7. Why is adherence to notice and hearing requirements contrary to the public interest and the immediate adoption of the rule is required?

COVID-19 is a respiratory disease that can result in serious illness or death. The COVID-19 virus, previously unidentified in humans, spreads easily from person to person. Once an outbreak of the COVID-19 begins, it is difficult to contain. The World Health Organization, the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, and the United States Department of Health and Human Services have declared COVID-19 a public health threat and emergency. Since mass gatherings are being restricted during this worldwide pandemic, those applying to the Board for license renewal, will be unable to comply in many instances.

Executive Order No. 116, declared a state of emergency to coordinate a response and enact protective measures to help prevent the spread of COVID-19. In subsequent Orders, the Governor of North Carolina and the NC Department of Health and Human Services recommended high risk persons stay at home, that schools implement plans for distance or e-learning, that employers and employees use teleworking technologies, and that mass gatherings should cancel, postpone, and modify these events or offer online streaming services, then prohibited mass gatherings, closed schools, and urged social distancing. This rule amendment allows an extension of time to complete continuing education requirements.

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21 NCAC 26 .0309 is amended under temporary procedures with changes as follows:

3 21 NCAC 26.0309 EXEMPTIONS AND EXTENSION OF TIME

- 4 (a) A registrant shall be exempt from the continuing education requirements for any of the following reasons:
 - (1) New registrants by way of examination or comity for the current registration year.
- 6 (2) A licensee serving on temporary active duty in the armed forces of the United States for a period of 7 time exceeding 90 consecutive days in a year or as provided by G.S. 93B-15(b), whichever is greater.
- 8 (3) A licensee experiencing physical disability or illness if supporting documentation is approved by 9 the Board. Such documentation shall be in the form of a sworn statement by the registrant, a 10 statement from a physician, or medical records which show that the disability or illness, prevented 11 registrant's participation in a course that the registrant had enrolled, or prevented registrant's
- 12 participation in the continuing education program for at least 90 consecutive days in a year.
- 13 (4) A licensee with emeritus status from the Board.

(b) In order to return to active practice, registrants who have received an exemption shall complete continuingeducation requirements for each exempted year, not to exceed two years.

- 16 (c) During a [National] national or State declared state of emergency [which] that restricts or prohibits a licensee
- 17 <u>from obtaining by active participation [approved] in Board approved continuing [education] education, the Board may</u>
- 18 <u>extend the compliance period</u> if requested by the licensee up to 90 days beyond the effective period of the state of
- 19 emergency. Any license renewed in reliance on this exemption shall be issued conditionally and shall automatically
- 20 expire on September 30, 2020 or on the 90th day, whichever is later, if compliance is not documented in the licensee's
- 21 <u>secure [on line] online portal by that date.</u>
