Ms. Hayworth,

Will you or another representative from your agency be present at the RRC meeting tomorrow? I'm asking because one commissioner has contacted me with a question about 02 NCAC 09L .0503(a). The commissioner has suggested that the word "situations" (line 6) be replaced with "treatments" or "conditions and treatments". I replied that "treatments" might not cover all the methods used to apply pesticides. My understanding is that the pesticide industry uses the word "treatments" when referring to the process of applying pesticides to seeds prior to planting them in soil. I believe "situations" covers this process and the application of pesticides through sprayers or other equipment that is used in the industry. Please correct me if my understanding is not accurate. A technical change can be made today or tomorrow during the meeting, if that's appropriate.

I wanted to notify you of the commissioner's suggestion in case he mentions this as a point of discussion tomorrow at the meeting. The commissioner may decide not to mention it tomorrow or, if he does, his fellow commissioners might not agree with his suggested change.

In reviewing this Rule, the staff recommends the following technical changes be made:

All of these rules were published in N.C. Register on June 3, 2024. The "Instructions on How to Demand a Public Hearing" (Volume 38-Issue 23-pg. 1483) say "Any person may request a public hearing on the proposed rules by submitting a request in writing no later than May 15th, 2024". How is this not a violation of G.S. 150B-21.9 (a)(4)?

How will the RRC know if a hearing would've been requested if the deadline wasn't incorrect in the N.C. Register? – **Response below.** 

The date published in the Register of May 15<sup>th</sup>, 2024, was a typographical error, missed by both the agency when submitted for publication and the RRC staff. The agency and staff went back and forth on multiple edits regarding the publication, without either catching this issue. As the date of request was beyond the publication date of the Register on June 1<sup>st</sup>, 2024, it would have been difficult to request a hearing date beforehand, and thus, an understood error. It is reasonable to assume that had any member of the public encountered this issue, they would have reached out to the agency, or someone related for clarification, given the obvious error, and no such contacts were made.

Communication has been made by the department for years that these rule changes were coming to the industry, related associations, and interested parties, and have spread this information out through a variety of sources, including but not limited to: private applicator recertification meetings, cooperative extension, field staff, and trade show informational booths at a variety of events hosted by the division (i.e. Green and Grow, Southern Farm Show). These rules were presented before the NC Pesticide Board prior to publication, which

included representatives from a variety of interested parties, including but not limited to: NC Farm Bureau, Toxic Free NC, etc. These meetings are frequently attended by not just interested individuals and stakeholders, but members of the public, and its information is widely distributed throughout the community.

During the comment period, comments were received from outside sources, including both industry and stakeholders, for example, Leigh Ann Richardson of Koppers Performance Chemicals Inc. (industry member), and Jeffrey T. Miller, President and Executive Director of the Treated Wood Council (stakeholder association), as well as various calls from the public during the comment period to address their specific concerns. Division staff communicated with all interested parties and addressed all inquiries.

In addition, the agency was in communication with interested parties and industry stakeholders leading up to the initiation of rulemaking, as well as the formal publication of rules within the Register, all of whom were aware of the publication, and none of whom requested a public hearing, or inquired about the way to which to request a public hearing outside of the posted date, given that it was impossible to do so as stated in the publication itself. While some individuals did submit formal comments, they were discussed with the agency, and all issues were resolved to the satisfaction of both parties before moving forward with the submission for final approval. No request for a public hearing or an exception to the public hearing date procedures was discussed or requested by any individual.

Under G.S. 150B-18, a rule is not valid unless it is adopted in substantial compliance. The agency does believe that given its extensive communication with stakeholders, industry, and the public met the standard for substantial compliance for all the reasons detailed above, and in particular due to their attention to public notice outside of the Register publication and their outreach to interested parties prior to and during the entire rule making process, that compliance has been met. There was no attempt to circumvent the process, and the public hearing date was simply a typographical error. The public was well aware of the rule making process, the changes that were being proposed, submitted comments, and there was never any request or expression of interest in a public hearing.

In (b), what are the "activities" you are referring to? - Changes made.

In (c), what is "Adoption by Reference" and why is it in all caps? Did you mean incorporation by reference pursuant to 150B-21.6? If so, in line 8, replace "adopts" with "incorporates". You don't need to add the title "Incorporation by Reference", just implement the requirements of 150B-21.6 into the rule. – Changes made.

In line 8, add a comma after "reference". – Changes made.

In line 11, add "and editions" after "amendments". - Changes made.

In line 12, I've been unable to access the materials on the website, www.gpoaccess.gov/cfr/index.html, with three different computers/devices. How do you ensure that the materials are accessible to the regulated public? – Changes made.

In (d), does "noncertified" mean the same as non-licensed? Consider adding "licensed" before "pesticide". – **Response below.** 

Noncertified is more appropriate in this circumstance due to the possibility that an individual could hold a license, but not be certified in the category for the application at issue.

In (d), please consider restructuring this section to be clear and unambiguous. Here are some suggestions: In (1), line 14, delete "requirements for the" and add "shall:" at the end. – Changes made.

In (A), line 15, delete "the supervising pesticide applicator must". What is the meaning of "practical"? – Changes made.

In line 16, add a comma after "state". – Changes made.

In line 17 and elsewhere, why is "and labeling" necessary? Is this in addition to the actual "label"? – Response below.

In this context, 'label' and 'labeling' refer to two different applications, as defined in G.S. 143-460(19-20).

In (B), delete "the supervising pesticide applicator must". Add a comma after "category" and after ".0505". Add "Rule" before "02". – Changes made.

Delete everything in line 20. Begin line 21 by adding "(C)". Add a colon after "pesticide" on line 22. – Changes made.

On line 23, replace "(A)" with "(1)" and indent "(1)" inside of "(C)". – Changes made.

The new "(1)" will say "the non-certified applicator has satisfied the qualification requirements under Paragraph (e) of this Rule;" – Changes made.

Also, Paragraph (e) only requires that "one of the following qualifications" are met. This seems to be conflicting and it's unclear as to what is required under (e). – **Changes made, response below.** 

This language mirrors the EPA utilized language in the worker protection standards, and thus is consistent and recognizable to the regulated public.

In line 24, delete "including the following:". Add "(2)" before "the noncertified" and move "(2)" under the new "(1)". – Changes made.

In line 26, delete "and" and add "(3)" before "the noncertified" and move "(3)" under the new "(2)". Punctuate "(3)" with a semicolon. – Changes made.

In (3), lines 29-31, delete all of the text. – Changes made.

In line 32, replace "(A)" with "(4)". Delete "The supervising pesticide applicator must" and start "(4)" with "ensure..." and punctuate it with a semicolon. – Changes made.

In line 34, replace "(B)" with "(5)". Start "(5)" with "where..." and punctuate it with a semicolon. – Changes made.

In a case in which a practicing veterinarian is applying pesticides outside of their veterinary practice, then they must be licensed and therefore adhere to the rules within the section, examples would include veterinarians treating structures and fields, not the animals themselves.
