The Commission objected to this Rule, finding the Board does not have statutory authority to issue the unrestricted temporary license for individuals practicing solely on federal military installations proposed by Paragraph (b) of the Rule.

 21 NCAC 52.0211 is amended as published in NCR 27:16, pp. 166-1663, as follows:

ст,	21 NCAC 52 .0211 TEMPORARY MILITARY LICENSE		
4	(a) <u>Restri</u>	cted Temporary License: The Board shall may grant restricted temporary license privileges to	
5	podiatrists practicing in a clinical residency solely on federal military installations within North Carolina.		
6	Application for restricted temporary license shall require the same education education, minus the one-year clinical		
7	residency as required by G.S. 90.202.5(a), as for a permanent license, and an applicant need only have passed Parts I		
8	and II of the National Boards, but there shall be no examination nor application fee assessed. Temporary Restricted		
9	temporary licenses shall be granted for a maximum of one-year, renewable annually so long as the podiatrist		
10	continues to practice	e within the clinical residency on the federal military installation.	
11	<u>(b)</u> <u>Unre</u>	stricted Temporary License: Prior to the annual licensing examination, the Board may grant	
12	unrestricted temporary license privileges to podiatrists practicing solely on federal military installations within		
13	North Carolina who		
14	<u>(1)</u>	Have completed their one-year clinical residency as required by G.S. 90.202.5,	
15	(2)	Hold a podiatry license in good standing from another jurisdiction,	
16	<u>(3)</u>	Have practiced for two of the preceding five years (may include clinical residency), and	
17	<u>(4)</u>	Have applied to sit for the North Carolina licensure exam within the coming 12 months.	
18	Application for unre	stricted temporary license shall require successful completion of the same education and	
19	National Board examinations as for a permanent license. Unrestricted temporary licenses shall be granted for a		
20	maximum of one-year, until such time as the podiatrist passes the North Carolina licensing exam and receives a		
21	permanent, unrestricted license or is denied licensure for having failed the North Carolina licensing exam.		
22	(c) Perma	nent Unrestricted License-Military Podiatrist: The Board shall issue a permanent license to a	
23	military-trained applicant to allow the applicant to lawfully practice podiatry in North Carolina if, upon application		
24	to the Board, the applicant satisfies the following conditions:		
25	(1)	Has been awarded a military occupational specialty in podiatry and has done all of the	
26		following at a level that is substantially equivalent to or exceeds the requirements for	
27		licensure in North Carolina: completed a military program of podiatry training and completed	
28		testing and equivalent training and experience.	
29	<u>(2)</u>	Has engaged in the practice of podiatry for at least two of the five years (may include clinical	
30		residency) preceding the date of the application under this paragraph(c).	
31	<u>(3)</u>	Has not committed any act in any jurisdiction that would have constituted grounds for refusal,	
32		suspension, or revocation of a license to practice podiatry in this State at the time the act was	
33		<u>committed.</u>	
34	(4)	Pays the application, examination, and licensing fees required by the board.	
35		nent Unrestricted License-Podiatrist Spouse of Military Personnel: The board shall issue to	
36	a military spouse a license to practice podiatry in this State if, upon application to the board, the military spouse		
37	satisfies the following conditions:		

1	<u>(1)</u>	Holds a current license, certification, or registration from another jurisdiction, and that	
2		jurisdiction's requirements for licensure, certification, or registration are substantially	
3		equivalent to or exceed the requirements for licensure in this State.	
4	<u>(2)</u>	Can demonstrate competency in the occupation through passing the North Carolina	
5		examination.	
6	<u>(3)</u>	Has not committed any act in any jurisdiction that would have constituted grounds for refusal,	
7		suspension, or revocation of a license to practice that occupation in this State at the time the	
8		act was committed.	
9	<u>(4)</u>	Is in good standing and has not been disciplined by the agency that had jurisdiction to issue	
10		the license, certification, or permit.	
11	<u>(5)</u>	Pays the application, examination, and licensing fees required by the board.	
12	(e) <u>All rel</u>	evant podiatric medical experience of a military service member in the discharge of official	
13	duties or, for a military spouse, all relevant podiatric medical experience, including full-time and part-time		
14	experience, regardless of whether in a paid or volunteer capacity, shall be credited in the calculation of years of		
15	practice in an occupation as required under subsection (a) or (b) of this rule.		
16	(f) A nonresident licensed under this rule shall be entitled to the same rights and subject to the same		
17	obligations as required of a resident licensed by the board in this State.
