1	ISA INC	CAC 10D .0229 GOOSE CREEK GAME LAND IN BEAUFORT AND PAMILICO COUNTIES	
2	Goose Creek game land is a Seven Days per Week Area, in which the following applies:		
3	<u>(1)</u>	Deer of either sex may be taken on all the open days of the applicable Deer With Visible Antlers Season.	
4	<u>(2)</u>	Except as provided in 15A NCAC 10D .0103 (d)(2), waterfowl in posted waterfowl impoundments shall be	
5		taken only on the following days:	
6		(a) the opening and closing days of the applicable waterfowl seasons;	
7		(b) Thanksgiving, Christmas, New Year's, and Martin Luther King, Jr. Days; and	
8		(c) Tuesdays and Saturdays of the applicable waterfowl seasons.	
9	<u>(3)</u>	Beginning on the first open waterfowl season day in October through the end of all waterfowl seasons,	
10		waterfowl hunting is by permit only on the following waterfowl impoundments: Pamlico Point, Campbell	
11		Creek, Hunting Creek, Spring Creek, Smith Creek, and Hobucken.	
12	<u>(4)</u>	On Spring Lake, Pamlico Point, and Campbell Creek Waterfowl Impoundments, all activities, except	
13		waterfowl hunting on designated waterfowl hunting days and trapping during the trapping season, are	
14		restricted to the posted Scouting-only Zone during the period November 1 through March 15.	
15	<u>(5)</u>	Camping is restricted to September 1 through the last day of February and March 31 through May 14 in	
16		areas both designated and posted as camping areas.	
17	<u>(6)</u>	Hunting and vehicular access on the Parker Farm Tract is restricted from September 1 through January 1	
18		and April 1 through May 15 to individuals that possess a valid hunting opportunity permit.	
19	<u>(7)</u>	Pursuing or chasing deer or bear with dogs for the purposes of training or hunting is prohibited on the	
20		Beaufort County portion north of NC 33 except for that portion east of Smith Creek and south of Campbell	
21		Creek.	
22	<u>(8)</u>	Bear shall not be harvested on Sunday.

Re: Emergency Rule Filing, 15A NCAC 10D .0229

Dear Chairman Crump:

G.S. 150B-21.1A sets forth a two-part test to engage in emergency rulemaking: (1) adherence to the notice and hearing requirements of G.S. 150B, Article 2A, Part 2 are contrary to the public interest and (2) the immediate adoption of the rule is required by a serious and unforeseen threat to the public health or safety. I find the rule filed by the Wildlife Resource Commission ("WRC") does not meet the criteria required in G.S. 150B-21.1A.

15A NCAC 10D .0229 was proposed as a permanent rule and approved by the Rules Review Commission at its August meeting. The rule was one of a group of related rule changes proposed by the agency at the same time, namely moving contents of 15A NCAC 10D .0103 into separate rules. 15A NCAC 10D .0229 recieved at least ten letters of objection, subjecting it to legislative review and a delayed effective date in accordance with G.S. 150B-21.3. As a result, the effective date of this rule did not line up with the others in the filings approved by RRC in August, leaving Goose Creek Game Land entirely unregulated.

The agency failed to show the notice and hearing requirements of temporary and permanent rulemaking are contrary to the public interest. The agency originally proposed this rule as a permanent rule, going through public notice and comment and RRC review. Members of the public engaged in the rulemaking process and filed at least ten letters of objection. In other words, the public's involvement in the rulemaking process directly resulted in the delayed effective date. Approval of an emergency rule would override the public's request for a delayed effective date and

If this emergency rule were approved, agencies may be encouraged to use emergency rulemaking to override the legislative review process in the future. As a result, the proposed emergency rule fails the first part of the test.

Since the filing fails the first part of the test, there is no need to engage in any further analysis. The rule filed by WRC does not meet the criteria for emergency rulemaking required in G.S. 150B-21.1A. Please respond to this letter in accordance with the provisions of G.S. 150B-21.1A(b).
