4 (a) Water recreation attractions including water slides, wave pools, rapid rides, lazy rivers, artificial swimming

<u>lagoons</u>, and other similar features can deviate from the requirements of this Section with respect to pool profile,
 depth, freeboard, flow dynamics and surface skimming systems. The designing engineer or equipment manufacturer

- 7 shall provide the Department with information design plans and technical specifications to justify such deviation
- 8 <u>deviation</u>. as necessary for the proper function of the attraction. Water recreation attractions shall meet all other
- 9 requirements of this Section.
- 10 (b) Water slide landing pools with a capacity of less than 60,000 gallons shall have a circulation and filtration system

11 capable of turning over the entire pool capacity every two hours. Where automatic chemical controllers are used the
