Minutes of the North Carolina State Board of Optometry May 7, 2014 Special Telephonic Meeting

The North Carolina State Board of Examiners in Optometry conducted a special meeting via telephone at 5:15 pm on Wednesday May 7, 2014 to adopt revised language of 21 NCAC 42B .0107 and 21 NCAC 42B .0114. Present were Drs. Andrew Cook, President and Harold Herring, Secretary/Treasurer and Drs. Michael Clark, H. Mike Johnson, William Rafferty and Mr. Roger Mitchell and Ms. Mary Richardson, Members of the Board. Also present were the following Members of the Board's Staff: John D. Robinson, O.D., Executive Director and Ms. Samantha Hardison, Administrative Assistant. Mr. Johnny Loper and Ms. Amanda Ray, attorneys for the Board, also participated in the meeting by telephone.

The meeting was called to order at 5:15 pm by Dr. Cook after which he read the "Ethics Awareness and Conflict of Interest Reminder" in accordance with the State Government Ethics Act. He then informed the Board that the purpose of this meeting was to act upon changes to the proposed amendment to 21 NCAC 42B. 0107 (to conform to changes made in written examinations by the National Board of Examiners in Optometry) and 21 NCAC 42B.0107 (governing licensing of military optometrists and spouses of military optometrists). Both the amendment to 21 NCAC 42B .0107 and the proposed 21 NCAC 42B .0107 were posted on the Board's web site for public comment for the required 60 day period and did not receive any comment(s) from the public. The Board must now vote to approve the changes in the language of these rules that have been made pursuant to the request of counsel for the Rules Review Commission ("RRC") so that the rules may be resubmitted to the RRC for approval. The action required is the Board's adoption of 21 NCAC 42B.0107 and 21 NCAC 42B.0114. Copies of both rules to be resubmitted to the RRC were sent to each Member of the Board prior to this meeting in order that they have ample opportunity to review the changes.

The President then asked if there were any questions or comments before asking for a motion to formally adopt these rules prior to their being resubmitted to the RRC for approval.

Adoption of 21 NCAC 42B .0107 and 21 NCAC 42B .0114. On motion by Dr. Michael Clark seconded by Dr. William Rafferty and carried unanimously, the Board adopted 21 NCAC 42B.0107, WRITTEN EXAMINATION, and 21 NCAC 42B.0114, MILITARY LICENSE, as posted on the Board's web site for public comment for the required 60 day period and with the changes requested by counsel for the RRC included.

Minutes of the North Carolina State Board of Optometry March 21-22, 2014 Wallace, North Carolina

The North Carolina State Board of Examiners in Optometry met in the offices of the Board in Wallace, North Carolina on Friday and Saturday, March 21-22, 2014, to determine the results of the Winter 2014 Clinical/Practicum Examinations and for other purposes. Present were Dr. Andrew Cook, President, Dr. Harold Herring, Secretary/Treasurer, Drs. Mike Johnson, William Rafferty and Mr. Roger Mitchell and Ms. Mary Richardson, Members of the Board. Also present were the following Members of the Board's Staff: John D. Robinson, O.D., Executive Director, Janice Peterson, R.N., Administrative Secretary, and Ms. Samantha Hardison, Administrative Assistant. Mr. Johnny Loper, attorney for the Board, joined the meeting on Saturday morning, March 22nd by way of conference telephone.

The meeting was called to order at 5:00 p.m. on Friday by Dr. Cook, President of the Board, after which he read the *"ETHICS AWARENESS & CONFLICTS OF INTEREST REMINDER"* as required by the North Carolina State Ethics Commission. A copy of the *"Reminder"* was in each Member's meeting notebook.

<u>Approval of Minutes.</u> On a motion by Mr. Mitchell seconded by Dr. Rafferty, the minutes of the February 14-16, 2014 meeting were unanimously approved.

Report of the President. Given the short period of time since the Board last met Dr. Cook did not have a 'formal report'; however, he stated that he would be offering comments on certain agenda items at the appropriate time. On a motion by Dr. Herring and seconded by Mr. Mitchell, the remarks of the President were unanimously accepted.

Report of the Secretary-Treasurer. Dr. Herring presented the Budget Report for the period covering July 1, 2013 through March 19, 2014. He called the Board's attention to the fact that with less than three months left in the fiscal year, expenses appear to be reasonably in line with the amounts budgeted for the fiscal year. Further, that while income projections have not yet been met there will be an undetermined amount of income from late license renewal fees, examination application fees and interest/investment income that, when based on past experience, is likely to reach a figure at or close to the amount budgeted. On a motion by Dr. Johnson seconded by Ms. Richardson and carried unanimously the report of the Secretary-Treasurer was accepted.

Budget for fiscal year 2014-2015, Board Members will be furnished with a draft of the proposed budget for fiscal year 2014-2015 for their information and review at least 3 weeks prior to the meeting in June when the budget for 2014-2015 will be on the agenda for adoption. A report addressing the performance of the Board's Staff prepared by the Executive Director was distributed as an aid to the Board Members in evaluating of the performance of the Board Staff over the past year. This report will accompany the draft of the proposed budget for fiscal year 2014-2015. During the closed session at the June meeting the Executive Director will be prepared to discuss and answer questions regarding the proposed budget and his review of the

performance of the Board's Staff over the past year.

Report of the Executive Director.

- Action on amending the Mission Statement of the ACOE by the AOA's HOD that was postponed in Chicago in June of 2012 was not on the agenda in San Diego last June (2013); however, this does not mean that there will no further efforts to amend the ACOE's Mission Statement in the future. Should the intent of the leadership of the AOA be to weaken, if not destroy, ARBO's COPE program by amending the mission statement of the ACOE to include the accreditation of the providers of continuing education, it will have adverse consequences on this Board's current rules and regulations and could eventually result in control over the approval process of continuing education programs offered outside the geographical boundaries of this state.
- At its last meeting the Board went on record opposing 'board certification' by • reaffirming the resolutions adopted unanimously in 2009, 2010, 2011, 2012 and 2013 in opposition to the AOA efforts to 'force' board certification on the profession through the American Board of Optometry (ABO). It is with these facts in mind that this Board encourages the North Carolina State Optometric Society to reaffirm resolutions passed overwhelmingly in 2009, 2010. 2011, 2012 and 2013 at its Annual Business Meetings and send its delegates to the AOA HODs in June 2014 in Philadelphia instructed to vote against the amending of the ACOE's mission statement to include the approving of providers of optometric continuing education and against all motions and resolutions that support board certification as a means of assuring maintenance of competence and/or the further use of AOA dues monies in support of such activities. It is recommended that the action of the Board at this meeting in reaffirming its resolutions be forwarded to the Officers, Trustees and Staff of the North Carolina State Optometric Society prior to the 2014 Spring Meeting of the Society with a request that the matter be placed on the agenda of the Society's Executive Council meeting the evening before the opening session of the Society's Spring Meeting requesting that they too reaffirm previous resolutions in opposition to 'board certification' and the amending of the Mission Statement of the ACOE; and further, that the North Carolina delegation to the House of Delegates of American Optometric in Philadelphia go instructed to vote NO on all matters in support of board certification by the American Board of Optometry (ABO) and/or the amending of the Mission Statement of the ACOE to include the approving of providers of optometric continuing education.
- While the Board office continues to receive inquiries from licensees who are concerned about the need to become 'board certified' by the American Board of Optometry the numbers of inquiries have diminished noticably. Those making the inquiries are informed that the Board's position on 'board certification' is no different than that expressed in past memorandums sent by the Board to every licensee on the subject over the past few years, the most recent memorandum on the subject dated December 3, 2012. Those who inquire are informed that the Board has seen no credible evidence that any licensee of this Board (or a licensee of any other Board in the entire country) has been denied being a provider on any managed care panel, or payment by any insurance company like BlueCross/BlueShield, Medicare, Medicaid, or refused hospital privileges based singularly on the fact that they were not 'board certified'.
- At this meeting the Board must act upon the its Rules, 21 NCAC 42B.0107, WRITTEN EXAMINATION, the proposed Rule as amended (to update the Board

Rule on Written Examinations in keeping with changes made in the content outline of the National Board of Examiners in Optometry) and 21 NCAC 42B.0107, licensing of military optometrists and spouses of military optometrists, both having been posted on the Board's web site for public comment for the required 60 day period which ended earlier this month; and further, without any comment(s) being received from the public during the that period. The action required in the rule making process is the Board's adoption of 21 NCAC 42B.0107 and 21 NCAC 42B.0114 as posted.

Dr. Cook this completes the report of the Executive Director.

Re: Objections to Rules 21 NCAC 42B .0107 and .0114.

Dear Mr. Loper:

At its meeting this morning, the Rules Review Commission objected to the abovecaptioned rules in accordance with G.S. 150B-21.10.

The Commission objected to both rules for failure to comply with the Administrative Procedure Act. In the initial filing on March 20, 2014, the Board stated on the Submission for Permanent Rule forms that the rules had not yet been formally adopted by the agency, but would be on November 14, 2014. Agencies are required to adopt rules before submitting them to the Commission. (*See* G.S. 150B-21.1) In response to a Request for Technical Change from Commission staff that requested the actual date of adoption by the agency, the Board filed new Submission for Permanent Rule forms on April 11, 2014. The new forms stated the rules had been adopted by the Board on November 14, 2013. The comment period for both rules was January 2, 2014 through March 3, 2014. G.S. 150B-21.2(g) states, in relevant part, "An agency shall not adopt a rule until the time for commenting on the proposed text of the rule has elapsed[.]"

Based upon the submissions of the agency, the Commission found that the Board failed to comply with the Administrative Procedure Act. If the Board did comply with the Act, it may file evidence of compliance with the Commission for review at a later meeting in accordance with G.S. 150B-21.12.

The Commission also objected to Rule 42B .0114 based upon ambiguity. In Subparagraphs (a)(1) and (b)(2), the Board proposed to determine "other methods as appropriate to the Board" and gave no guidance on how this will be determined. This lack of guidance makes the rule unclear.

The Commission also objected to the rule for lack of statutory authority to require in Subparagraph (a)(1)(iii) for the applicant to be performing at a satisfactory level of competency in the occupational specialty. G.S. 93B-15.1 requires performance in the specialty, but it does not require the individual to be actively performing it to seek licensure under the statute. This statute does not confine itself to active duty military members, but instead speaks to those who have received military training and been awarded an MOS. The law can extend to retired or discharged military applicants seeking licensure. In addition, the language is ambiguous, as there is no guidance in the Rule as to what will constitute the "satisfactory level" of competency.

Please respond to this letter in accordance with the provisions of G.S. 150B-21.12. If you have any questions regarding the Commission's actions, please let me know.
