Regarding (c) and (d), if someone is taking a federally listed endangered or threatened species do they need both a federal and state permit?

If so, does the state have authority to deny a permit if one is issued by the federal government?

If both permits are required, consider clarifying on line 13 that the federal and state permits are separate things. I.e. "requires a separate federal permit".

If not, should endangered and threatened by removed on line 17? It appears that the only endangered and threatened lists in the NCAC are federally listed.
