Good morning Brian,

Thank you for the time yesterday. Here is the revised .0409 with the class B misdemeanor edit as well as the FEMA typing references removed.

Following up on your concern that that NCEM is exceeding the agencies statutory authority in .0404 and .0405 to memorialize for the record from our phone call, with respect to .0404 and NIMS – we believe nothing in this document falls outside of existing authorities specifically in G.S. 166A-66(a) 1, 2, and 3 as well as more broadly described in G.S. 166A-19.12 in the powers of the Division. Furthermore, for the regulated public, this requirement is not new as they are already under this requirement to receive federal preparedness dollars (NCEM included). This FEMA policy is really incorporating existing practices of a standardized response structure, naming conventions, et el. While lengthy, we do not believe anything included in the document falls outside of existing authorities in either the powers of the Division or specifically in Article 6 that outlines the SAR program.

Finally, in .0405 – with respect to the Public Assistance Program and Policy Guide, we do not believe anything in this document falls outside of existing authorities specifically in G.S. 166A-66(a) 4 and 6 as well as more broadly in G.S. 166A-19.12 and G.S. 166A-19.41(b)(2). Furthermore, for the regulated public, this requirement is also not new as many of the responses have been reimbursed by State and Federal Funds. The State Public Assistance Program in G.S. Chapter 166A is consistent with the federal Stafford Act. This is implemented through the PAPPG for any public entity. Specifically, the statue states that "Emergency Protective Measures" are eligible for State disasters and that is a term directly from the Stafford Act as well as the PAPPG. The regulated public is already complying with this policy as a practice outside of the SAR program and frankly its inclusion, while lengthy, will ensure that G.S. 166A-66(a) 4 and 6 are crafted around existing practices as well as consistent regardless of who is paying for the response costs.

Per our conversation, I will send the final copy of the rules to the <u>OAH.rules@nc.gov</u> so they will have the final versions for the meeting.

Will,

I have gotten through several of the new rules you sent me, and so far, everything looks pretty good, with one exception in Rule .0409.

As of now, I will recommend approval of .0401, .0402, .0403, .0406, .0407, .0408, and .0410. Approval of .0406 and .0407 is contingent on making the changes below, which are minor, and shouldn't be an issue.

.0404

I think you should use the formal title of the NIMS document you're incorporating by reference.

I looked at the link, and it's 133 pages. My only concern is if there is anything in this guide that you're requiring, but would exceed your statutory authority. Can you confirm that?

On line 16, delete "the" before "Chapter 132".[Polk, Will] NIMS is set of principles and policies and not a law but more operational principles that at the foundations of EM that federal, state, local, and tribal agencies follow. Everything within the NIMS document is the fundamental basis for emergency management operations and those principles are

baked in the Chapter 166A of the General Statutes and specifically Article 6 and more on point with Rule .0404, GS 166A-66 and does not exceed our authority.

Rule .0404 is consistent with the NIMS document and we are not requiring SAR system resources to follow anything that we are not already following under our own statutory authority.

.0405

I have similar questions about .the FEMA policy guide incorporated by reference in (g). It's 277 pages. Is there anything in here that would exceed your statutory authority? **[Polk, Will]** The Public Assistance Policy Guide (PAPPA-G) sets the policy that FEMA will reimburse eligible costs to applicants when engaged in disaster response/recovery. Our state laws and this rule are consistent with the section 406 of Stafford Act, the corresponding regulations for Public Assistance (reimbursements to governments not individuals) in 44 CFR, and 2 CFR Part 200, subparts E and F, and Appendix II which the PAPPA-G is based off. The elements in .0405 are consistent with what would be eligible under federal reimbursement if the SAR systems resources are deployed to assist in a federally declared disaster to respond to an event.

.0406

I'm recommending approval, but please fix the tabbing in (b).[Polk, Will] Done

.0407

I'm recommending approval, but please in (c)(3), line 36, delete "the" prior to "criteria".[Polk, Will] Done.

Now that you made clear to me what the difference is between Contract Response Teams and Specialty Response Teams, in terms of agreements, funding, and provision of equipment, I think the existing language is fine. My previous questions/concerns didn't take into consideration that the agency was treating these different kind of teams differently. *[Polk, Will] Acknowledged.*

.0409

In (a)(5), line 19, the addition of "by not having been convicted by a local, state, federal, or military court of:" makes many of the subparagraphs below ungrammatical. For instance, in (C), it reads "not having by not having been convicted by a local, state, federal, or military court of: . . . not having been convicted of an offense..." Similarly, in (D), you get "by not having been convicted by a local, state, federal, or military court of: . . . being truthful in providing information..." I think you probably can omit the addition, restore "not having been convicted of" to (A), and be fine.*[Polk, Will]*

In (a)(5)(B), lines 23-24, did you mean to delete "for five years or the completion of any corrections supervision imposed by the courts, whichever is later"? It's hanging out there after a period (which should also be deleted, FYI), and was language I had already flagged as unclear. *[Polk, Will] Updated and restored in text.*

Also in (a)(5)(B), line 21, are you sure about this reference? 12 NCAC 09B .0111(3) doesn't define misdemeanor, it just says an officer shall not have been convicted of a Class B misdemeanor. The definition of "misdemeanor" is in 12B NCAC 09A .0103(24). [Polk, Will] Fixed, will submit the final draft after we discuss the USAR and Swiftwater team.

I have an issue with what you've done with the USAR and Swiftwater teams, in (c)(1) and (e)(1). It looks like you added incorporations by reference to a FEMA tool which defines the amount of personnel and equipment for each kind of Type I, II, and III team. However, those definitions don't line up with what's in your rule. For instance, in (e)(1), you have minimum personnel of 32, 24, and 16 for a type I, II, and III team, respectively, while the FEMA doc says 16, 12, and 6, respectively. There may be other inconsistencies, but one is enough to make this unclear and ambiguous. Moreover, by locating the incorporation in the Type I definition for USAR and Swiftwater and none other, its not clear it applies to all the other teams. Also, to the extent that these FEMA documents are changing the requirements that you published, I think you're making a substantial change to your rules. **[Polk, Will]** We can discuss on Monday.

If you'd like to discuss again on Monday, I'd be more than happy to have another call with you, if you think that would help.

I've reviewed the responses to my requests for changes. Clearly, y'all have put a lot of work in here, and I appreciate that. I have several follow ups, however.

First, with respect to formatting. When you make post-publication changes to full adoptions, as you have here, the correct way to format changes is to take the whole rule out of underline, and then only underline and strike through the changes. You also amend the introductory statement to say – using Rule .0401 as an example – "14B NCAC 03 .0401 is adopted as published in 37:04 NCR 320-21 <u>with changes</u> as follows:" See the website at the link below for rule formatting examples. You want to look under Rule Format Examples for Publication in the NC Administrative Code, and then Permanent Adoption with changes from publication. <u>Rule Format Examples | NC OAH</u>

Second, please see below for individual follow ups about each rule.

All Rules

Ensure compliance with defined words, primarily those found in 14B NCAC 03 .0401. In many rules, you depart from the form of the term used in your definitions rule, either using a different term or different abbreviation. As an example, see "North Carolina Search and Rescue System" and reference being made to the "NC Search and Rescue Program" in 14B NCAC 03 .0410. If a phrase, entity, person, or other word is defined or abbreviated, that definition or abbreviation must be used later, depending upon the definition or abbreviation's applicability.

I've seen several examples where this has not been corrected. Please correct throughout. A prominent example I've noticed is "Sponsoring Agency" isn't capitalized although you capitalize it in R. 0402 in the definition. I'm assuming you *want* it capitalized because of how you styled it in the definition. If not, that's fine. Just be consistent.

Please capitalize "state" when referring only to the State of North Carolina. I don't think this was corrected anywhere within these Rules. Please correct throughout. I know it seems petty but under our style guide and under the Bluebook, references to "State" mean the State of North Carolina, while references to "state" mean any state level government. So it is a distinction with a difference. The easiest way is to hit Ctrl+G, make sure Word is checking for capitalization in the options, and then search for "state", and make corrections as necessary.

.0402

In (1), what does "has the potential to impact the State" mean? Who makes this determination? That is done by the Governor or delegated to the Division of Emergency management. Thanks for clarifying. That said, the rule itself is still unclear. Please amend the Rule to reflect this info. In (3), you are again using the term defined—"contract response team"—in the definition. The definition here, when boiled down, basically says a contract response team is a contract response team with self sustaining logistical support that can respond to disasters. The only unique term here is "self sustaining logistical support" which is undefined. Please revise. Done. I don't see a change in the Rule. Please revise the Rule.

In (7), line 23, you state that an ICS is "standardized." Are these FEMA standards? (See above). Also, what is a "standardized[,] on-scene emergency management construct"? What is a "construct" in this usage? Updated.

I see the reference to FEMA ICS is deleted in R. 0404, and that you've deleted the examples portion of the definition, but the point of the questions about this definition was to impress that the definition is vague and doesn't really say what an ICS is. Again, what is an "emergency management construct"? To what standards is it being built?

Similarly to above requests, in (11), does "resources" or "Resource" mean something beyond "System Resources" in (28)? No. It is the system resources. Why not say so in the Rule then?

Also in (11), why is the item number deleted? I think you also need to re-number everything following (11) as well.

In (12), what is the "North Carolina Search and Rescue **System**"? G.S. 166A-66 establishes the "North Carolina Search and Rescue Program" in Article 6. Is this a mistake or oversight? Correct the abbreviation and all references in later rules.

The program is organized into 5 programs. Defined the system as The Program to make it less confusing when talking about the USAR program, Swiftwater program, etc. vs. the entirely of The Program. We are working update GS 166A, but felt this was the easier solution to be clear for now. So, if I understand you correctly, you're using a Rule to essentially rename the Search and Rescue Program from Program--which is the name the statute gives it—to System? If that's true, then why do you continue to use "Program" in the definitions to follow?

In (14), line 15, who determines whether an emergency "could occur"? What is the standard for whether an emergency "could occur". The Governor or the Secretary of DPS or Director of the Division as delegated by the Governor to recommend a declaration of emergency as defined in the NC Emergency Management Act.

Thanks for clarifying. That said, the rule itself is still unclear. Please amend the Rule to reflect this info.

Why did you add a new definition for "Resource Typing" at (21) that is identical to the one for "NC Resource Typing" at (11)? Did you mean to delete (11) altogether?

In new (23), which is "Sensitive information", on line 19, please change "a activation" to "an activation."

In (28), p. 4, line 1, you forgot to delete the original formulation of "State Mission Assignment."

In (28), line 2, did you mean to delete both NCEM and North Carolina Division of Emergency Management? If so, then who approves the request?

It looks like you deleted (d), and made former (e) into new (d). Please format this correctly (see above for the strikethrough/underline guidance) by showing that it used to be (e) with a strikethrough.

Since you're deleting "State Mission Assignment" in former (d)(2), do you still need the definition in Rule .0402?

In (e), line 28, where is the statutory authority for the LEMC to delegate his or her authority? It looks like the LEMC position is created by statute in G.S. 166A-19.15(b), and I don't see where that provision allows the LEMC to delegate authority. Not saying it isn't there, but I don't see it. Please specify. Deleted.

No, it was not deleted. The Rule still states that the LEMC "or their designee shall have the authority to request system resources." Please correct.

.0404

In (1), line 5-6, please state with specificity which FEMA ICS and NIMS standards you are incorporating by reference. Please note that G.S. 150B-21.6 requires you to state where these resources can be obtained and at what cost. Please revise.

You did not address this request at all. Please revise the rule with the appropriate, specific incorporation.

In (2), line 7, what "personnel" must a resource follow? For instance, would the NCEM spokesman be able to direct the activities of a search and rescue team? Please revise for clarity. I think you meant "pursuant" rather than "pursuit" on line 9. Please revise.

In (4), you still are incorporating Ch. 132 by reference. Since Ch. 132 applies to DPS as it would any other State agency, it's not necessary to incorporate. Incorporations are more when you're adopting a rule, regulation, or document that doesn't already apply to your agency on its own terms.

In (b), what is "an on-duty status as an emergency management worker"? The referenced statute, G.S. 166A-19.60, defines "emergency management worker", but does not address "on-duty." Please clarify and revise. Done

I'm not sure that the revision added clarity here. As amended, it now says that "System Personnel shall be in work as an emergency management worker as defined in G.S. 166A-19.60(e)." Not sure that "in work" is any clearer than "on duty". What exactly are you requiring? That System Personnel also be "emergency management workers"? If so, I think you need to say what that means functionally – what does a member of a contract response team or a specialty response team have to do to be an emergency management worker?

In (d), line 14, what does it mean to "maintain all team training"? Changing "team" to "system personnel" really doesn't answer the question, which is what training are you requiring?

In (g), line 17, what "documentation" is required? Receipts and expenditure reports. Why not say so in the Rule then?

In (g), lines 18-19, where can this Guide be found and at what cost? You did not address this request at all. Please revise the rule with the appropriate, specific incorporation.

.0407

All references to "NCEM" and "NC SAR System" should be double checked to make sure they comply with any changes made to 14B NCAC 03 .0402. Also, ensure the abbreviations are used. I've noticed issues with this throughout these rules, but here, specifically, I saw you've got NCEM and "NC Emergency Management" in the same paragraph, (b)(1).

Also, in (b)(1), line 19, what is a "memorandum of agreement"? Is this a contract? Yes and we simplified it.

I don't see a change to the Rule.

In (C), what are "members"? This has not been used before. Is this similar to "personnel"? I know I didn't explicitly call it out, but "members" is also used in (b)(1) and (2). Same question here.

With respect to (c)(2), I'm a little confused by the addition made here. Who is submitting the bid package? The agency? Or does this refer to the distribution of the bid package as referenced in (c), line 27? I think the issue is that (c)(2) is in the passive tense, so this could be fixed by re-rewriting in the active tense.

In (c)(4), line 33, what are the "agreed upon criteria"? How is this established or what statute or rule is this determination made pursuant to? Who agrees upon this criteria? What informs the regulated public of this review process? Updated.

Thanks for making the change. Suggest simplifying to: "This committee will open all completed sealed bid packages and evaluate them based on an agreed upon <u>the</u> criteria as outlined in Rule .0408 of this Section..."

Additionally, in (c)(6), lines 1-2, avoid a comma splice and rewrite the subparagraph as "... notified and system agreements shall be drafted and executed..."

Further, what are "system agreements"?

Thanks for making changes here. I just noticed that you omitted "system" and it's not showing anymore. Sorry to be picky here, but when you reformat, make sure you're showing all deletions and all additions.

In (c)(7), line 3, the rule states the agreement has to be with the "sponsoring agency". I thought these agreements were between the NCEM and the contract response team. Please clarify. The sponsoring agency is the lead agency for a contract response team if they are multi agency teams.

In (c)(7)(A), lines 5-6, the rule states that the agreement is with the "sponsoring agency", but then states that the agreement will outline the terms that the "resource" must follow. Aren't these two different entities? How can the sponsoring agency make an agreement to bind the resource? I'm not sure the changes answer my question. I'm still not clear how the sponsoring agency can enter an agreement with NCEM to bind a third party who isn't a party to the agreement, unless the "resources" or "team" is somehow subordinate to the sponsoring agency. Perhaps providing a real world example (here, not in the Rule) might clear this up for me? What happens if there is no sponsoring agency?

In (c)(7)(A), line 9, is the "contract period" referenced the contract between NCEM and the contract response team? Or is it the period of the two agreements mentioned in line 3? Please clarify. Clarified. Where did the "four-year contract period with an optional one-year extension" come from? If this is a post-publication addition to the Rule that is defining the length of the contract, where it wasn't previously defined in statute or Rule, I'd say this is a substantial change, in that it creates an effect that couldn't have been expected based on the published language.

Also, it's not clear—is the contract for 4 years and a 1 year extension, or the agreement, or both?

In (c)(7)(C), line 14, how is "search and rescue capability" defined? You're telling your regulated public they can only use the money for one purpose but don't define that purpose. Please revise. Changing from "any other purpose other than maintaining or building search and rescue capability" to "any other purpose other than for the purposes of this program" doesn't really address the issue, which is you're not saying what the funds shall be used for. Please revise.

Also, in revising, please note that "any other purpose other than..." is redundant. Omit one "other".

In (d)(2), line 29, what is "program support"? Removed

In (d)(2), line 29, what are "program standards" and how are they developed? Removed

In (d)(2), line 30, what is "specialized training"? Defined

In (d)(2) line 30, what is "specialized equipment"? Defined As they're not defined in this Rule, please cross reference the Rule where they are defined.

Also, I think as edited the sentence in (d)(2) needs further editing – "NC Emergency Management (should be NCEM, too) shall support training, and equipment requirements within the confines of available funding." Originally, I asked what "program support" meant, and you just deleted "program". I still don't know what support means. It appears to me that you mean that NCEM is going to pay for training and equipment to the extent that NCEM has the funds to do so. But I can't say that for sure.

Also on line 36, what is a "self-supported resource"?

In (d)(5), line 2, I thought a specialty rescue team was supposed to be "self-supported"? How can it be self-supported but have agreements with other agencies for support? Please clarify and revise. Self supported when they deploy, but can be made up of several agencies to make a single team.

I think you need to revise (d)(4) and (5) to make it clear what you mean by "support" and "self-sufficient." As currently written, (d)(4) says that a specialty rescue team shall demonstrate their ability to provide a self sufficient team... The team is providing a team? This does not make sense. Then (d)(5) says that the agency that sponsors the team shall have agreements for... support in maintaining the team that supposedly should not need support. I understand that the team should be able to deploy and stay in the field without support, but that does not come through in this Rule.

Also, in (a)(1), how are "bidding entities... submitted"? Please revise.

This really hasn't been addressed. If you read the sentence from (a) through the beginning of (1) as intended, it reads: "Bidding agency shall be submitted via courier, United States Mail, or hand delivered by an authorized representative...." I think you need to amend (a)(1) to say something along the lines of "submit their bids via courier..." so the whole thing reads "Bidding agenc<u>ies</u> shall <u>submit their bids</u> via courier, United States Mail, or <u>via hand delivery</u> by an authorized...."

In (b), what criteria found within 2 CFR Part 200 shall be used in the evaluation? Please specify. This is the Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants and Agreements. I simplified the language for federal dollars as this would govern from procurement to close out of the grant. If by "federal...procurement rules" you mean 2 CFR Part 200, you still need to incorporate those rules by reference. Also, I think you need to incorporate the state rules by reference as well. Local rules would vary by locality, so it wouldn't be possible to incorporate them, but if you're applying state and federal rules here, you need to incorporate them.

In (a)(2), lines 8-9, is it within the authority delegated to the agency by the General Assembly to determine whether personnel is or is not an agent of the State as a matter of law? Yes. See GS 166A-19.60(e) (e) Definition of Emergency Management Worker. - As used in this section, the term "emergency management worker" shall include any full or part-time paid, volunteer, or auxiliary employee of this State or other states, territories, possessions, or the District of Columbia, of the federal government or any neighboring country or of any political subdivision thereof, or of any agency or organization performing emergency management services at any place in this State, subject to the order or control of or pursuant to a request of the State government or any political subdivision thereof. The term "emergency management worker" under this section shall also include any health care worker performing health care services as a member of a hospital-based or county-based State Medical Assistance Team designated by the North Carolina Office of Emergency Medical Services and any person performing emergency health care services under G.S. 90-12.2.

I read 166A-19.60 to determine who is an emergency management worker, and who is entitled to immunity, rather than who is or is not a state agent. The question is whether there is a statute that allows DPS, through rulemaking, to establish who is a state agent and who is not.

In Item (a)(5)(B), 12 NCAC 09B .0111(1) is an incorrect reference. The Criminal Justice Education and Training Standards Commission recently revised several of their rules, so please revisit and correct the reference.

Thanks for making changes. I have questions about the changes to (a)(5). First, on line 18, how are you determining whether someone has "committed" one of the enumerated acts, if they have not been convicted of the same?

Second, on line 26, "misdemeanor" should be plural.

Third, I think you're adding a new requirement here, that was not in the published text. The original language did not include the "four or more crimes" clause that you've added. Adding this after publication is, in my view, a substantial change under G.S. 150B-21.2(g) in that it creates an effect not contemplated by the published text and/or affects a group of people who would not have known their interests would be affected by the published text (i.e. people who have 4 or more misdemeanor convictions). Was this somewhere in the published text that I missed?

In (c), (e), and (f), where are the "Type I" and "Type II" teams outlined or created? You didn't address this. Please answer and revise the rule as necessary.

And what is the federal "Equivalent Course". A course that has the same or similar curriculum I see you added a link to the FEMA Structural Collapse Specialist Course, and I think this is good, except for one problem. I followed the link and couldn't find the course. Can you add a more specific link?

In the subparagraphs (e)(1) through (3), how is "training that meets or exceeds training requirements" *met*? It is done by the NC SAR Team Advisory Committee. What is done? What does the TAC do?

In (f)(1)(K), line 6, I noticed "harness" should be plural. Please check this entire rule for number agreement, as it was an issue throughout, and while I've tried to call out all issues for you, I may have missed one or two.

On p. 6, line 34, fix the alignment on (3), as it's been tabbed over too far to the right.

In (i) and (k)(2)(I), what is in the "set" of rain gear, and, in (i)(2)(L), the "fire starting kit". Looks good, thanks for making the edit. In (i)(2)(I) and (j)(2)(H), can you please say "a" jacket and "a" pair of pants? Just to get the numbers right.

In (j)(1), I think it might read better if you broke this into two sentences. For instance: "A mountain rescue team shall maintain a roster of no less than eight personnel who have completed the NC Mountain Rescue Operations Course. <u>Of those eight, two personnel</u> shall have <u>also completed the NC Mountain Rescue</u> Technician Level Course."

On p. 9, line 20, fix the alignment on (3), as it's been tabbed over too far to the right.

In (j)(2)(K), line 16, you don't need to incorporate the FEMA ICS 214 form by reference again, since you already did it earlier in the Rule.

<u>.0410</u>

In (b) and the items under it, the text could use a rewrite for clarity. For instance, (b) is in the passive tense and could be simplified. Similarly, (b)(1) and (2) are more verbose than necessary. Please revise and simplify.

I think (b) is still in the passive tense. Consider (if this is correct): "Within 30 days of the audit, NCEM personnel shall complete, file, and email to the Sponsoring Agency an audit report documenting the audit team's findings."

While (b)(1) is better, I think (b)(2) is still unclear, and references the disciplinary committee that has been deleted in paragraph (c).

Thanks for the hard work on this. Please response to these further requests as soon as possible, <u>but no later than</u> <u>Friday, March 10.</u> If you have questions about any of these, I'd be happy to discuss.

Will,

I have gotten through several of the new rules you sent me, and so far, everything looks pretty good, with one exception in Rule .0409.

As of now, I will recommend approval of .0401, .0402, .0403, .0406, .0407, .0408, and .0410. Approval of .0406 and .0407 is contingent on making the changes below, which are minor, and shouldn't be an issue.

.0404

I think you should use the formal title of the NIMS document you're incorporating by reference.

I looked at the link, and it's 133 pages. My only concern is if there is anything in this guide that you're requiring, but would exceed your statutory authority. Can you confirm that?

On line 16, delete "the" before "Chapter 132".[Polk, Will] NIMS is set of principles and policies and not a law but more operational principles that at the foundations of EM that federal, state, local, and tribal agencies follow. Everything within the NIMS document is the fundamental basis for emergency management operations and those principles are baked in the Chapter 166A of the General Statutes and specifically Article 6 and more on point with Rule .0404, GS 166A-66 and does not exceed our authority.

Rule .0404 is consistent with the NIMS document and we are not requiring SAR system resources to follow anything that we are not already following under our own statutory authority.

.0405

I have similar questions about .the FEMA policy guide incorporated by reference in (g). It's 277 pages. Is there anything in here that would exceed your statutory authority?**[Polk, Will]** The Public Assistance Policy Guide (PAPPA-G) sets the policy that FEMA will reimburse eligible costs to applicants when engaged in disaster response/recovery. Our state laws and this rule are consistent with the section 406 of Stafford Act, the corresponding regulations for Public Assistance (reimbursements to governments not individuals) in 44 CFR, and 2 CFR Part 200, subparts E and F, and Appendix II which the PAPPA-G is based off. The elements in .0405 are consistent with what would be eligible under federal reimbursement if the SAR systems resources are deployed to assist in a federally declared disaster to respond to an event.

.0406

I'm recommending approval, but please fix the tabbing in (b).[Polk, Will] Done

.0407

I'm recommending approval, but please in (c)(3), line 36, delete "the" prior to "criteria". [Polk, Will] Done.

Now that you made clear to me what the difference is between Contract Response Teams and Specialty Response Teams, in terms of agreements, funding, and provision of equipment, I think the existing language is fine. My previous questions/concerns didn't take into consideration that the agency was treating these different kind of teams differently. *[Polk, Will] Acknowledged.*

.0409

In (a)(5), line 19, the addition of "by not having been convicted by a local, state, federal, or military court of:" makes many of the subparagraphs below ungrammatical. For instance, in (C), it reads "not having by not having been convicted by a local, state, federal, or military court of: . . . not having been convicted of an offense..." Similarly, in (D), you get "by not having been convicted by a local, state, federal, or military court of: . . . being truthful in providing information..." I think you probably can omit the addition, restore "not having been convicted of" to (A), and be fine.**[Polk, Will]**

In (a)(5)(B), lines 23-24, did you mean to delete "for five years or the completion of any corrections supervision imposed by the courts, whichever is later"? It's hanging out there after a period (which should also be deleted, FYI), and was language I had already flagged as unclear. **[Polk, Will]** Updated and restored in text.

Also in (a)(5)(B), line 21, are you sure about this reference? 12 NCAC 09B .0111(3) doesn't define misdemeanor, it just says an officer shall not have been convicted of a Class B misdemeanor. The definition of "misdemeanor" is in 12B NCAC 09A .0103(24).[Polk, Will] Fixed, will submit the final draft after we discuss the USAR and Swiftwater team.

I have an issue with what you've done with the USAR and Swiftwater teams, in (c)(1) and (e)(1). It looks like you added incorporations by reference to a FEMA tool which defines the amount of personnel and equipment for each kind of Type I, II, and III team. However, those definitions don't line up with what's in your rule. For instance, in (e)(1), you have minimum personnel of 32, 24, and 16 for a type I, II, and III team, respectively, while the FEMA doc says 16, 12, and 6, respectively. There may be other inconsistencies, but one is enough to make this unclear and ambiguous. Moreover, by locating the incorporation in the Type I definition for USAR and Swiftwater and none other, its not clear it applies to all the other teams. Also, to the extent that these FEMA documents are changing the requirements that you published, I think you're making a substantial change to your rules. *[Polk, Will] We can discuss on Monday.*

If you'd like to discuss again on Monday, I'd be more than happy to have another call with you, if you think that would help.

Hi Will,

I've reviewed the responses to my requests for changes. Clearly, y'all have put a lot of work in here, and I appreciate that. I have several follow ups, however.

First, with respect to formatting. When you make post-publication changes to full adoptions, as you have here, the correct way to format changes is to take the whole rule out of underline, and then only underline and strike through the changes. You also amend the introductory statement to say – using Rule .0401 as an example – "14B NCAC 03 .0401 is adopted as published in 37:04 NCR 320-21 <u>with changes</u> as follows:" See the website at the link below for rule formatting examples. You want to look under Rule Format Examples for Publication in the NC Administrative Code, and then Permanent Adoption with changes from publication. <u>Rule Format Examples | NC OAH</u>

Second, please see below for individual follow ups about each rule.

All Rules

Ensure compliance with defined words, primarily those found in 14B NCAC 03.0401. In many rules, you depart from the form of the term used in your definitions rule, either using a different term or different abbreviation. As an example, see "North Carolina Search and Rescue System" and reference being made to the "NC Search and Rescue Program" in 14B NCAC 03.0410. If a phrase, entity, person, or other word is defined or abbreviated, that definition or abbreviation must be used later, depending upon the definition or abbreviation's applicability.

I've seen several examples where this has not been corrected. Please correct throughout. A prominent example I've noticed is "Sponsoring Agency" isn't capitalized although you capitalize it in R. 0402 in the definition. I'm assuming you *want* it capitalized because of how you styled it in the definition. If not, that's fine. Just be consistent.

Please capitalize "state" when referring only to the State of North Carolina.

I don't think this was corrected anywhere within these Rules. Please correct throughout. I know it seems petty but under our style guide and under the Bluebook, references to "State" mean the State of North Carolina, while references to "state" mean any state level government. So it is a distinction with a difference. The easiest way is to hit Ctrl+G, make sure Word is checking for capitalization in the options, and then search for "state", and make corrections as necessary.
In (1), what does "has the potential to impact the State" mean? Who makes this determination? That is done by the Governor or delegated to the Division of Emergency management. Thanks for clarifying. That said, the rule itself is still unclear. Please amend the Rule to reflect this info.

In (3), you are again using the term defined—"contract response team"—in the definition. The definition here, when boiled down, basically says a contract response team is a contract response team with self sustaining logistical support that can respond to disasters. The only unique term here is "self sustaining logistical support" which is undefined. Please revise. Done. I don't see a change in the Rule. Please revise the Rule.

In (7), line 23, you state that an ICS is "standardized." Are these FEMA standards? (See above). Also, what is a "standardized[,] on-scene emergency management construct"? What is a "construct" in this usage? Updated.

I see the reference to FEMA ICS is deleted in R. 0404, and that you've deleted the examples portion of the definition, but the point of the questions about this definition was to impress that the definition is vague and doesn't really say what an ICS is. Again, what is an "emergency management construct"? To what standards is it being built?

Similarly to above requests, in (11), does "resources" or "Resource" mean something beyond "System Resources" in (28)? No. It is the system resources. Why not say so in the Rule then?

Also in (11), why is the item number deleted? I think you also need to re-number everything following (11) as well.

In (12), what is the "North Carolina Search and Rescue **System**"? G.S. 166A-66 establishes the "North Carolina Search and Rescue Program" in Article 6. Is this a mistake or oversight? Correct the abbreviation and all references in later rules.

The program is organized into 5 programs. Defined the system as The Program to make it less confusing when talking about the USAR program, Swiftwater program, etc. vs. the entirely of The Program. We are working update GS 166A, but felt this was the easier solution to be clear for now. So, if I understand you correctly, you're using a Rule to essentially rename the Search and Rescue Program from Program--which is the name the statute gives it—to System? If that's true, then why do you continue to use "Program" in the definitions to follow?

In (14), line 15, who determines whether an emergency "could occur"? What is the standard for whether an emergency "could occur". The Governor or the Secretary of DPS or Director of the Division as delegated by the Governor to recommend a declaration of emergency as defined in the NC Emergency Management Act.

Thanks for clarifying. That said, the rule itself is still unclear. Please amend the Rule to reflect this info.

Why did you add a new definition for "Resource Typing" at (21) that is identical to the one for "NC Resource Typing" at (11)? Did you mean to delete (11) altogether?

In new (23), which is "Sensitive information", on line 19, please change "a activation" to "an activation."

In (28), p. 4, line 1, you forgot to delete the original formulation of "State Mission Assignment."

In (28), line 2, did you mean to delete both NCEM and North Carolina Division of Emergency Management? If so, then who approves the request?

It looks like you deleted (d), and made former (e) into new (d). Please format this correctly (see above for the strikethrough/underline guidance) by showing that it used to be (e) with a strikethrough.

Since you're deleting "State Mission Assignment" in former (d)(2), do you still need the definition in Rule .0402?

In (e), line 28, where is the statutory authority for the LEMC to delegate his or her authority? It looks like the LEMC position is created by statute in G.S. 166A-19.15(b), and I don't see where that provision allows the LEMC to delegate authority. Not saying it isn't there, but I don't see it. Please specify. Deleted.

No, it was not deleted. The Rule still states that the LEMC "or their designee shall have the authority to request system resources." Please correct.

In (1), line 5-6, please state with specificity which FEMA ICS and NIMS standards you are incorporating by reference. Please note that G.S. 150B-21.6 requires you to state where these resources can be obtained and at what cost. Please revise.

You did not address this request at all. Please revise the rule with the appropriate, specific incorporation.

In (2), line 7, what "personnel" must a resource follow? For instance, would the NCEM spokesman be able to direct the activities of a search and rescue team? Please revise for clarity. I think you meant "pursuant" rather than "pursuit" on line 9. Please revise.

In (4), you still are incorporating Ch. 132 by reference. Since Ch. 132 applies to DPS as it would any other State agency, it's not necessary to incorporate. Incorporations are more when you're adopting a rule, regulation, or document that doesn't already apply to your agency on its own terms.

In (b), what is "an on-duty status as an emergency management worker"? The referenced statute, G.S. 166A-19.60, defines "emergency management worker", but does not address "on-duty." Please clarify and revise. Done

I'm not sure that the revision added clarity here. As amended, it now says that "System Personnel shall be in work as an emergency management worker as defined in G.S. 166A-19.60(e)." Not sure that "in work" is any clearer than "on duty". What exactly are you requiring? That System Personnel also be "emergency management workers"? If so, I think you need to say what that means functionally – what does a member of a contract response team or a specialty response team have to do to be an emergency management worker?

In (d), line 14, what does it mean to "maintain all team training"? Changing "team" to "system personnel" really doesn't answer the question, which is what training are you requiring?

In (g), line 17, what "documentation" is required? Receipts and expenditure reports. Why not say so in the Rule then?

In (g), lines 18-19, where can this Guide be found and at what cost? You did not address this request at all. Please revise the rule with the appropriate, specific incorporation.

.0407

All references to "NCEM" and "NC SAR System" should be double checked to make sure they comply with any changes made to 14B NCAC 03 .0402. Also, ensure the abbreviations are used. I've noticed issues with this throughout these rules, but here, specifically, I saw you've got NCEM and "NC Emergency Management" in the same paragraph, (b)(1). Also, in (b)(1), line 19, what is a "memorandum of agreement"? Is this a contract? Yes and we simplified it.

I don't see a change to the Rule.

In (C), what are "members"? This has not been used before. Is this similar to "personnel"? I know I didn't explicitly call it out, but "members" is also used in (b)(1) and (2). Same question here.

With respect to (c)(2), I'm a little confused by the addition made here. Who is submitting the bid package? The agency? Or does this refer to the distribution of the bid package as referenced in (c), line 27? I think the issue is that (c)(2) is in the passive tense, so this could be fixed by re-rewriting in the active tense.

In (c)(4), line 33, what are the "agreed upon criteria"? How is this established or what statute or rule is this determination made pursuant to? Who agrees upon this criteria? What informs the regulated public of this review process? Updated.

Thanks for making the change. Suggest simplifying to: "This committee will open all completed sealed bid packages and evaluate them based on an agreed upon <u>the</u> criteria as outlined in Rule .0408 of this Section..."

Additionally, in (c)(6), lines 1-2, avoid a comma splice and rewrite the subparagraph as "... notified and system agreements shall be drafted and executed..."

Further, what are "system agreements"?

Thanks for making changes here. I just noticed that you omitted "system" and it's not showing anymore. Sorry to be picky here, but when you reformat, make sure you're showing all deletions and all additions.

In (c)(7), line 3, the rule states the agreement has to be with the "sponsoring agency". I thought these agreements were between the NCEM and the contract response team. Please clarify. The sponsoring agency is the lead agency for a contract response team if they are multi agency teams.

In (c)(7)(A), lines 5-6, the rule states that the agreement is with the "sponsoring agency", but then states that the agreement will outline the terms that the "resource" must follow. Aren't these two different entities? How can the sponsoring agency make an agreement to bind the resource? I'm not sure the changes answer my question. I'm still not clear how the sponsoring agency can enter an agreement with NCEM to bind a third party who isn't a party to the agreement, unless the "resources" or "team" is somehow subordinate to the sponsoring agency. Perhaps providing a real world example (here, not in the Rule) might clear this up for me? What happens if there is no sponsoring agency?

In (c)(7)(A), line 9, is the "contract period" referenced the contract between NCEM and the contract response team? Or is it the period of the two agreements mentioned in line 3? Please clarify. Clarified. Where did the "four-year contract period with an optional one-year extension" come from? If this is a post-publication addition to the Rule that is defining the length of the contract, where it wasn't previously defined in statute or Rule, I'd say this is a substantial change, in that it creates an effect that couldn't have been expected based on the published language.

Also, it's not clear—is the contract for 4 years and a 1 year extension, or the agreement, or both?

In (c)(7)(C), line 14, how is "search and rescue capability" defined? You're telling your regulated public they can only use the money for one purpose but don't define that purpose. Please revise. Changing from "any other purpose other than maintaining or building search and rescue capability" to "any other purpose other than for the purposes of this program" doesn't really address the issue, which is you're not saying what the funds shall be used for. Please revise.

Also, in revising, please note that "any other purpose other than..." is redundant. Omit one "other".

In (d)(2), line 29, what is "program support"? Removed

In (d)(2), line 29, what are "program standards" and how are they developed? Removed

In (d)(2), line 30, what is "specialized training"? Defined

In (d)(2) line 30, what is "specialized equipment"? Defined

As they're not defined in this Rule, please cross reference the Rule where they are defined.

Also, I think as edited the sentence in (d)(2) needs further editing – "NC Emergency Management (should be NCEM, too) shall support training, and equipment requirements within the confines of available funding." Originally, I asked what "program support" meant, and you just deleted "program". I still don't know what support means. It appears to me that you mean that NCEM is going to pay for training and equipment to the extent that NCEM has the funds to do so. But I can't say that for sure.

Also on line 36, what is a "self-supported resource"?

In (d)(5), line 2, I thought a specialty rescue team was supposed to be "self-supported"? How can it be self-supported but have agreements with other agencies for support? Please clarify and revise. Self supported when they deploy, but can be made up of several agencies to make a single team.

I think you need to revise (d)(4) and (5) to make it clear what you mean by "support" and "self-sufficient." As currently written, (d)(4) says that a specialty rescue team shall demonstrate their ability to provide a self sufficient team... The team is providing a team? This does not make sense. Then (d)(5) says that the agency that sponsors the team shall have agreements for... support in maintaining the team that supposedly should not need support. I understand that the team should be able to deploy and stay in the field without support, but that does not come through in this Rule.

Also, in (a)(1), how are "bidding entities... submitted"? Please revise.

This really hasn't been addressed. If you read the sentence from (a) through the beginning of (1) as intended, it reads: "Bidding agency shall be submitted via courier, United States Mail, or hand delivered by an authorized representative...." I think you need to amend (a)(1) to say something along the lines of "submit their bids via courier..." so the whole thing reads "Bidding agenc<u>ies</u> shall <u>submit their bids</u> via courier, United States Mail, or <u>via hand delivery</u> by an authorized...."

In (b), what criteria found within 2 CFR Part 200 shall be used in the evaluation? Please specify. This is the Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants and Agreements. I simplified the language for federal dollars as this would govern from procurement to close out of the grant. If by "federal...procurement rules" you mean 2 CFR Part 200, you still need to incorporate those rules by reference. Also, I think you need to incorporate the state rules by reference as well. Local rules would vary by locality, so it wouldn't be possible to incorporate them, but if you're applying state and federal rules here, you need to incorporate them.

In (a)(2), lines 8-9, is it within the authority delegated to the agency by the General Assembly to determine whether personnel is or is not an agent of the State as a matter of law? Yes. See GS 166A-19.60(e) (e) Definition of Emergency Management Worker. - As used in this section, the term "emergency management worker" shall include any full or part-time paid, volunteer, or auxiliary employee of this State or other states, territories, possessions, or the District of Columbia, of the federal government or any neighboring country or of any political subdivision thereof, or of any agency or organization performing emergency management services at any place in this State, subject to the order or control of or pursuant to a request of the State government or any political

<u>subdivision thereof.</u> The term "emergency management worker" under this section shall also include any health care worker performing health care services as a member of a hospital-based or countybased State Medical Assistance Team designated by the North Carolina Office of Emergency Medical Services and any person performing emergency health care services under G.S. 90-12.2.

I read 166A-19.60 to determine who is an emergency management worker, and who is entitled to immunity, rather than who is or is not a state agent. The question is whether there is a statute that allows DPS, through rulemaking, to establish who is a state agent and who is not.

In Item (a)(5)(B), 12 NCAC 09B .0111(1) is an incorrect reference. The Criminal Justice Education and Training Standards Commission recently revised several of their rules, so please revisit and correct the reference.

Thanks for making changes. I have questions about the changes to (a)(5). First, on line 18, how are you determining whether someone has "committed" one of the enumerated acts, if they have not been convicted of the same?

Second, on line 26, "misdemeanor" should be plural.

Third, I think you're adding a new requirement here, that was not in the published text. The original language did not include the "four or more crimes" clause that you've added. Adding this after publication is, in my view, a substantial change under G.S. 150B-21.2(g) in that it creates an effect not contemplated by the published text and/or affects a group of people who would not have known their interests would be affected by the published text (i.e. people who have 4 or more misdemeanor convictions). Was this somewhere in the published text that I missed?

In (c), (e), and (f), where are the "Type I" and "Type II" teams outlined or created? You didn't address this. Please answer and revise the rule as necessary.

And what is the federal "Equivalent Course". A course that has the same or similar curriculum I see you added a link to the FEMA Structural Collapse Specialist Course, and I think this is good, except for one problem. I followed the link and couldn't find the course. Can you add a more specific link?

In the subparagraphs (e)(1) through (3), how is "training that meets or exceeds training requirements" *met*? It is done by the NC SAR Team Advisory Committee. What is done? What does the TAC do?

In (f)(1)(K), line 6, I noticed "harness" should be plural. Please check this entire rule for number agreement, as it was an issue throughout, and while I've tried to call out all issues for you, I may have missed one or two.

On p. 6, line 34, fix the alignment on (3), as it's been tabbed over too far to the right.

In (i) and (k)(2)(I), what is in the "set" of rain gear, and, in (i)(2)(L), the "fire starting kit". Looks good, thanks for making the edit. In (i)(2)(I) and (j)(2)(H), can you please say "a" jacket and "a" pair of pants? Just to get the numbers right.

In (j)(1), I think it might read better if you broke this into two sentences. For instance: "A mountain rescue team shall maintain a roster of no less than eight personnel who have completed the NC Mountain Rescue Operations Course. <u>Of those eight, two personnel</u> shall have <u>also</u> completed the NC Mountain Rescue Technician Level Course."

On p. 9, line 20, fix the alignment on (3), as it's been tabbed over too far to the right.

In (j)(2)(K), line 16, you don't need to incorporate the FEMA ICS 214 form by reference again, since you already did it earlier in the Rule.

.0410

In (b) and the items under it, the text could use a rewrite for clarity. For instance, (b) is in the passive tense and could be simplified. Similarly, (b)(1) and (2) are more verbose than necessary. Please revise and simplify.

I think (b) is still in the passive tense. Consider (if this is correct): "Within 30 days of the audit, NCEM personnel shall complete, file, and email to the Sponsoring Agency an audit report documenting the audit team's findings."

While (b)(1) is better, I think (b)(2) is still unclear, and references the disciplinary committee that has been deleted in paragraph (c).

Thanks for the hard work on this. Please response to these further requests as soon as possible, <u>but no later than</u> <u>Friday, March 10.</u> If you have questions about any of these, I'd be happy to discuss.

If a phrase, entity, person, or other word is defined or abbreviated, that definition or abbreviation must be used later, depending upon the definition or abbreviation's applicability.

All uses of "NC" or any other shortened phrase without an appropriate abbreviation being stated beforehand should be spelled out in its entirety on the first use. For example, 14B NCAC 03 .0402 (10) and (11) and 14B NCAC 03 .0404 "FEMA ICS and NIMS".

Please capitalize "state" when referring only to the State of North Carolina.

Change all instances of "must" to "shall."

Please change your effective dates, as February 1, 2023 is the earliest possible effective date for these rules.

Throughout these Rules, I believe you've incorrectly applied G.S. 150B-21.6. You do not need to incorporate other rules or statutes by reference. However, you do need to incorporate by reference federal laws or regulations, the FEMA documents referenced in some of your rules, and other sources of information that you're attempting to enforce through these rules. Please revisit your incorporations and any other location where you're referencing outside material and revise accordingly. In general, is this Rule necessary? We generally discourage the use of purpose or scope rules. Yes, As to the necessity question, I think it is very important this we define the scope of the rules as there are many folks who work in search and rescue in NC outside of our program and it is important for them to understand that these rules only apply to participants of the program.

In (a), line 7, I believe "Department of Public Safety" should be possessive: "...the North Carolina Department of Public Safety's Division of Emergency Management...."

In (b), what "other participants" are being referenced? Is this defined? Does this encompass all involved entities, such as "Contract Response Teams" or "Participating Agencies", or perhaps all persons or entities made parties pursuant to G.S. 166A-66(a)(9)?

In (b), line 9, is it necessary to say "North Carolina Division of Emergency Management"? Earlier you say the "North Carolina Department of Public Safety Division of Emergency Management."

In reviewing this Rule, the staff recommends the following changes be made:

All definitions should be formatted as "(Definition)" means (explanation). Please change all definitions to mirror the format for clarity.

Also, (3), (8), and (22) are terms defined in G.S. 166-65. To the extent that the definitions in the Rule differ from the statutory definitions, please explain whether you are expanding or narrowing the definition. It is the same as defined in the statute.

On line 4, I believe you meant to say "As used in this <u>Section</u>...."

In (1), what are "resources" and how do they "provide all applicable capability..."? "Resources" here seems to reference persons, while Article 1A, Part 2, Article 4, and Article 6 do not define "resources" but do use it in the context of things, rather than persons. Is this a reference to "System Resources" in item (28)? Yes.

In (1), "threats" in line 6 should be singular.

In (1), what does "has the potential to impact the State" mean? Who makes this determination? That is done by the Governor or delegated to the Division of Emergency management.

In (2), you are using the term defined—"authority"—in the definition. Please rephrase.

In (2), what is "response authority"? Resolved.

In (3), you do not need to incorporate the statute by reference here. Simply referencing it will suffice (i.e. delete everything between "which is adopted" and "pursuant to G.S. 150B-21.6").

In (3), you are again using the term defined—"contract response team"—in the definition. The definition here, when boiled down, basically says a contract response team is a contract response team with self sustaining logistical support that can

respond to disasters. The only unique term here is "self sustaining logistical support" which is undefined. Please revise. Done.

The definition in (4) needs more specificity. Similarly to (1), what "resource" is being "shared"? Also, what is the "NC Statewide Mutual Aid Agreement"? Consider incorporating by reference. The statewide mutual aid agreement is a document the Division maintains pursuant to NCGS 166A-19.72.

In (5), line 19, who determines when the disaster "overwhelms" the resources of local and State authorities? This is determined by Emergency Management at the State and local level.

The definition of (7) has large portions which say how the ICS is used and give examples of an ICS, rather than actually saying what the ICS is. Please revise. Updated.

With respect to (7), in Rule .0404(1), you refer to "FEMA ICS", rather than just "ICS". Is this the same thing? Is ICS defined somewhere in FEMA's regulations? If so, I think an incorporation by reference here might be necessary. Updated.

In (7), line 23, you state that an ICS is "standardized." Are these FEMA standards? (See above). Also, what is a "standardized[,] on-scene emergency management construct"? What is a "construct" in this usage? Updated.

In (8), the definition of "Incident Support Team" is already done by statute, which is not referenced here. Please reference the statute. We took it out.

In (8), line 32, the phrase "...assist local and <u>S</u>tate emergency management in management..." is redundant. Please revise.

In (9), what is a "County Emergency Management Coordinator"? Is this pursuant to G.S. 166A-19.15 or another statute? Yes, have added it into the document.

In (9), line 36, when you say "specific geographic area" do you mean "county"? Yes.

In (10), lines 1-2, is "The North Carolina Emergency Management program" the same as the "State Emergency Management Program" established in G.S. 166A-19.10? Also, ensure this complies with (14)'s requests. Yes.

In (10), line 3, what are "incident management requirements"? Revised, "to incident management" to simplify it down to what it is.

Similarly to above requests, in (11), does "resources" or "Resource" mean something beyond "System Resources" in (28)? No. It is the system resources.

Also, in (11), line 5, what "resource typing definitions" are being referenced? What "definitions"? Consider revising the definition to include the second sentence's purpose

within the definition itself and avoid non-definitional substance. Deleted second sentence.

In (11), line 6, I believe "defines" should be singular.

In (12), what is the "North Carolina Search and Rescue **System**"? G.S. 166A-66 establishes the "North Carolina Search and Rescue Program" in Article 6. Is this a mistake or oversight? Correct the abbreviation and all references in later rules Also, the definition in (12) appears to include two mistakes: (1) the Committee is tasked to advise the Secretary, based on G.S. 166A-69(d) and does not mention the Division of Emergency Management; and (2) the "search and rescue system" should be the "North Carolina Search and Rescue Program", which needs to be accurately stated and as a proper noun. The program is organized into 5 programs. Defined the system as The Program to make it less confusing when talking about the USAR program, Swiftwater program, etc. vs. the entirely of The Program. We are working update GS 166A, but felt this was the easier solution to be clear for now.

Similarly, in (13), what is the "North Carolina Search and Rescue Technical Advisory Committee"? G.S. 166A-69 establishes the "North Carolina Search and Rescue Team Advisory Committee" in Article 6. Is this a mistake or oversight? Correct the abbreviation and all references in later rules.

In (14), what is the "North Carolina Emergency Management"? Does the agency mean the "Division of Emergency Management" as is found in G.S. 166A-19.3(4) and as is referenced in item (27) of this Rule? The proper name, especially when established by statute, should be used. Corrected.

In (14), line 15, who determines whether an emergency "could occur"? What is the standard for whether an emergency "could occur". The Governor or the Secretary of DPS or Director of the Division as delegated by the Governor to recommend a declaration of emergency as defined in the NC Emergency Management Act.

In (15), is the "Assistant Director" different from the "Deputy Director" as is found in G.S. 166A-69? Why is different terminology used? Yes, the Division has been reorganized and the Deputy Director no longer exists and the Assistant Director for operations oversees the program.

In (17), what are the "principles" and how do they "guid[e] government agencies"? The NIMS is federal policy document that establishes guidelines for emergency management response in the country.

In (17), line 20, "provides" should be singular.

In (18), line 25, is it necessary to say "paid or unpaid"?

In (18), line 25, what are the parameters of acting as an "agent of" a sponsoring or participating agency? The person engaged in the search and rescue is either an employee, volunteer of the agency.

In (18), line 26, I believe you need to add "of" between "or" and "the".

Also, ensure the correct abbreviations are used for the Division and Program, and the Sponsoring Agency and Participating Agency are used as they are defined in this Rule.

In (20), who makes the determination whether someone caused an event?

In (20), the sentence ends without an object. "The entity whose actions... caused an event requiring search and rescue resources" ... to do what?

Also, rewrite "search and rescue system resources" to be more specific. Presumably, the Department is referencing both the "North Carolina Search and Rescue Program" and "System Resources" which are defined in this Rule and should be used as such.

In (21), does Chapter 132 (Public Records Act) come into play here? Yes. Any document created in done so in transaction of state business.

In (21), line 32, it is not necessary to state "but not limited to" after using "include" or "including".

In (21), line 33, insert a comma after "recordings" and consider "obtained" rather than "gained" to more accurately reflect receipt of the information.

Also, in (21), line 33, is "search and rescue operation" defined? Deleted.

In (21), line 34, the "authority having jurisdiction" was previously abbreviated. Please use the abbreviation.

In (22), line 35, again you're using the term being defined—"**specialty** rescue team" in the definition. Please revise.

In (22), line 35, I believe "provided" should be "provide".

In (23), lines 1-2, what is an "active response agreement"? Struck through.

In (23) and in (24), ensure proper reference to the Search and Rescue System as abbreviated in (12).

In (24), lines 5-6, what is "North Carolina Emergency Management"? It is the Division of Emergency Management.

In (24), what kind of "assistance" does the Department mean? System Resources?

In (25), what type of "document" does the Department mean? Is there anything specifically required to satisfy it as a "document"? The document is the comprehensive plan and procedures for planning, preparing, responding, mitigating and preventing emergencies and disasters in the state. There is nothing that requires this document.

In (25), line 7, I think there is a verb missing between "document" and "under". Please revise.

In (25), line 9, what is "an established[,] comprehensive, all-hazards approach"? Is this an All-hazards Disaster Response Model as used in (1)?

In (26), ensure proper reference to (12) and (14).

In (27), lines 12 and 14, again you're using the term defined—"personnel"—in the definition for System Personnel.

In (28), similarly to (23), what is an "active response agreement"? Deleted

Also, in (28), ensure proper reference to (14).

In History Note: Authority, consider adding G.S. 166A-67 for contracting authority and G.S. 166A-69 for the Search and Rescue Team Advisory Committee.

In (a), line 5, "all-hazards response model" should be capitalized, assuming it is the same term used in 14B NCAC 03.0402(1).

In (a), lines 5-6, I do not understand the meaning of the sentence "System resources... missing person incidents." Please rephrase for clarity.

While I generally have no objections to relieving human suffering or protecting life, property, or the environment, it appears to me that the language of (a), lines 6-8 goes beyond the statutory boundaries of what a search and rescue team is intended to do. 166A-65(2a) defines a search and rescue team as one that "assist[s] in the removal of trapped victims during emergencies[.]" Is there statutory authority for search and rescue teams organized under Ch. 166A to go beyond this mission? Deleted

Additionally, in (a), line 8, the rule refers to an "actual or potential threat". How is this defined, and who determines what is and is not an actual or potential threat? Deleted.

I think the language of (b) is unclear. As I understand it, the NC SAR System is comprised of teams that may be under local control (i.e. a local fire department). Are you saying in (b) that if NCEM deploys a local resource, NCEM controls that resource

to the exclusion of the local government? I think this paragraph should be revised for clarity. Yes. If NCEM deploys the local resource they are under the NCEM banner. Does (c) conflict with (b)? The idea that a local resource may deploy under its own authority, and that participation in the NC SAR System does not limit or supersede that local authority seems to be at odds with the idea that NCEM will "maintain direction and control" of a resource that it deploys. I suggest revising to clarify when NCEM has control and when the local authority has control. Done.

In (d), line 13, who at "the State" is deploying System Resources? Please revise.

In (d)(1), line 16, what are "qualified resources"?

In (d)(1), line 18, what is a "team"? Is a "team" a "resource" or "System Resource"?

In (d)(1), line 21, what does "activating system resources" mean? If this is akin to deployment, I thought the AHJ made that decision under this model. Please clarify.

In (d)(2), line 23, remove the (s) in "barrier(s)" and choose either the singular or plural.

In (d)(2), line 24, what is "local . . . coordinated mutual aid"?

For both (d)(1) and (2), who chooses between these methods? Further, are there guidelines for choosing one over the other? It is unclear what the triggering event for each is. Only subparagraph (2) partly identifies a triggering event – "State of Emergency".

In (e), line 28, where is the statutory authority for the LEMC to delegate his or her authority? It looks like the LEMC position is created by statute in G.S. 166A-19.15(b), and I don't see where that provision allows the LEMC to delegate authority. Not saying it isn't there, but I don't see it. Please specify. Deleted.

In (e), line 30, use AHJ for "authority having jurisdiction."

I am confused by (2). This seems to contradict earlier statements in Rule .0403 that local authorities may deploy under their own authority and that participation in the NC SAR System does not supersede that authority. Please clarify and revise the rule.

In (2), line 7, what "personnel" must a resource follow? For instance, would the NCEM spokesman be able to direct the activities of a search and rescue team? Please revise for clarity.

In (3), line 8, "actives" should be "activitiesD".

What are you requiring in (5)? Does state and federal law not apply to a search and rescue team otherwise? Please consider removing or at the very least specifying what specific state and federal laws a team must follow.E

In your History Note, please remove the reference to the National Incident Management System, 3rd Edition, as I do not believe it confers authority on the DepartmentSo.

In (d), line 14, what does it mean to "maintain all team training"?

In (g), line 17, what "documentation" is required? Receipts and expenditure reports.

In (g), line 18, I believe you need "the" between "with" and "FEMA"

In (g), lines 18-19, where can this Guide be found and at what cost? Brian Liebman Commission Counsel Date submitted to agency: 1/5/23 In (g), line 20, what are the factors or criteria for determination of whether an extension may be granted? This is ambiguous and does not inform the regulated public of how determinations can be made. Moreover, G.S. 150B-19(6) requires that when an agency waives or modifies a requirement set in a rule, it must establish specific guidelines for doing so. Removed.

In (1), line 7, please delete or define "reasonable costs". While I understand this is a statutory term, a Rule cannot be ambiguous or unclear even if it is repeating a statutory term.

In (1), line 9, I believe the reference should be to G.S. 166<u>A</u>.

In (1), there's no need to incorporate the statute by reference. Simply referring to it is sufficient.

In lines 11 and 12, what is the effect of "of eligible costs"? I think this is just kind of misplaced in the sentence – suggest revision.

In (2), line 12, is the invoice to go out via Certified Mail, or the payment? Revised.

In (c)(6), line 1, who shall draft the agreements? NCEM

Additionally, in (c)(6), lines 1-2, avoid a comma splice and rewrite the subparagraph as "... notified and system agreements shall be drafted and executed..."

Further, what are "system agreements"?

In (c)(7), line 3, what "two agreements" shall be drafted, executed, and maintained?

In (c)(7), line 3, the rule states the agreement has to be with the "sponsoring agency". I thought these agreements were between the NCEM and the contract response team. Please clarify. The sponsoring agency is the lead agency for a contract response team if they are multi agency teams.

In (c)(7)(A), lines 5-6, the rule states that the agreement is with the "sponsoring agency", but then states that the agreement will outline the terms that the "resource" must follow. Aren't these two different entities? How can the sponsoring agency make an agreement to bind the resource?

In (c)(7)(A), line 6, what "conditions and activities" shall be included in the cooperative agreement? What are the requirements for this agreement? Updated the term to scope of work and clarified.

In (c)(7)(A), line 6, change "must" to "shall".

In (c)(7)(A), line 9, is the "contract period" referenced the contract between NCEM and the contract response team? Or is it the period of the two agreements mentioned in line 3? Please clarify. Clarified.

In (c)(7)(B), what are "program costs"? Program costs are the costs of equipment and personnel.

In (c)(7)(B), line 11, the funds are to be "utilized by the sponsoring and/or participating agencies" for what purpose? Please specify in the rule, or reorganize the paragraph for clarity.

Also, remove "and/or" and use either "and" or "or".

In (c)(7)(C), line 14, how is "search and rescue capability" defined? You're telling your regulated public they can only use the money for one purpose but don't define that purpose. Please revise.

In all instances of "system resources", "resources", "state mission", "specialty rescue team", and "system personnel", use the full, capitalized construction, unless another construction of the phrase is being used outside the defined term in 14B NCAC 03 .0402(25).

Throughout the Rule, you require a certain number of personnel, then go on to specify additional numbers of personnel who shall fulfill a particular role. For instance, in (e), you require a roster of 32 personnel, but then in (e)(1)(A)-(C), require that the team "additionally maintain" eight members who completed the Swiftwater Flood Rescue Boat Operator Course, two members who completed team leader courses, and two members who completed communications specialist courses. Does this mean those 12 members specified in (A)-(C) are meant to be part of the 32 referenced in (e)(1), or do they bring the total to 44? Please revise for clarity.

In (a)(2), the second sentence jumps between singular and plural usages. Use 'he or she" and "an agent", rather than "they" and "agents", respectively.

In (a)(2), lines 8-9, is it within the authority delegated to the agency by the General Assembly to determine whether personnel is or is not an agent of the State as a matter of law? Yes. See GS 166A-19.60(e) (e) Definition of Emergency Management Worker. - As used in this section, the term "emergency management worker" shall include any full or part-time paid, volunteer, or auxiliary employee of this State or other states, territories, possessions, or the District of Columbia, of the federal government or any neighboring country or of any political subdivision thereof, or of any agency or organization performing emergency management services at any place in this State, subject to the order or control of or pursuant to a request of the State government or any political subdivision thereof. The term "emergency management

worker" under this section shall also include any health care worker performing health care services as a member of a hospital-based or county-based State Medical Assistance Team designated by the North Carolina Office of Emergency Medical Services and any person performing emergency health care services under G.S. 90-12.2.

In (a)(4), it is unnecessary to incorporate the statute by reference. Merely referring to the statute is sufficient.

Restructure (a)(4) to clarify what you're referencing with the citation to G.S. 166A-19.60. As it currently reads, the citation to the statute suggests "program activity" is defined in the statute, while "emergency management worker" is defined instead. Consider "while participating in any program activity, personnel shall be considered emergency management workers as defined..."

In Item (a)(5)(B), 12 NCAC 09B .0111(1) is an incorrect reference. The Criminal Justice Education and Training Standards Commission recently revised several of their rules, so please revisit and correct the reference.

In (a)(5)(B), line 19, add a comma following "misdemeanor". Also, remove the period after "150B-21.6" and insert a comma.

In (a)(5)(B), lines 21-22, what is the period of time you're attempting to outline here? It says no misdemeanors for "five years or the completion of any corrections supervision imposed by the courts, whichever is later." I don't understand what this means. Please revise and clarify.

In (a)(5)(D), lines 28-29, I'm not sure what the reference "for the purpose of participating in the search and rescue system" (incidentally, should this be "NC SAR"?) means. Are you saying that being untruthful in some contexts is OK?

In (a)(5)(E), line 30, add a comma after "convicted."

In (a)(5)(E), line 31, capitalize "rule."

In (a)(5)(F), line 32, what kind of conduct are you referring to? This is very broad and impermissibly vague. Please revise and state with specificity what conduct is unsuitable for a NC SAR member.

In (a)(5)(F), line 33, where is "moral turpitude" defined? Without a definition, this is impermissibly vague.

In both (a)(6)(A) and (B), include a comma after "qualifying event".

In (a)(6)(A), where can the Manual be accessed? Can it be accessed for free? Also, in (B), it is unnecessary to incorporate the Manual again.

In (a)(6)(B), line 5, does the agency mean "convicted" when stating "found guilty"?

In (a)(6)(C), line 9, change "they" to "he or she has".

In (a)(6)(C), line 10, what is meant by "against the individual"?

In (a)(6)(D), capitalize "sponsoring agency" and use the abbreviation "NCEM".

Also, replace "person's" with "system personnel's".

In (a)(6)(D), lines 13-14, the agency shall notify the Division of "arrests or criminal charges and final dispositions" of whom?

In (a)(6)(E), remove all parentheticals and replace them with "pursuant to" each statute.

In (b)(1), line 20, who shall equipment "be made available for inspection and inventory"? By whom?

What does (b)(2) mean? What "requirement" is referenced? Please revise.

In (b)(3), line 23, I think you mean "manufacturer's recommendations".

Also, what do you mean by "damage to state property"? Do you mean the state-owned and issued equipment?

In (b)(4), place a comma after "upon separation".

In (b)(4), to whom or where must the property be returned?

In (c), (e), and (f), where are the "Type I" and "Type II" teams outlined or created?

Also, the NC USAR course should be stated in its entirety when first used.

And what is the federal "Equivalent Course". A course that has the same or similar curriculum

In (c)(3), insert an "a" before "qualified", or make "specialist" plural.

Also, what is a "typed urban search and rescue team"?

At the end of (d), (e), and (f), place a colon.

In (d)(1), line 1, what does "functionally equivalent" mean? Please define. When a practice, method, technique, procedure, design, material, or component performs the same function and provides the same or improved utility as is being required through the rule.

In (d)(1), lines 2-3, where is the Cache List found, and at what cost? Updated.

In (d)(2), line 6, define "state of readiness". Updated.

In (e)(1), state the full name of "NFPA", unless stated previously. Further, please state where these materials can be found and at what cost.

In the subparagraphs (e)(1) through (3), how is "training that meets or exceeds training requirements" met? It is done by the NC SAR Team Advisory Committee.

In (e)(2) and (3), it is not necessary to reincorporate the NFPA chapters, just a reference will suffice.

In (f)(1)(C), (2)(C), and (3)(C), do you mean one portable computer? Also, what is a "minimum" of cellular internet access?

In (f)(1)(D) (2)(D), and (3)(D), define or delete "suitable".

In (f)(1)(E), and (2)(E), "spotlight" should be plural.

In (f)(1)(F), (2)(F), and (3)(E), do you mean a map of the whole state, or the region the team is assigned to?

Also, in each provision, "hardcopy" should be separate words and made plural.

In (f)(1)(H), (2)(H), and (3)(G), insert an Oxford comma after "sledgehammer".

In (f)(1)(H), (K), and (L), are the "kit[s]" fully described here? If not, what else is required? Yes. It is the full list.

In (f)(1)(J), (2)(J), and (3)(I) are the boats and motors separate requirements? It would seem as though the agency is trying to require 4 boats and 6 motors, but a reading of the text "with not less than six outboard motors" could be interpreted as each boat must have six motors.

In (f)(1)(L), (2)(L), and (3)(K), remove the first comma and add a comma after "bleach solution,".

In (f)(1)(L), (2)(L), and (3)(K), how many sprayers, buckets, work boxes, and pumps are required?

In (f)(1)(L), (2)(L), and (3)(K), what kind of solutions are you requiring? What soap? What concentration of each?

In (f)(1)(N), "raft" should be plural.

In (f)(1)(O), (2)(O), and (3)(N), please define what a "clamshell kit" is, and revise the "kit per kit" language.

In (f)(1)(Q), (2)(Q), and (3)(P), how is the 30-minute setup requirement determined? Is it an objective or subjective standard? Also, "setup" should be two wordsD.

Also, in (1)(Q), (2)(Q), and (3)(P), separate the shelter system from the sleeping kits, unless the shelter system is required to have 16 sleeping kits internally within it. This is worded poorly and causes ambiguity. Please revise.

In (1)(Q), (2)(Q), and (3)(P), "cots" should be singular.

Additionally, in (1)(Q), (2)(Q), and (3)(P) remove the "and" at the end of each.

In (f)(1)(S), (2)(S), and (3)(R), what are "whip or fill" systems? Also, make "system" plural.

In (g)(1), line 36, "Program" should be plural.

In (g)(3), add "on" after "training", and "a" after "thanD."

In (g)(3), is this training already required elsewhere for certification? If so, is the requirement here more stringent than that required elsewhere? Do you have statutory authority to require more or less training than the entity that otherwise certifies helicopter rescue technicians? NCEM certifies the technicians. Quarterly is required for them to maintain currency.

In (h)(1), what does "good working order" mean? Define or delete.

In (h)(2), similarly to above, what does "damage" and "unusual wear" mean?

In (i)(1), please state the full name of ASTM, and state where the resource can be found and at what cost.

In (i) and (k)(2)(C), remove the parenthetical.

In (i) and (k)(2)(I), what is in the "set" of rain gear, and, in (i)(2)(L), the "fire starting kit".

In (i)(2)(M), the second instance of "measure" should be "measuring".

In (i) and (k)(2)(O), what is a ICS 214 form?

At the end of (i)(3)(A), insert an "and".

In (i)(3)(B), is a "first aid kit" standardized? What should be in it?

In (j)(3)(F), "cord" should be plural.

In (j)(3)(I), I think "of" is necessary after "each".D

The Rules Review Commission staff has completed its review of this Rule prior to the Commission's next meeting. The Commission has not yet reviewed this Rule and therefore there has not been a determination as to whether the Rule will be approved. You may email the reviewing attorney to inquire concerning the staff recommendation.

In reviewing this Rule, the staff recommends the following changes be made:

All references to "NCEM", "NCEM Operations Chief", "NC Search and Rescue Program", and "NC SAR System" should be double checked to make sure they comply with any changes made to 14B NCAC 03.0402. Also, ensure the abbreviations are used, such as "NCEM Director".

In all instances of "system resources", "resources", "contract response team", "specialty rescue team", and "system personnel", use the full, capitalized construction, unless another construction of the phrase is being used outside the defined term in 14B NCAC 03 .0402(25).

Are (a)(1) and (a)(2) exhaustive lists of the records NCEM will require?

The phrasing of (a) or (a)(3) should be revised. How does one make "available for [auditing]... access to functional exercises..."?

In (b) and the items under it, the text could use a rewrite for clarity. For instance, (b) is in the passive tense and could be simplified. Similarly, (b)(1) and (2) are more verbose than necessary. Please revise and simplify.

In (b)(2), what does it mean to "address" a finding? What are you requiring?

In (b)(2), who makes the referral to the disciplinary committee? Revise in the active tense.

Also in (b)(2), who gets referred to the disciplinary committee? An individual? The entire team? The team's leader? Please specify. Deleted. No authority.

In (b)(3), what is "malicious or willful misconduct"? Please define. Similarly, what is meant by "misrepresentation" or "fraud"? What do these terms mean in context of a search and rescue operation? Deleted. No authority.

In (c), is it within the authority delegated to the agency by the General Assembly to create a disciplinary committee and impose sanctions upon participants in the NC SAR system? G.S. 166A-66(10) gives you the authority to "audit" for the purpose of ensuring compliance with State and federal guidelines, but I don't see the power to impose sanctions for misconduct. Deleted. No authority

Even assuming there is authority to impose sanctions, do you have statutory authority to place the disciplinary committee under the Search and Rescue Technical Advisory Committee? G.S. 166A-69 establishes the Technical Advisory Committee and limits its role to "advis[ing] the Secretary on the establishment" of the SAR program and to "evaluat[ing] and advis[ing] the Secretary of the need for additional contract response teams...." I don't see where they have the authority to hear and rule on disciplinary matters.

In (c)(1)(C), what are you referring to here? What programs? What is a technical advisory group? Deleted. No authority

In (c)(2), what is "misconduct" beyond "breach of program requirements"? These are listed as two distinct areas for review. Please define. Deleted. No authority

In (c)(2), is it within the authority delegated to the agency by the General Assembly to prevent parties from being represented by counsel at a disciplinary hearing? Deleted. No authority

In (c)(2)(B), please revise for clarity. Facts cannot be in violation of the Rules.

In (c)(2)(B), does "the rules of the NC Search and Rescue Program" mean these Rules? If so, please say so.

In (c)(2)(C), is "dismission" necessary? I know it is a word, but it seems like "dismissal" is more easily understood by the regulated public and has the same meaning.

In (c)(2)(C), does the Director have the authority to dismiss an individual from a team that is not under his or her jurisdiction? i.e. a contract team, or one under the jurisdiction of a local authority. Deleted. No authority
