It appears that this rule has already received more than ten letters requesting legislative review, which will result in a delayed effective date pursuant to G.S. 150B-21.3. Are there any interconnectivity issues with other rules, such that they should also have a delayed effective date? No.

Several public comments have suggested that the changes to bear hunting season could have a substantial economic impact, particularly related to money related to tourism. (see, e.g. Erin Sobe's comment on p. 16 and 17 of the collated letters requesting legislative review.) From the cover sheet and fiscal note, it appears that your agency does not believe that this change will have a substantial economic impact. Please explain how the agency reached this conclusion.

The first segment of the current bear season in the Mountain Bear Management Unit (MBMU) begins on October 16 and runs 5 weeks through November 18. This season has remained unchanged (except for shifts caused by the calendar) since 1972 and was specifically designed to emphasize harvest of male bears over female bears to maximize growth of the bear population. The black bear population in the MBMU has grown immensely since that time under this season framework and is continuing to grow around 4% annually. The current Black Bear Management Plan calls for stabilization of the population and the change to the season framework will help accomplish this goal.

To stabilize the population (i.e. maintain the current bear population level) in the MBMU, additional female bears need to be harvested (current harvest is 37% female/63% male, target harvest is 40% female/60% male). Female bears den earlier than male bears, and so opening the hunting season earlier in October before many female bears have denned will serve to help to meet desired harvest percentages of female bears.

Fall colors typically run from mid-September to mid-November in the MBMU and hunting already occurs during this time. Deer season and bear season already overlap

leaf season. Hunters (both still and those that hunt with dogs) and other outdoor recreationists have coexisted in this space for decades. It is important to note that not all lands are open to hunting – many popular leaf viewing areas are not open to hunting, and hunters tend to frequent more remote places away from trails where other outdoor recreationists are expected to be, though some may be visible on or from roadways.

Tourism and outdoor recreation are significant contributors to North Carolina's economy. Hunting is part of this economic benefit. The Commission does not anticipate that adding 9 days to the beginning of the first segment of the MBMU bear season will affect tourism related to leaf viewing or any other outdoor recreational activity. Nor does the agency believe there will be a substantial influx of bear hunters because of this change. This change is not anticipated to recruit additional hunters or sell more hunting licenses. It is a change that is needed for biological reasons to stabilize growth in the population of black bears in the MBMU. The agency believes potential fiscal impacts are appropriately accounted for in the approved fiscal note.

Our intent was to make it very clear that on the outer banks, only males can be taken, while on the mainland/remainder of state, it's legal to take males and female pheasants. We prefer to keep the language as-is for clarity.

Note: For this and many of the fishing rules, I am not sure I understand how creel and possession limits are meant to interact. Rather than going through this exhaustively for each rule, I have broken down this rule in detail. If I've misunderstood, I may have additional questions regarding this rule and others in 10C.

Am I correct that the fish specific rules are the specific limits referenced in 15A NCAC 10C .0304? Yes.

If so, am I correct that the general rule for largemouth bass is that you can take up to five a day (15A NCAC 10C .0305(a)) and possess up to fifteen at once (15A NCAC 10C .0304(c))? Yes. Five/day on the water, up to 15 off the water.

Do all size limits only apply to the fish possessed while on the water (15A NCAC 10C .0304(b))? For example, does 15A NCAC 10C .305(b) mean you can only have two fish under 14 inches while fishing, but could take them home and catch another two fish under 14 inches the next day? Yes, two of the five you catch each day can be under 14 inches.

For regions where the daily creel limit is higher than the general rule, is the possession limit also higher? Yes. On the water, the daily creel limit applies. Off the water the possession limit is three days creel. For example, does 15A NCAC 10C .0305 (d) mean that you can possess 30 largemouth bass from Lake Cammack or Lake Holt? As long as you're not on the water.

For paragraphs i and j, am I correct that there are no additional limits regarding fish between 14 and 16 inches? General rule applies – 5/day. All 5 could be any combination of sizes as long as no more than two are less than 14 and none are between 16 and 20 inches.

Permits shall be issued by random computer selection, shall be mailed to the permittees prior to the hunt, and are nontransferable. A hunter making a kill shall validate the kill and report the kill to a wildlife cooperator agent or by phone.
- 11 (m) The following game lands and refuges are closed to hunting except to individuals who have obtained a valid and current permit from the Wildlife Resources Commission:
 - (1) Bertie, Halifax Halifax, and Martin counties—Roanoke River Wetlands;
 - (2) Bertie County—Roanoke River National Wildlife Refuge;
 - (3) Bladen County—Suggs Mill Pond Game Lands;
 - (4) Dare County—Dare Game Lands (Those parts of bombing range posted against hunting);
 - (5) Dare County—Roanoke Sound Marshes Game Lands; and
 - (6) Henderson and Transylvania counties—DuPont State Forest Game Lands.
- 19 (n) Access to Hunting Creek Swamp Waterfowl Refuge in Davie County requires written permission from the Commission. Written permission may be granted when entry onto the Waterfowl Refuge shall not compromise the primary purpose for establishing the Waterfowl Refuge and the person requesting entry can demonstrate a valid need or the person is a contractor or agent of the Commission conducting official business. "Valid need" includes issues of access to private property, scientific investigations, surveys, or other access to conduct activities in the public interest.
- (o) Feral swine may be taken by licensed hunters during the open season for a game animal or game bird using a legal
 manner of take allowed during those seasons. Dogs may not be used to hunt feral swine except on game lands that
 allow the use of dogs for hunting deer or bear, and during the open deer or bear season.
- 27 (p)(o) The Commission may designate special hunts for participants of the disabled sportsman program by permit.
- 28 The Commission may schedule these permit hunts during the closed season. Hunt dates and species to be taken shall
- be identified on the permit. If the hunt has a limited weapon choice, the allowed weapons shall be stated on the permit.
- 30 (q)(p) As used in the rules of this Subchapter, horseback riding includes all equine species.
- 31 (r)(q) When waterfowl hunting is authorized on Christmas and New Years' Day and those days fall on Sundays, the open waterfowl hunting day shall be the following day.
