1 (b) Wildlife Damage Control Agents: Upon completion of a training course designed for the purpose of reviewing 2 and updating information on wildlife laws and safe, humane wildlife handling techniques, techniques, and 3 demonstration of a knowledge of wildlife laws and safe, humane wildlife handling techniques, an individual with no 4 record of wildlife law violations may apply to the Wildlife Resources Commission (Commission) to become a 5 Wildlife Damage Control Agent (WDCA). Those persons who demonstrate knowledge of wildlife laws and safe, 6 humane wildlife handling techniques by a passing score of at least 85 percent on a written examination provided by 7 a representative of the Wildlife Resources Commission, Commission in cooperation with the training course 8 provider, provider shall be approved. Those persons failing to obtain a passing score shall be given one chance for 9 re-testing without re-taking the course. Those persons approved as agents by the Commission may then issue 10 depredation permits for depredation as defined in Subparagraph (a)(1) of this Rule to landholders and be listed as a 11 second party to provide the control service. WDCAs may not issue depredation permits for coyotes in the counties 12 of Beaufort, Dare, Hyde, Tyrrell, Washington; Washington, Tyrrell, and Beaufort, big game animals; bats; animals, 13 bats, or species listed as endangered, threatened, threatened or special concern under 15A NCAC 10I .0103, .0104 14 and .0105 of this Chapter. WDCAs shall must report to the Wildlife Resources Commission the number and 15 disposition of animals taken, by county, annually. Records shall must be available for inspection by a Wildlife 16 Enforcement officer at any time during normal business hours. These business hours are the posted business hours 17 of the Commisson at newildlife.org. Wildlife Damage Control Agent status shall be revoked at any time by the 18 Executive Director when there is evidence of violations of wildlife laws, failure to report, or inhumane treatment of 19 animals by the WDCA. A WDCA may not charge for the permit, but may charge for his or her investigations and 20 control services. In order to maintain a knowledge of current laws, rules, and techniques, each WDCA shall must 21 renew his or her agent status every three years by showing proof of having attended at least one training course 22 provided for the purpose of reviewing and updating information on wildlife laws, laws and safe, humane wildlife 23 handling techniques within the previous 12 months. 24 (c) Each depredation permit shall have an expiration date or time after which the depredation permit is no longer 25 valid. The depredation permit authorizes possession of any wildlife resources taken under the permit and shall-must 26 be retained as long as the wildlife resource is in the permittee's possession. All individuals taking wildlife resources 27 under the authority of a depredation permit are obligated to the conditions written on the permit and the 28 requirements specified in this Rule. 29 (d) Manner of Taking: 30 (1) Taking Without a Permit. Wildlife taken without a permit while committing depredations to 31 property may, during the open season on the species, be taken by the landholder by any lawful 32 method. During the closed <u>season</u>, <u>season</u> such depredating wildlife may be taken without a 33 permit only by the use of firearms or archery equipment as defined in 15A NCAC 10B .0116. 34 (2) Taking With a Permit. Wildlife taken under a depredation permit may be taken only by the 35 method or methods authorized by the permit. When trapping is authorized, in order to limit the 36 taking to the intended purpose, the permit may specify a reasonable distance from the property

sought to be protected, according to the particular circumstances, within which the traps shall must

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be set. The Executive Director or agent may also state in a permit authorizing trapping whether or not bait may be used and the type of bait, if any, that is authorized. In addition to any trapping restrictions that may be contained in the permit, permit the method of trapping shall must be in accordance with the requirements and restrictions imposed by G.S. 113-291.6 and other local laws passed by the General Assembly. No depredation permit shall authorize the use of poisons or pesticides in taking wildlife except in accordance with the provisions of the North Carolina Pesticide Law of 1971, the Structural Pest Control Act of 1955, and G.S. 113, Article 22A. No depredation permit shall authorize the taking of wildlife by any method by any landholder upon the lands of another except when the individual is listed as a second party on a depredation permit.

(3) Intentional Wounding. It is unlawful for any landholder, with or without a depredation permit, intentionally to wound a wild animal in a manner so as not to cause its immediate death as suddenly and humanely as the circumstances permit.

## (e) Disposition of Wildlife Taken:

- (1) Generally. Except as provided by the succeeding Subparagraphs of this Paragraph, any wildlife killed without a permit while committing depredations shall be buried or otherwise disposed of in a safe and sanitary manner on the property. Wildlife killed under a depredation permit may be transported to an alternate disposal site if desired. Anyone in possession of carcasses of animals being transported under a depredation permit shall must have the depredation permit in his or her possession. Except as provided by the succeeding Subparagraphs of (d)(2) through (5) of this Rule, all wildlife killed under a depredation permit shall must be buried or otherwise disposed of as stated on the permit.
- (2) Deer and feral swine. The edible portions of feral swine and deer may be retained by the landholder for consumption but shall must not be transported from the property where the depredations took place without a valid depredation permit. The landholder may give a second party the edible portions of the feral swine and deer taken under the depredation permit. The receiver of the edible portions shall must hold a copy of the depredation permit. The nonedible portions of any deer carcass, including head, hide, feet, and antlers, shall be disposed of as specified in Subparagraph (1) of this Paragraph or turned over to a wildlife enforcement officer for disposition.
- (3) Fox. Any fox killed under a depredation permit may be disposed of as described in Subparagraph(1) of this Paragraph or, upon compliance with the fur tagging requirements of 15A NCAC 10B.0400, the carcass or pelt thereof may be sold to a licensed fur dealer.
- (4) Furbearing Animals. The carcass or pelt of any furbearing animal killed during the open season for taking such furbearing animal for control of depredations to property, whether with or without a permit, may be sold to a licensed fur dealer provided that the person offering such carcass or pelt for sale has a valid hunting or trapping license; license, provided further that, bobcats and otters

34	(1)	Requirement. Except as provided in Subparagraph (4) (2) of this Paragraph, any person entering
35		upon any game land for the purpose of hunting, trapping, or running dogs or training dogs using
36		wildlife participating in dog training or field trial activities shall have in his or her possession a
37		game lands license in addition to the appropriate hunting or trapping license, or a license that

1 conveys the game land use privilege licenses. - A field trial participant is defined as a judge, 2 handler, scout or owner. 3 (2) For commission-sanctioned field trials, active participants (as defined in 15A NCAC 10B .0114) in a field trial using wildlife [the following persons] shall possess a game lands license in addition 4 5 to the appropriate North Carolina hunting license, or a license that conveys the game land use 6 privilege, [privilege: active participants (as defined in 15A NCAC 10B .0114) in a field trial using wildlife.] except non-residents may substitute hunting licenses from their state(s) of residence. 7 8 (3) For any other field trial using wildlife occurring on game lands, judges and active participants 9 shall possess a game lands license in addition to the appropriate North Carolina hunting license, or 10 a license that conveys the game land use privilege 11 (4)(2)Exceptions: a person under 16 years of age may hunt on game lands on the license of his parent or 12 (A) 13 legal guardian; 14 <del>(B)</del> the resident and nonresident sportsman's licenses include game lands use privileges; 15 judges and nonresidents participating in field trials under the circumstances set forth in 16 Paragraph (e) of this Rule may do so without the game lands license; or 17 (B)(D) on the game lands described in Rule .0103(e)(1) of this Section, the game lands license is 18 required only for hunting doves; all other activities are subject to the control of the 19 landowners. 20 (f)(e) Field Trials and Training Dogs. A person serving as judge of a field trial that, pursuant to a written request 21 from the sponsoring organization, has been authorized in writing and scheduled for occurrence on a game land by an 22 authorized representative of the Wildlife Resources Commission, and any nonresident handler, scout, or owner 23 participating therein may participate without procuring a game lands license, provided such nonresident has in his 24 possession a valid hunting license issued by the state of his residence. Any individual or organization sponsoring a 25 field trial on the Sandhills Field Trial area or the Laurinburg Fox Trial facility shall file with the Commission an 26 application to use the area and facility accompanied by the facility use fee computed at the rate of two hundred 27 dollars (\$200.00) for each scheduled day of the trial. The total facility use fee shall cover the period from 12:00 28 noon of the day preceding the first scheduled day of the trial to 10:00 a.m. of the day following the last scheduled 29 day of the trial. The facility use fee shall be paid for all intermediate days on which for any reason trials are not run 30 but the building or facilities are used or occupied. A fee of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) per day shall be charged to 31 sporting, educational, or scouting groups for scheduled events utilizing the club house only. No person or group of 32 persons or any other entity shall enter or use in any manner any of the physical facilities located on the Sandhills 33 Field Trial area or the Laurinburg Fox Trial facility without first having obtained written approval of such entry or 34 use from an authorized agent of the Wildlife Resources Commission, and no such entry or use of any such facility shall exceed the scope of or continue beyond the approved use. The Sandhills Field Trial facilities shall be used 35 36 only for field trials scheduled with the approval of the Wildlife Resources Commission. No more than 16 days of 37 field trials may be scheduled for occurrence on the Sandhills facilities during any calendar month, and no more than

1 four days may be scheduled during any calendar week; provided, that a field trial requiring more than four days may 2 be scheduled during one week upon reduction of the maximum number of days allowable during some other week 3 so that the monthly maximum of 16 days is not exceeded. Before October 1 of each year, the North Carolina Field 4 Trial Association or other organization desiring use of the Sandhills facilities between October 22 and November 18 5 and between December 3 and March 31 shall submit its proposed schedule of such use to the Wildlife Resources 6 Commission for its consideration and approval. The use of the Sandhills Field Trial facilities at any time by 7 individuals for training dogs is prohibited; elsewhere on the Sandhills Game Lands dogs may be trained only on 8 Mondays, Wednesdays, and Saturdays from October 1 through April 1. Dogs may not be trained or permitted to run 9 unleashed from April 1 through August 15 on any game land located west of I-95 except when participating in field 10 trials sanctioned by the Wildlife Resources Commission. Dogs may not be trained or permitted to run unleashed 11 from March 15 through June 15 on any game land located east of I-95 except when participating in field trials 12 sanctioned by the Wildlife Resources Commission. Additionally, on game lands located west of I-95 where special 13 hunts are scheduled for sportsmen participating in the Disabled Sportsman Program, dogs may not be trained or 14 allowed to run unleashed during legal big game hunting hours on the dates of the special hunts. A field trial shall be 15 authorized when such field trial does not conflict with other planned activities on the Game Land or field trial 16 facilities and the applying organization can demonstrate their experience and expertise in conducting genuine field 17 trial activities. Entry to physical facilities, other than by field trial organizations under permit, shall be granted when 18 they do not conflict with other planned activities previously approved by the Commission and they do not conflict 19 with the mission the primary goals of the agency. 20 (g)(f) Trapping. Subject to the restrictions contained in 15A NCAC 10B .0110, .0302 and .0303, trapping of 21 furbearing animals is permitted on game lands during the applicable open seasons, except that trapping is prohibited: 22 on the field trial course of the Sandhills Game Land; (1) 23 (2) in posted "safety zones" located on any game land; 24 by the use of bait on the National Forest Lands bounded by the Blue Ridge Parkway on the south, (3) 25 US 276 on the north and east, and NC 215 on the west; 26 (4) on the John's River Waterfowl Refuge in Burke County; and 27 (5) on the Dupont State Forest Game Lands. 28 On those areas of state-owned land known collectively as the Roanoke River Wetlands controlled trapping is 29 allowed under a permit system. 30 (h)(g) Vehicular Traffic. No person shall drive a motorized vehicle on any game land except on those roads constructed, maintained, [maintained] and opened for vehicular travel and those trails posted for vehicular travel, 31 32 unless such person: 33 (1) is driving in the vehicle gallery of a scheduled bird dog field trial held on the Sandhills Game 34 35 (2) is a disabled sportsman as defined in Paragraph (j) of this Rule or holds a Disabled Access 36 Program Permit as described in Paragraph (m) of this Rule and is abiding by the rules described in 37 Paragraph (m).

- 1 (i)(h) Camping. No person shall camp on any game land except on an area designated by the landowner for
- 2 camping.

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- 3 (j)(i) Swimming. Swimming is prohibited in the lakes located on the Sandhills Game Land.
- 4 (k)(i) Disabled Sportsman Program. In order to qualify for permit hunts for disabled sportsmen offered by the
- 5 Commission and use of designated blinds during those hunts, an individual shall possess a Disabled Veteran
- 6 Sportsman license, a Totally Disabled Sportsman license or a disabled sportsman hunt certification issued by the
- 7 Commission. In order to qualify for the certification, the applicant shall provide medical certification of one or more
- 8 of the following disabilities:
  - (1) missing 50 percent or more of one or more limbs, whether by amputation or natural causes;
- 10 (2) paralysis of one or more limbs;
  - dysfunction of one or more limbs rendering the person unable to perform the task of grasping and lifting with the hands and arms or unable to walk without mechanical assistance, other than a cane;
    - (4) disease or injury or defect confining the person to a wheelchair, walker, or crutches; or
- 14 (5) deafness.

On game lands where the privileges described in Paragraph (m) of this Rule apply, participants in the program may operate electric wheel chairs, all terrain vehicles or other passenger vehicles:

- (1) on ungated or open-gated roads normally closed to vehicular traffic; and
- (2) on any Commission-maintained road open for vehicular travel and those trails posted for vehicular travel.

20 Each program participant may be accompanied by one companion provided such companion has in his possession

21 the companion card issued by the Commission. Hunters who qualify under the Disabled Sportsman Program and

their companions may access special hunting blinds for people with disabilities during regularly scheduled, non-

23 permit hunting days on a first come basis, except for those blinds located on the Restricted Area of Caswell Game

24 Land.

- 25 (1)(k) Release of Animals and Fish. It is unlawful to release pen-raised animals or birds, wild animals or birds,
- domesticated animals, except hunting dogs and raptors where otherwise permitted for hunting or training purposes,
- 27 or feral animals, or hatchery-raised fish on game lands without prior written authorization. It is unlawful to move
- wild fish from one stream to another on game lands without prior written authorization. Written authorization shall
- be given when release of such animals is determined by a Wildlife Resources Commission biologist not to be
- 30 harmful to native wildlife in the area and such releases are in the public interest or advance the programs and goals
- 31 of the Wildlife Resources Commission.
- 32 (m)(1) Non-Highway Licensed Vehicles. It is unlawful to operate motorized land vehicles not licensed for highway
- use on Game Lands except for designated areas on National Forests. Disabled persons as defined in Paragraph (j) of
- this Rule and people who have obtained a Disabled Access Program permit are exempt from the previous sentence
- 35 but must comply with the terms of their permit. Furthermore, disabled persons, as defined under the federal
- 36 Americans with Disabilities Act, may use wheelchairs or other mobility devices designed for indoor pedestrian use
- on any area where foot travel is allowed.

1 (n)(m) Disabled Access Program. Permits issued under this program shall be based upon medical evidence 2 submitted by the person verifying that a handicap exists that limits physical mobility to the extent that normal 3 utilization of the game lands is not possible without vehicular assistance. Persons meeting this requirement may 4 operate electric wheel chairs, all terrain vehicles, and other passenger vehicles on any Commission-maintained road 5 open for vehicular travel and those trails posted for vehicular travel and ungated or open-gated roads otherwise 6 closed to vehicular traffic on game lands owned by the Wildlife Resources Commission and on game lands whose 7 owners have agreed to such use. Those game lands, or parts thereof, where this Paragraph applies are designated in 8 the game land rules and map book. This Paragraph does not permit vehicular access on fields, openings, roads, 9 paths, or trails planted to wildlife food or cover. One companion, who is identified by a companion card issued to 10 each qualified disabled person, may accompany a disabled person to provide assistance, provided the companion is at all times in visual or verbal contact with the disabled person. The companion may participate in all lawful 11 12 activities while assisting a disabled person, provided license requirements are met. Any vehicle used by a qualified 13 disabled person for access to game lands under this provision shall display the vehicular access permit issued by the 14 Wildlife Resources Commission in the passenger area of the vehicle where it can easily be seen by Commission 15 staff outside the vehicle. It is unlawful for anyone other than disabled persons as defined in Paragraph (j) of this 16 Rule and those holding a Disabled Access Permit to hunt, during waterfowl season, within 100 yards of a waterfowl 17 blind designated by the Wildlife Resources Commission as a Disabled Sportsman's hunting blind. 18 (o)(n) Public nudity. Public nudity, including nude sunbathing, is prohibited on any Game Land, including land or 19 water. For the purposes of this Section, "public nudity" means a person's intentional failure to cover with a fully 20 opaque covering the person's genitals, pubic area, anal area, or female breasts below a point from the top of the 21 areola while in a public place. 22 (o) Definitions: For the purpose of this Subchapter "Permanent Hunting Blind" is defined as any structure that is 23 used for hunter concealment, constructed from man made or natural materials, and that is not disassembled and 24 removed at the end of each day's hunt. 25 (p) Shooting Ranges. On public shooting ranges managed by the Commission, no person shall use designated 26 shooting ranges for any purpose other than for firearm or bow and arrow marksmanship, development of shooting 27 skills or for other safe uses of firearms and archery equipment. All other uses, including camping, building fires, 28 operating concessions or other activities not directly involved with recreational or competitive shooting are 29 prohibited, except that activities that have been approved by the Commission and for which a permit has been issued 30 may be conducted, provided that the permit authorizing such activity is available for inspection by wildlife 31 enforcement officers at the time the activity is taking place. No person, when using any shooting range, shall 32 deposit any debris or refuse on the grounds of the range. This includes any items used as targets, except that clay 33 targets broken on the range, by the shooter, may be left on the grounds where they fall. No person shall shoot any 34 items made of glass on the grounds of the range. No person may leave any vehicle or other obstruction in such a 35 location or position that it will prevent, impede or inconvenience the use by other persons of any shooting range. No 36 person shall leave parked any vehicle or other object at any place on the shooting range other than such a place or 37 zone as is designated as an authorized parking zone and posted or marked as such. No person shall handle any

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      firearms or bow and arrow on a shooting range in a careless or reckless manner. No person shall intentionally shoot
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      into any target holder, post, or other permanent fixture or structure while using a shooting range. No person shall
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      shoot a firearm in a manner that would cause any rifled or smoothbore projectiles to travel off of the range, except
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      that shotgun shot, size No. 4 or smaller may be allowed to travel from the range if it presents no risk of harm or
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      injury to any person(s). Persons using a shooting range must obey posted range safety rules and those persons who
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      violate range safety rules or create a public safety hazard must leave the shooting range if directed to by law
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      enforcement officers or Commission employees. No person shall handle any firearms on a shooting range while
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      under the influence of an impairing substance. The consumption of alcohol or alcoholic beverages on a shooting
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      range is prohibited. Open days and hours of operation shall be designated on signs and at least one of such signs
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      will be posted at the entrance to each shooting range. No person, when using any shooting range, shall do any act
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      which is prohibited or neglect to do any act which is required by signs or markings placed on such area under
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      authority of this Rule for the purpose of regulating the use of the area.
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      (q) Limited-access Roads. During the months of June, July and August, roads posted as "Limited-access Roads" are
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      open to motorized vehicles from 5:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. only. These roads shall be posted with the opening and
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      closing times.
