddy and Carraway utilized statistical, linear regression. In creating and applying the model, the authors of the Priddy report reviewed available photos of North Carolina inlets from 1938 to the time of their efforts and predicted the short term movement of those inlets over a ten year period.
- 14. In effect, in suggesting Inlet Hazard Areas, the Priddy Report identified areas adjacent to inlets for classification as AECs when those areas fell within the predicted 10 year future location of those inlets whenever there was sufficient data to do so and the shoreline change was linear.

CONTESTED CASE DECISIONS

- 15. The landward boundaries of Inlet Hazard Area AECs suggested in the Priddy Report and designated by the CRC was established pursuant to 99.9% confidence interval lines. Pursuant to those lines, the Report identified Inlet Hazard Area boundaries which had only a 1 in 1000 chance of being exceeded over a ten year period. The minimum width is the same as the adjacent ocean erodible area.
- 16. In some instances, Mr. Priddy and Mr. Carraway were not able to apply their primary methodology in order to identify suggested Inlet Hazard Areas through the use of their linear regression model. In those instances, AECs were suggested by identifying previous inlet territory through the location of relict dune lines showing the past location of the inlet, structurally weak areas, and other inlet features.
- 17. The use of the "relict dune method" identifies possible future locations for inlets (primarily based on past locations for inlets), but was not used to predict inlet movement except when there was insufficient data for the linear regression model or linear regression did not model the shoreline movement.
- 18. When the CRC adopted the Inlet Hazard Areas originally, it was the intent of the staff to continue the analysis of the pattern of movement of the inlets.
- 19. Since the CRC's designation of Inlet Hazard Area AECs in 1981, the CRC has never conducted a comprehensive review of Inlet AECs until beginning the current effort.
- 20. After the Inlet Hazard Area AECs were designated in 1981, they got little attention in terms of review by either the staff or the CRC, until recently.
- 21. The DCM, which acts as staff for the CRC (the "staff") has recommended that the Inlet Hazard AECs be reevaluated.
- 22. Since the CRC's designation of Inlet Hazard Area AECs in 1981, there have been no changes to the inlet delineations, with one exception. The CRC has expressly changed only one Inlet Hazard Area designation. That change was made at the request of the owners of the Bald Head Island Resort, in regard to the Cape Rear River Inlet near Wilmington.
- 23. Pursuant to the Act, where an individual seeks to develop property along the North Carolina Coast, that individual must seek and obtain a CAMA permit prior to beginning construction. Where the development requires that some additional permit must be obtained (in addition to the CAMA permit) the development is classified as "major" development, and the permit must be issued by the CRC or its duly authorized agent, the North Carolina Department of Environment and Natural Resources, through the DCM. Where other permits are not required, the Development is classified as "minor" development, and the application is made to and issued by the local permit officer for the local city or county government in question.
- 24. Development within Inlet Hazard AECs designated by the CRC may only occur pursuant to certain development standards, which include restrictions on density.
- 25. According to a March 11, 1981 memorandum from Ralph Cantrell to the CRC's Implementation and Standards Committee, in setting development standards, "fully protecting" development from inlet formation and movement is not a realistic standard.
- 26. In approximately 1985, the Petitioners, through Ocean Isle Resort, made application for a Coastal Area Management Act Permit seeking, inter alia, permission to develop two high-rise condominium projects at the western end of Ocean Isle Beach, adjacent to Tubbs Inlet. Because the application was treated as being one for minor development, it was ruled upon by the local permit officer for the Town of Ocean Isle Beach.
- 27. Pursuant to correspondence dated May 15, 1985, CAMA minor development Permits 85-0056-0061 were granted. The local permit officer, T.D. Roberson, expressly found that the development sites were all <u>east</u> of (outside of) the lnlet Hazard Area AEC located at the west end of the island and adjacent to Tubbs Inlet.
- 28. Pursuant to the CAMA permits referenced above, Petitioners developed one of the two high-rise projects, the westernmost project, closest to Tubbs Inlet. The project was completed and remains in existence and operation today.
- 29. The second of the two projects, further east of Tubbs inlet, was not immediately developed. The permit for that project lapsed and became void.

CONTESTED CASE DECISIONS

- 30. On July 16, 1996, the Petitioners, through Ocean Isle Realty, made application for a CAMA permit, in order to pursue the Project that previously had been permitted as the second of the two condominium projects in 1985. The application was considered to be one for major development. As such, it was submitted to the DCM as the authorized agent for the CRC.
- 31. The application was initially reviewed at the Wilmington regional office of the DCM by Mr. Ed Brooks, a field consultant in that office. Because the location of the proposed project was further from Tubbs Inlet than the existing condominium project, Mr. Brooks did not initially check to determine if the site of the Project would be within the Inlet Hazard Area AEC on the eastern side of Tubbs inlet, as he assumed that the site was not within that Inlet Hazard Area. However, during the review of the application, a question subsequently arose regarding whether the site was within that Inlet Hazard Area, and the Division reviewed the CRC's official designation of that Inlet Hazard Area. Through that review, the Division concluded that the proposed project was within the Inlet Hazard Area in question.
- 32. In concluding that the Project is within the Inlet Hazard Area, the staff of the DCM reviewed the CRC's 1981 designation for the Inlet Hazard Area on the eastern side of Tubbs Inlet. That designation was identical to the designation suggested by the Priddy report and has not been changed since the original designation by the CRC in 1981. The only independent analysis performed by the DCM was to review photographic maps showing the 1981 designation.
- 33. The project site is within the Inlet Hazard AEC for the eastern side of Tubbs Inlet, as designated in 1981 by the CRC.
- 34. On November 4, 1996, the DCM denied the requested CAMA permit on the sole ground that the project at issue was within the Inlet Hazard Area at the eastern side of Tubbs Inlet and was inconsistent with the guidelines for such AEC. But for that fact, the application would have been in full compliance and the requested CAMA permit would have been granted.
- 35. When the CRC delineated Inlet Hazard Areas in 1981, it considered two different approaches. One was to look at the physical features of the land to determine if those physical features were produced by processes unique to the inlet and not to some other set of processes.
- 36. According to a November 8, 1994 memorandum to the CRC's Implementation and Standards Committee, authored by DCM staff employees Steve Benton and Caroline Bellis, when the CRC delineated Inlet Hazard AECs in 1981, it considered including within those AECs all lands that had once been under water, but it rejected that approach, opting to use, instead, the approach detailed in the Priddy Report of regression modeling and physical features.
- According to that same 1994 memorandum, because 14 years had then passed since the Priddy Report study had been completed, and because that study established shoreline projections for a 10 year period of time only, a clear need existed to update the Inlet Hazard Area AEC boundaries. The staff recommended that the CRC reevaluate the Inlet Hazard Area Program. That recommendation is contained within the CRC's Implementation and Standards Committee's meeting minutes for November 17, 1994.
- 38. Some of the Inlet Hazard Area AECs designated in 1981 do not exist any more except as extensions of the ocean erodible area.
- Because of the need to reevaluate the Inlet Hazard Area AECs, the North Carolina department of Environment, Health and Natural Resources entered into a contract with the University of North Carolina at Wilmington (the "University") on July 1, 1995. Pursuant to that contract, the University was to develop data that could be used by the CRC to develop new Inlet Hazard Area AEC designations for the entire coast of North Carolina. Although that study is underway, and the University has compiled information on some of the State's coastal inlets, the study is incomplete.
- 40. N.C. Gen. Stat. § 113A-120 sets forth 10 grounds for which the CRC can deny a permit; "[i]n the absence of such findings, a permit shall be granted." The permit requested by Petitioners was denied pursuant to N.C. Gen. Stat. § 113A-120(a)(8), on grounds that it cannot comply with the State guidelines for the Inlet Hazard AEC.
- 41. The permit application was denied upon finding that:
 - (1) The entire development is determined to be located within the Inlet Hazard area of Environmental Concern (AEC), as defined in T15A:07H.0304(3).
 - (2) The Lots upon which the condominium complex is proposed were originally recorded with the Brunswick County Register of Deeds on August 31, 1981. Therefore, the proposed project has been found to be inconsistent with T15A:07H.0310(a)(2), which states that within Inlet Hazard Area AECs

- "Permanent structures shall be permitted at a density of no more than one commercial or residential unit per 15,000 square feet of land area on lots subdivided or created after July 23, 1981.
- (3) The proposed project has been determined to be inconsistent with T15A:07H.0310(a)(3), which states that within Inlet Hazard AEC's "Only residential structures of four units or less or non-residential structures of less than 5,000 square feet total floor area shall be allowed within the Inlet Hazard Area, except that access roads to those areas and replacement of existing bridges shall be allowed."

Adjudicated Facts

- 42. Loie Priddy who, along with Rick Carroway, produced the Priddy Report in 1978 with an update in 1981, is a Registered Land Surveyor employed by the State for twenty-eight years. Loie Priddy consulted with various disciplines and professionals in the process of generating his report. Some of the disciplines consulted included statistics, forestry, geology, and civil engineering as applied in marine and coastal studies.
- 43. After extensive consultation and study, Priddy and Carroway determined that the best approach to delineation of zones to be identified as inlet hazard areas of environmental concern was a statistical one known as linear regression analysis. Priddy and Carroway were reporting on all twenty-three (23) inlets along North Carolina's coastline. The statistical method required a fairly extensive database of photographs of the inlets. Priddy and Carroway used 30 photos of each inlet studied, spread over many years, except for Tubbs Inlet and one other, both of which only had short databases. Tubbs Inlet was artificially closed and relocated in 1970 so that Priddy and Carroway only had about ten years worth of photo data to work with. Priddy and Carroway and their consultants determined that the statistical method could not reliably be applied if there were insufficient data or if manmade interference in the inlet's location had occurred, both of which exclusions applied to Tubbs Inlet.
- 44. Priddy and Carroway resorted to best professional judgment in the case of Tubbs Inlet for the purpose of delineating the Inlet Hazard AEC. Among the factors included in the decision of delineation were:
 - (1) nine (9) feeder channels into the eastern channel which flows into the east side of Tubbs Inlet;
 - (2) one (1) feeder channel on the west side of Tubbs Inlet;
 - (3) low swale conditions along the spit of land eastward of Tubbs Inlet;
 - (4) narrow strip of land eastward of Tubbs Inlet;
 - (5) relict dune ridges in the area around Tubbs Inlet; and
 - (6) the angle of the eastern feeder channel into Tubbs Inlet.
- 45. Priddy and Carroway projected the predicted location of the inlets ten (10) years into the future based upon a worst case scenario, regardless of the method used for a particular inlet.
- 46. The Coastal Resources Commission (CRC) promulgated rule 15A NCAC 7H .0304(3) in 1981, adopting by reference the Priddy Report's delineation of Inlet Hazard AECs, a delineation which was applied to Petitioners' application in this contested case.
- 47. Dr. William Cleary is a professor of geology at the University of North Carolina at Wilmington. By virtue of a contract between UNC-W and the North Carolina Department of Environment, Health, and Natural Resources (now Environment and Natural Resources) he conducted a study of numerous inlets in Brunswick County beginning in 1995, including Tubbs Inlet. This case was originally scheduled for hearing on March 14, 1997 but was continued off the hearing docket for over one year by joint request of the parties to allow Dr. Cleary to complete his study of Tubbs Inlet with the hope that his data could help resolve this case.
- 48. Dr. Cleary testified as follows, which is found as fact:

We attempted to literally look at all the databases and develop GIS themes. We looked at historic coastal charts dating from 1856 to 1933, which were basically NOAA or NOS charts. We also looked at all the available photographs that either I have in my files or else the Army Corps of Engineers have on loan in their files in Wilmington. We utilized a 1993 digital orthophoto as a base. We then digitized and rectified all available maps and aerial photographs to this 1993 base and then made a series of measurements on the shoulders of each individual inlet, both within the throat of the inlet and then along approximately a mile or so—mile and a half on either side of the throat of the inlet.

- 49. Dr. James Marlowe was retained by Petitioners to study delineations of the Inlet Hazard AEC around Tubbs Inlet and Petitioners' property for purposes of assessing reasonableness both as to the 1981 delineations and as to the delineations as they remained in 1996. Dr. Marlowe had available to him approximately eight (8) photographs of Tubbs Inlet beginning in 1982 through 1995. In his analysis, Dr. Marlowe employed three reference points: the distance from the approximated vegetation line along Tubbs Inlet to the Petitioners' building site; the distance from the site to the boundary of the main channel of the inlet; and the distance between the centerline of Jenks Creek and the centerline of Tubbs Inlet. Reviewing the data from his approximations of these distances for the time period covered by the photos available to him, Dr. Marlowe found that, in the early years, the inlet migrated fairly rapidly in an eastward direction as compared with later years. It is Dr. Marlowe's observation and opinion that the initial rate of eastward migration following the 1970 relocation of the inlet through approximately 1982 supports the 1981 ten year delineation of the Inlet Hazard AEC such that, had that migration rate continued, the eastern shoulder of the inlet approximately would have been at the eastern delineation boundary in the tenth year. Dr. Marlowe found that the rate of easterly migration changed rather drastically after or during 1982, becoming much slower.
- 50. Dr. Marlowe gave an expert opinion that it was not appropriate for Respondent to continue to rely on the 1981 delineations during 1996 when it had not used available photographs to update the projections and delineations, especially when those photos show a greatly decreased easterly migration of the inlet towards Petitioners' property, still approximately 1,000 feet away in 1996. Dr. Marlowe stated that the approach used in the 1981 delineations was a good practical approach and that the factors which made it so in 1981 might well continue in existence now.
- 51. Dr. Cleary, having analyzed data on Tubbs Inlet from approximately 1856 through 1997, gave an expert opinion that the 1981 delineation of the inlet hazard AEC in the area of Tubbs Inlet remains valid in 1998, even though Respondent has not updated the delineation or reviewed the AECs biennially.
- 52. The two experts, Dr. Marlowe and Dr. Cleary, agree that Tubbs Inlet is an unstable inlet; that it has demonstrated erratic movements in the past and may do so in the future; and that it has exhibited a continuous eastward migration toward Petitioners' property, although at a slower rate since 1981. Both agree that Petitioners' property sits on a long, narrow, low inlet strand with a swale in the area of Petitioners' property which makes it susceptible to breakthrough or overwash during a severe storm event. Petitioners' application states that the property has an elevation of eight (8) feet above mean high water.
- Prior to 1970, Tubbs Inlet was migrating to the west, away from Petitioners' property on Ocean Isle Beach. During this period of time, the primary feeder channel behind the Ocean Isle shoulder of Tubbs Inlet was infilled, and it no longer was the primary feeder channel. At some time between 1970 and 1983, Jenks Creek was dredged, opening it to the Intracoastal Waterway. The dredging and opening of Jenks Creek now allows a greater volume of water to be exchanged between the ocean and estuary. Dr. Cleary's opinion is that this infilling or reduction in the primary eastern feeder channel and dredging Jenks Creek on the western side of the inlet is likely to be among the variable factors causing the present easterly migration of Tubbs Inlet.
- Drs. Cleary and Marlowe agree on the essential dynamic facts regarding the morphology of Tubbs Inlet. The primary disagreement between the two experts has to do with whether the 1981 delineation, which includes Petitioners` property within the Inlet Hazard AEC, remains valid. Dr. Cleary has reviewed the delineation and the available evidence for this inlet and says that the 1981 delineation remains proper. Dr. Marlowe has reviewed the delineation and at least eight (8) photos from 1982-1995 and believes that the delineation is no longer valid because of the slower migration rate of the inlet since 1982.
- 55. The General Statutes of North Carolina provide, in pertinent part under Chapter 113A, Article 7, known as the Coastal Area Management Act:
 - (a) The Coastal Resources Commission shall by rule designate geographic areas of the coastal area as areas of environmental concern and specify the boundaries thereof, in the manner provided in this part. N.C. Gen. Stat. Section 113A-113 (a) (1997).
 - (b) The Commission shall review the designated areas of environmental concern at least biennially. N.C. Gen. Stat. Section 113A-115 (c) (1997).
 - (c) The responsible official or body shall deny an application for a permit upon finding:
 - (8) In any case, that the development is inconsistent with the State guidelines or the local land-use plans. N.C. Gen. Stat. Section 113A-120 (a)(8) (1997).
- 56. Since adoption of the Inlet Hazard Area rule in 1981, which did not contain a schedule for review and update, the

Commission has not carried out the biennial reviews required by G.S. 113A-115(c). The Commission did provide that the minimum width of the Inlet Hazard AEC should be not less than the width of the adjacent ocean erodible area so that development would always have to be set back a minimum distance from the inlet even if it migrated outside the delineated AEC boundary. N.C. Admin. Code tit. 15A, r. 7H .0304(3) (October 1997).

- 57. The inlet hazard area rule promulgated by the CRC provides, in pertinent part:
 - (3) Inlet Hazard Area. The inlet hazard areas are natural-hazard areas that are especially vulnerable to erosion, flooding and other adverse effects of sand, wind, and water because of their proximity to dynamic ocean inlets. This area shall extend landward from the mean low water line in distance sufficient to encompass that area within which the inlet will, based on statistical analysis, migrate, and shall consider such factors as previous inlet territory, structurally weak areas near the inlet (such as an unusually narrow barrier island, an unusually long channel feeding the inlet, or an overwash area), and external influences such as jetties and channelization. The areas identified as suggested Inlet Hazard Areas included in the reported entitled INLET HAZARD AREAS, the Final Report and recommendations to the Coastal Resources Commission, 1978, by Loie J. Priddy and Rick Carraway are hereby designated as Inlet Hazard Areas except that the Cape Fear Inlet Hazard as shown on said map shall not extend northeast of the Baldhead Island marina entrance channel. In all cases, this area shall be an extension of the adjacent ocean erodible area and in no case shall the width of the inlet hazard area be less than the width of the adjacent ocean erodible area.

N.C. Admin. Code tit. 15A, r. 7H .0304(3) (October 1997).

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Based upon the foregoing findings of fact, I make the following Conclusions of Law.

- 1. The parties properly are before the Office of Administrative Hearings.
- 2. There is substantial evidence in the record in this contested case hearing from documents and photographs, the testimony of lay witnesses, and from testimony from each of the two experts to support Respondent's denial of Petitioners' application for a CAMA permit on the grounds that it is located within an Inlet Hazard AEC.
- 3. The Commission's failure to conduct biennial reviews of the designation of Areas of Environmental Concern as required by G.S. 113A-113 (c) is an omission which does not comport with the statute. Under the facts and circumstances of this case, and in reliance on the expert testimony of Drs. Cleary and Marlowe, the Commission's failure to carry out the statutory mandate to review is harmless error as that omission affects this contested case.
- 4. There is evidence in this hearing such that the Commission could, if it chose to give sufficient weight to Dr. Marlowe's expert opinion that it is not appropriate or scientifically accurate to allow the Tubbs Inlet delineations to remain static, in view of the over fifteen (15) year trend of slower migration of the inlet, cause a realignment of the delineations which would exclude Petitioners' property on Ocean Isle Beach. That decision rests in the sound discretion of the Commission.
- 5. There is no substantial evidence that Respondent's decision in this matter violated any statutory or regulatory requirement for consistency and uniformity in the determination of Inlet Hazard AEC boundaries.

RECOMMENDED DECISION

Based upon the foregoing Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, it is hereby recommended that the Coastal Resources Commission affirm the decision of the Division of Coastal Management denying Petitioners` application for a CAMA permit.

ORDER

It is hereby ordered that the agency serve a copy of the final decision on the Office of Administrative Hearings, P.O. Drawer 27447, Raleigh, NC 27611-7447, in accordance with North Carolina General Statute 150B-36(b)

CONTESTED CASE DECISIONS

NOTICE

The agency making the final decision in this contested case is required to give each party an opportunity to file exceptions to this recommended decision and to present written arguments to those in the agency who will make the final decision G.S. 150B-36(a).

The agency is required by G.S. 150B-36(b) to serve a copy of the final decision on all parties and to furnish a copy to the parties attorney on record and to the Office of Administrative Hearings.

The agency that will make the final decision in this contested case is the North Carolina Department of Environment and Natural Resources.

This case came on for decision before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge on the motion to dismiss filed by the Respondent, the North Carolina Department of Environment and Natural Resources, Division of Waste Management and joined by the Respondent-Intervenor, the City of Albemarle. The undersigned held a hearing on Respondent's motion to dismiss on August 17, 1998, at 9:00 a.m. at the Lee House, 422 N. Blount St., Raleigh, N.C. The parties were represented as follows: Lauren M. Clemmons, Assistant Attorney General, for Respondent; James L. Conner, II, Esq. and Kacy Burnsed, Esq. for Petitioners, and Carson Carmichael, Esq. and David Coats, Esq., for Respondent-Intervenors. In addition to oral argument by counsel, the undersigned has considered the motion to dismiss and the matters of record, including the briefs filed in support of this motion, and petitioner's brief in opposition to the motion.

Based upon the foregoing, the undersigned Administrative Law Judge enters this Final Decision based upon the following:

FACTS

- 1. On April 8, 1998, Respondent issued a permit for the construction of a municipal solid waste landfill facility to the City of Albemarle.
- 2. On May 7, 1998, Petitioners filed a petition with the Office of Administrative Hearings attempting to challenge Respondent's issuance of the permit to the City of Albemarle.
- 3. Petitioners executed a certificate of service together with the May 7, 1998 petition, showing service of a copy of the petition only on Respondent. The certificate of service did not show service of a copy of the petition on the City of Albemarle; Petitioners did not serve a copy of this petition on the City of Albemarle at that time.
- 4. In the petition, Petitioners alleged that Respondent "issued a permit for the construction of a new Municipal Solid Waste Landfill Facility for the City of Albemarle in violation of the rules, statutes, and principles of law governing the issuance of such permits including the provisions of Title 15A of the North Carolina Administrative Code, Subchapter 13B and N.C. Gen. Stat. § 13A-17 et. seq. and § 130A-290 et. seq." Based on this allegation, Petitioners checked form boxes stating that the Respondent "otherwise substantially prejudiced my rights" and Respondent "exceeded its authority or jurisdiction; acted erroneously; failed to use proper procedure; acted arbitrarily or capriciously; or failed to act as required by law or rule." The petition contained no other allegations.
- 5. On May 28, 1998, the undersigned Administrative Law Judge entered an order pursuant to 26 NCAC 03 .0104 for the filing of prehearing statements.
- 6. On May 21, 1998, the Respondent mailed a Notice of Issuance of Sanitary Landfill Permit ("Notice") to all persons and addresses identified in Exhibit A, which is attached to the Affidavit of Mary Massey.
- 7. On or about June 29, 1998, Petitioners filed their Prehearing Statement.

- 8. On June 29, 1998, Respondent filed a motion to dismiss the petition pursuant to N.C.G.S. § 1A-1, Rule 12(b)(1) of the North Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure for lack of subject matter jurisdiction and under Rule 12(b)(6) for failure to state claim upon which relief may be granted. Respondent contended that the petition was subject to dismissal because Petitioners failed to comply with the mandates of N.C.G.S. § 150B-23(a), specifically by failing to: a) allege any facts regarding their status as persons aggrieved; b) state facts tending to establish that the Respondent's issuance of the permit to the City of Albemarle harmed Petitioners and that the Respondent had acted erroneously, failed to use proper procedure, acted arbitrarily or capriciously, or failed to act as required by law or rule; c) serve a copy of the petition on the permit holder, the City of Albemarle; and d) file a certificate of service showing such service on the City of Albemarle.
- 9. On June 29, Respondent mailed a Notice of Issuance of Sanitary Landfill Permit ("Notice") to all persons and addresses identified in Exhibit C, which is attached to the Affidavit of Mary Massey.
- 10. On July 1, 1998, Petitioners served a copy of their petition and a copy of their prehearing statement on the City of Albemarle.
- 11. On or about July 17, 1998, Petitioners filed a brief in opposition to the motion to dismiss.
- 12. On July 21, 1998, Petitioners filed a motion for a stay to prevent the City of Albemarle from proceeding with the construction of the landfill pursuant to the April 8, 1998 permit.
- 13. On July 31, 1998, Respondent filed documents in opposition to the motion for a stay.
- On August 5, 1998, the City of Albemarle moved to intervene in this matter and joined in the Respondent's motion to dismiss, as well as opposed the motion for a stay and filed documents in opposition to the motion for a stay.
- 15. On August 11, 1998, the undersigned Administrative Law Judge allowed the City of Albemarle's motion to intervene.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

- 1. N.C.G.S. § 150B-23(a) states that "any person aggrieved may commence a contested case hereunder." "Person aggrieved" is defined in N.C.G.S. § 150B-2(6) as "any person, firm, corporation, or group of persons of common interest who are directly or indirectly affected substantially in their person, property or public office or employment by an agency decision." The North Carolina Supreme Court has held that "person aggrieved" means "adversely affected in respect of legal rights, or suffering from an infringement or denial of legal rights." In re Halifax Paper Company, Inc., 59 N.C. 589, 595, 131 S.E.2d 441, 446 (1963); accord Empire Power Co., v. N.C. DEHNR, 337 N.C. 569, 588, 447 S.E.2d 768, 779, reh'g denied, 338 N.C. 314, 451 S.E.2d 634 (1994)(person aggrieved must show that he has been affected in rights, duties, or privileges).
- 2. N.C.G.S. § 150B-23(a) also requires, among other things, that a petition "shall state facts tending to establish that the agency named as the respondent has deprived the petitioner of property, has ordered the petitioner to pay a fine or civil penalty, or has otherwise substantially prejudiced the petitioner's rights and that the agency:
 - (1) Exceeded its authority or jurisdiction;
 - (2) Acted erroneously;
 - (3) Failed to use proper procedure:
 - (4) Acted arbitrarily or capriciously; or
 - (5) Failed to act as required by law or rule."
- 3. Petitioners claim to have had their rights substantially prejudiced by the Respondent's issuance to the City of Albemarle of a permit to construct a landfill facility. Viewing the petition as a whole and giving the Petitioners the benefit of every reasonable inference, the petition does not "state facts tending to establish" that the agency has substantially prejudiced, or harmed, petitioner's rights and that the agency has acted erroneously, failed to use proper procedure, acted arbitrarily or

capriciously, or failed to act as required by law or rule in issuing the permit to the City of Albemarle. The assertion in the petition that Respondent "issued a permit...in violation of the rules, statutes, and principles of law governing the issuance of such permits..." is a conclusive generalization which fails to state facts of any sort. The assertion does not "tend to establish" that the Respondent substantially prejudiced petitioner's rights nor does it "tend to establish" that the Respondent acted outside the law in any of the ways set forth in § 150B-23(a)(1)-(5). The petition does not state any facts tending to establish substantial prejudice, or harm, to any of the Petitioners or to any of Petitioner's rights. In that regard, the petition does not contain any facts regarding Petitioner's status as persons aggrieved. For example, the petition does not disclose whether petitioners are nearby residents or what rights of petitioners', if any, are impacted by the issuance of the permit. Petitioners' general allegation that Respondent has "substantially prejudiced" their rights is not definitively certain, absent some statement of facts tending to establish that Respondent substantially prejudiced Petitioners' rights, to show that Petitioners are persons aggrieved and therefore entitled to commence a contested case under N.C.G.S. § 150B-23(a).

- 4. Meeting the mandate of N.C.G.S. § 150B-23(a) to "state facts tending to establish" prejudice to a petitioner's rights and tending to establish that an agency acted improperly pursuant to N.C.G.S. § 150B-23(a)(1)-(5) is a jurisdictional prerequisite for conferring subject matter jurisdiction on the Office of Administrative Hearings. Because the petition does not contain any facts, the petition is insufficient to invoke the jurisdiction of the Office of Administrative hearings under N.C.G.S. § 150B-23(a) and the Office of Administrative Hearings lacks subject matter jurisdiction. Further, because only a "person aggrieved" may commence a contested case under Chapter 150B and because the petition contains no facts tending to establish prejudice to the Petitioners' rights, the Petitioners have not demonstrated standing and therefore the Office of Administrative Hearings lacks subject matter jurisdiction.
- Petitioners argue that their prehearing statement contains the requisite information for establishing their standing as "persons aggrieved" and for stating the facts tending to show harm to Petitioners and that the agency acted erroneously, failed to use proper procedure, acted arbitrarily or capriciously, or failed to act as required by law or rule in issuing the permit to the City of Albemarle. N.C.G.S. § 150B-23(a) requires that the petition filed in the Office of Administrative Hearings "state facts." A prehearing statement is not a petition and does not satisfy the mandatory requirements for filing a petition. See Nailing v. UNC-Ch, 117 N.C. App. 318, 451 S.E.2d 351, rev. denied by, 339 N.C. 614, 454 S.E.2d 255 (1995)(holding that an amended prehearing statement was not the equivalent to the filing of a petition as required under Chapter 150B to commence a contested case and further holding that an amendment to a prehearing statement was not the equivalent to amending a petition). In order to commence a contested case, the petition, not the prehearing statement, must meet the requirements of N.C.G.S. § 150B-23(a).
- 6. N.C.G.S. § 150B-23(a) mandates that a party shall "serve a copy of the petition on all other parties and, if the dispute concerns a license, the person who holds the license. A party who files a petition shall file a certificate of service together with the petition." A municipal solid waste landfill permit is a license within the meaning of G.S. § 150B-2(3). The City of Albemarle is the permit holder. The certificate of service filed together with the petition filed on May 7, 1998, shows that the Petitioners failed to serve a copy of their petition on the City of Albemarle. The certificate of service only shows that the Petitioners served Respondent with a copy of the petition.
- 7. Petitioners served a copy of the petition on the City of Albemarle on July 1, 1998. This service, however, does not meet the requirements of N.C.G.S. § 150B-23(a), which requires that the certificate of service be filed "together with the petition." Accordingly, because the May 7, 1998 petition does not contain a filed certificate of service showing service on the City of Albemarle and the City of Albemarle was not served with a copy of the petition, the petition fails to meet to the requirements of N.C.G.S. § 150B-23(a) and the Office of Administrative Hearings lacks subject matter jurisdiction.
- 8. Moreover, the service of a copy of the petition on the City of Albemarle and the filing of the certificate of service must be accomplished within the time limits set forth in N.C.G.S. § 150B-23(f) in order to confer jurisdiction on the Office of Administrative Hearings. See e.g., Gaskill v. State ex. rel. Cobey, 109 N.C. App. 656, 658-660, 428 S.E.2d 474, 475-76, review denied, 334 N.C. 163, 432 S.E.2d 359 (1993) (petitioner's failure to timely comply with the "then-in effect" requirement of N.C.G.S. § 150B-23 to verify or support a petition by affidavit deprived the Office of Administrative Hearings of subject matter jurisdiction). N.C.G.S. § 150B-23(f) provides for a 60 day time limit for filing a petition unless otherwise established by another statute. N.C.G.S. § 130A-24 establishes a 30 day time limit for challenging solid waste permits. This time limit "commences when notice of the agency decision is given to all persons aggrieved. Such notice shall be provided to all persons known to the agency by personal delivery or by the placing of notice in an official depository of the united States Postal Service addressed to the person at the latest address provided to the agency by the person." N.C.G.S. § 130A-24. Therefore, even if N.C.G.S. § 150B-23(a) did not require that the certificate of service be filed "together with the petition", the July 1, 1998 service fell outside the 30 day deadline for those Petitioners who

were included in the Notice which Respondent mailed on May 21, 1998. The Office Of Administrative Hearings would lack subject matter jurisdiction as to those Petitioners.

- 9. The Office of Administrative Hearings lacks subject matter jurisdiction over this petition on the grounds that Petitioners' May 7, 1998 petition failed to a) allege facts regarding their standing as persons aggrieved; b) state facts in accordance with the requirements in N.C.G.S. § 150B-23(a); and c) comply with the service requirements of N.C.G.S. § 150B-23(a) as to the City of Albemarle. Accordingly, Respondent's Motion to Dismiss is hereby GRANTED and this matter is dismissed pursuant to N.C.G.S. § 1A-1. Rule 12(b)(1). This is a Final Decision entered in accordance with N.C.G.S. § 150B-33(c)(1).
- 10. Because the Office of Administrative Hearings does not have subject matter jurisdiction in this case, the undersigned does not reach the merits of Petitioners' Motion for a Stay.

IT IS SO ORDERED.

NOTICE

In order to appeal a Final Decision, the person seeking review must file a Petition in the Superior Court of Wake County or in the superior court of the county where the person resides. The Petition for Judicial Review must be filed within thirty (30) days after the person is served with a copy of the Final Decision. N.C.G.S. §150B-46 describes the contents of the Petition and requires service of the Petition on all parties.
